CARNERA TAKES FIGHT TO THE CHALLENGER, REFUSING TO TAKE ADVANTAGE TO REST AFTER KNOCKDOWNS.

Primo Carnera enterd the ring at 8 o'clock, and chatted with handlers. Baer, the challenger, entered a few minutes later, grinning in confidence. Both got big hands from the 50,000 fans. Joe Humphries introduced the fighters, dubbed the Italian "The Goliath of Fistiana, and Baer the "Adonis of the Ring," who will attempt to bring the championship back to the U.S.

Carnera tipped the scales at 263. Baer weighed in at 210. The latter was arrayed in the movie bath robe he wore in Hollywood, with the name Steve Morgan, whom he portrayed, stamped across the side. The champ wore a blue robe with bright red trimmings.

First round-Both came to center of ring slowly. Baer backing off, the champ trying to work him into a corner. Primo's left is working good and he constantly jabs Baer in the face, while the latter is concentrating on the Italian's mid-section. Canera's jabs sting Baer, and he finally lands one on the champ's head knocking him against the ropes and has Primo in bad way when the

Round 2-Primo lands left to face hard to head, both go down, up once more the same thing happens. For three times both men are down together. Baer is laughing at what he considers a funny situation. Primo continues to jab with left, Baer is wary and keeps backing away as the round ends.
