IT'S NO SECRET

Saw a report the other day. It recorded the fact that for the first four months of 1934 the firm of Montgomery Ward checked up an unbelievable profit of nearly three million dollars. To many a small merchant this is mystifying. With them it is a hard row to break even—and many are battling to keep the wolf from their door; with others it's a case of the wolf already at the door, with a healthy litter of pups. Hundreds of dollars shown on the profit side of M. W.'s ledger at one time belonged to Sanderson people. How did the mail order house get them away from us, and during a season of dire depression? Answered easily: "Advertising," coupled with the fact that they saw to it that the advertising literature went into the homes of the people—in the cities, towns and hamlets. Show me any successful business and I'll show you a consistent advertiser. The load that keeps life in the big man keeps it in the little fellow as well. Advertising—not the hit and miss brand—will bring people into your place of business, as most people look upon advertising as an invitation. If you have what they want, they'll buy. But too often the hit and miss advertiser gets no results. He got the people in the state of mind as was the old farmer, when he heard an old hen cackling. He'd been fooled too often when he looked into the nest. When asked which was correct "sitting or setting," he replied "That never bothered me, but when that hen cackles I wonder whether she's laying or lying."

PATRIOTISM

Hardly a pupil, even in the primary grades, but is not familiar with the Pledge of Allegiance to Our Flag? Hearing them in concert, bodies stiffly erect, faces stern in earnestness, right hands at salute, a parent would indeed be devoid of emotion if the tableau did not impress him. Why don't we encourage this patriotism—love of country, of home, of loved one—for, in the last analysis, that what it amounts to. Wednesday was Memorial Day, set apart to honor those who made the supreme sacrifice for us. A day on which the flag was unfurled to the God-given breezes of a free land, in honor of the heroes of the past, to keep before the living the principles for which they died. In vain this writer looked for a flag, hoping that at least one would be flying. But we failed to see a single one. As we grow older we become less emotional, but we should never lose sight of the fact that when we drop out of the ranks, others are following to fill the gaps. The example is for their benefit. They look to older people for guidance—among the latter are some chosen as ideals. Let us not disappoint or discourage those who follow in our footsteps.

Reports are to the effect that the perpetrator of a horrible crime near Van Horn last November has been captured in a foreign country. It was a fine piece of work by Texas officers. However, the lion's share of the glory is being handed to El Paso's sheriff, Chris Fox. The writer is acquainted with every gruesome detail of this crime and, while admitting that Fox, with assistance possible only in a large city like El Paso, deserves much credit for the final apprehension, it must be remembered that officers of El Paso, Hudspeth and Culberson counties were up in the air, muchly up in the air, until Sheriff Roberson of Pecos, tracked down the first real clues to the murder, which made possible the identity of Mrs. Irene DeBolt, but that of her slayer as well. But Sheriff Roberson, a real peace officer, will be content that the murderer will be brought to justice.

Scout Encampment Dates Are Set For August 1st to 12th

TWENTY-FIVE SCOUTS FROM LOCAL TROOP, IN CHARGE OF SCOUTMASTER SMITH, EXPECTED TO ATTEND.

Information has been received by the council of the Boy Scouts of Sanderson that the annual encampment of the boys in the southwest district of the Boy Scouts of America will be held at Camp Fawcett beginning August 1, and ending August 12.

Each troop in the district is to furnish their own scoutmaster leadership. In this connection Professor Duane Smith will encamp with the Sanderson boys as their adult leader. The local council hopes that twenty-five boys will make arrangements to enjoy this wonderful outing at Camp Fawcett.

The camp furnishes tentage, dishes, plates, two cups, knife, fork, spoon and all cooking utensils. The feeding of the boys will be managed by the camp and two excellent cooks have been hired with help to run the kitchen, so that the scouts, while encamped, will be free to enjoy every minute of the encampment. The camp boasts of one of the finest swimming holes in the Southwest.

The organization of the scout camp fixes a charge of 75c a day for each scout while in camp. This fee for the twelve-day period will be \$9. If a scout is compelled to return home, the unearned portion of his meal charge will be refunded.

The Clarence Hallie Mulkey Post No. 160, American Legion, and the scout council are going to make arrangements for transporting the boys to the camp, as well as furnish them with a most capable scoutmaster. However, each boy attending the camp must pay his 75c a day for meals. The local council urges each boy, between now and the first of August, to save his money to defray his 75c per day cost while in camp.

Local citizens are urged to cooperate and help the boys in any way they can toward earning small change to this end, and they will be rendering a great community service and the scouts will appreciate same.

Local scouts are now being urged to get busy and get ready for the encampment, and let's have every boy that possibly can be in attendance for a most delightful time and an instructive trip.

Stamford, Texas, June 1. — One hundred towns and cities in west Texas are expected to send girl riders as sponsors to the 5th annual Texas Cowboy Reunion, to be held here July 2, 3 and 4.

A handsome, special-made saddle, valued at \$300, will be awarded as first prize in the judging of sponsors this year. The saddle will be contributed by the Salesmanship Club of Dallas.

Timing Device for New Chevrolets Give Expert Job

Hairbreadth accuracy in timing motor ignition, heretofore a job for a trained expert, is made so simple that anyone can do it in a few minutes by an ingenious application of stroboscopic principles developed by Chevrolet engineer.

The Chevrolet arrangement is to use a polished steel ball, pressed into the rim of the flywheel, as a marker, instead of the usual faint groove; and to provide a simple and inexpensive means of making the ball clearly visible and seemingly standing still every time the spark plug of No. 1 cylinder fires.

This stroboscopic effect is obtained by using a special Neon lamp connected to the spark plug. With the engine running at 500 r. p. m., the lamp illuminates the ball for an instant 250 times a minute.

Chevrolet engineers have found that the ability to time an engine while it is running brings better results than even an expert job with the engine stopped.

Ordinarily, timing is checked only during infrequent engine tune-up jobs at service stations. By simplifying the job, Chevrolet enables the owners to keep their engines at a maximum performance capacity by frequent timings.
