and as each roped the crowd waited in suspense to see who would win. In the finals Babb's total time on the four calves was 82 seconds, while Rodgers' time was 183 seconds.

Three Tied in Goat Roping In the goat roping three tied for first place, and choose to split the first second and third prizes instead of roping over. These were Walter Babb, Earl Sellers and Leo Bishop, with a time of 12.2. Other ropers and their time were Jack Sellers 13.1, Homer Holman 15.3, Joe Chandler 13.3, Fred Barrett, 15. Frank Kirchgraber, Emmett Buck and W. L. Babb, no time.

Quite a number entered the steer breakaway event, first place going to Vick Rodgers, his time being 8 seconds. Doc Turk second, 8.2; and Walter Babb third, 9 flat. Other ropers were H. Chandler 10.2, Jack Sellers 12; no time for Kirchgraber, Barrett and E. Sellers.

Second Day Events While not quite as large a crowd witnessed the second day's rodeo those who failed to attend missed a good afternoon's entertainment, as all events went off like clockwork, with very little waiting.

As on the first day, calf roping was first on the program, and at the windup, it developed that some quick catches and ties were made. The entrants, with time made follows: Walter Babb, no time; Earl Sellers, no time; Homer Holman 22, Jack Sellers 25.1, Charlie Gregory 32, Frank Kirchgraber 23.5, Melvin Chandler 22.2, Vick Rodgers 18.1, Leo Bishop 20.2, Fred Barrett 19.2, Willie Banner 28. First money went to Rodgers, with Barrett second, and Bishop third.

Next was steer breakaway, and quick catching was again in evidence. Ropers and time: Doc Turk 18.1, Charlie Gregory 8.1, Herman Chandler, no time; Earl Sellers 17.3 (with 10 seconds penalty); Kirchgraber and Melvin Chandler, no time; Vick Rodgers 7.1, and a tie between Walter Babb and Dee Schooley, with 8.2 each. First money to Rodgers, second to Gregory, and third split between Schooley and Babb.

In the bronc riding there were 3 entrants, Bill Stavley again winning first money by his clean riding on the Banner bay. Arnold Ellis on "Big Canyon," and Edwin Smith on "Buddy," gave good exhibitions.

Goat roping followed, with a few new ropers not entered the first day. Winners and their time were as follows: Fred Barrett 9.2, first money; Holman Holman, second, 10.2; and Jack Sellers 11, third. Other ropers were Leo Bishop 12, Emmett Buck 11.1, Willie Banner 13, Joe Chandler 11.2, no time for E. Sellers and "Son" Turner.

The wild goat roping and milking contest furnished amusement to the crowd as they watched the men rope the animal and the fairer sex run out and milk her. "Son" Turner, with Mary Beth Banner as his milker won first prize; second went to Leo Bishop and Mrs. Tom Holmes; Earl Sellers and his "lady friend," Vick Rodgers were third.

A matched calf roping contest between Emmett Buck of Dryden and Vick Rodgers of Kerrville was the next event. Each roped two calves, Buck's time being 45 seconds. Rodgers time on the first calf was 27 seconds, but it was "no catch" on his second trial.

Leaving the rodeo field the crowd gathered at the race track to witness the horse race between Willie Banner, on his famous race horse "Crapshooter," and Herman Chandler on his race pony "Bob Crosby." The distance was 350 yards, and the start was made by each horse galloping to the starting line. "Bob Crosby" won, it being the first match race in which he was ever entered, while for "Crapshooter," it was the first time he has ever tasted defeat.

On both nights dancing was enjoyed by large crowds on the concrete platform in the hangar. Music was the best heard in this section in some time, and was furnished by the Seven Madcap orchestra from Fort Clark.

The promoters, Jess Haley, Charley Turk, and Sgt. Richardson deserve much praise for this splendid performance and two days of entertainment. Through the Times they wish to thank the business men of Dryden and Sanderson for their contributions to the barbecue, and the ranchers for donations of stock and help generally in staging this rodeo.
