# Saddle and Blanket Found in Cave May Lead to Treasure

LOOTED SO. PAC. TRAIN

MAY REVIVE SEARCH FOR THE LOOT SECURED FROM MAIL CAR AND PASSENGERS 35

While riding the range at the Chandler ranch on the Independence this past week, Joe Chandler 'TWAS A CLOSE SHAVE and Arnold Ellis chanced to ride up on a cave in which they found a saddle which evidently had been

In exploring the cave many bones were found, but the two boys do not know whether or not they were human bones. The saddle was in fairly good condition, most of the leather being well preserved. It was a large saddle and the imprint on the leather, still readable, showed it had been made by W. T. Frazier, of Pueblo, Colo. It is of a stock of saddles that is no longer being made.

Marks on the saddle led to the theory that it had been used as a pack-saddle, being what is known among ranchers considerably rope-

The brand U K was stamped in several places on the saddle. Under the saddle they found the remnant of the saddle blanket, just a fine Navajo blanket of brilliant red. This had decayed from contact with




