MEXICAN SHOT TO DEATH

\$400 Was Paid For Murder of Henry

Leaders of a smuggling clique in Villa Acuna paid \$400 for the murder of L. C. Henry, customs officer, according to the Del Rio Evening News. The fact became known this week when Capt. Luke Dove, head of the custom service, and Capt. W. L. Earler first assistant, received separate telephone calls in which they were warned they "would get the same as Henry got."

Henry was lured from his home on pretext that the murderer was looking for the home of a prominent Del Rioan. After driving several blocks the murderer, Rafael Dominguez shot Henry making the statement he was lured to do so and named Marcial Martinez, former mayor of Villa Acuna.

Both Dominguez and Martinez are now in custody of Mexican authorities and efforts are being made for their extradition and trial for murder.

Terrell Among Counties On List For Immediate Drouth Aid

Chairmen Selected For Counties At Marfa Meeting

CATTLE TO CANNERY

CATTLE IN SEVERE DROUTH AREAS WILL BE PURCHASED BY U. S. GOVERNMENT AND SHIPPED TO EL PASO PLANT

At a meeting held in Marfa last week, representatives from practically every southwest county were in attendance, to plan a relief program in connection with the government's program of aid to ranchmen in the drouth-stricken areas of the state.

The meeting was called to order by Capt. Simons of El Paso, who briefly outlined the government plan to purchase cattle in sections that have been hard hit by the continued dry weather. Joe Kerr of Sanderson attended the meeting and was appointed chairman for Terrell county.

After general discussion as to conditions in this section, it was decided to petition the government to place several of the counties on the Class A list, removing them from the secondary classification.

Action of the government in this matter was prompt, and seven Texas counties were placed in the emergency division, including Terrell.

The plan for Class A counties provides that all diseased cattle on ranches be purchased and the animals killed and the carcasses disposed of by burning or burial. Other cattle, healthy, but with little chance of making it through the summer months, will be purchased and shipped to one of the government canning plants. Already 11 carloads of cattle have been purchased and shipped from southwest counties to the federal processing plant at El Paso.

Another meeting was held at Marfa yesterday, presided over by J. Paul Henderson, relief administrator, of El Paso, and plans for other relief advantages were discussed.

As far as the Times could learn, no provisions for relief of sheep and goat breeders were discussed, although it was thought that later a plan of relief would be outlined, possibly by a system of loans determined through appraisal of their herds.

Candidate for the Legislature Favors Reform in Taxes

MINIMUM AUTO TAX

STANFORD PAYNE OF DEL RIO OUTLINES POLICIES TO THE VOTERS OF 87TH REPRESENTATIVE DISTRICT

In agreeing to become a candidate for the State legislature of the 87th district I did so because I believed that I could be of real service to the people of our district in the legislature.

Taxation

I will vigorously oppose any new tax on land and homes, which are at this time taxed and mortgaged to death. It has become a liability in this State to own property, and something is radically wrong. Real estate earns about 15% of the income; it bears 77% of the ad valorem taxes. If possible, we must have a readjustment in our tax situation and place a tax on those larger interests in proportion to their ability to earn and pay.

Corrupt Lobbying

Corrupt lobbying and corrupt lobbyists must be driven from our government. I will support a strong bill regulating corrupt lobbyists, which is a menace to our free government.

Retainer's Fees

I will introduce a bill, if elected, that will require every Senator and Representative in our State legislature to file, under oath, a list of the corporations and combines that are paying him retainer's fees, if any.

Law Enforcement

I will favor a bill merging the Texas Rangers and the State Highway Patrol into an effective fighting machine to fight lawlessness in this state.

Education

Having taught 11 years it will be my purpose to support the public school in our State and also the Sul Ross normal. It is almost treason to think of the deplorable condition of education in this State. We rank first in size, first in natural resources, and yet rank number 36 in education. It shall be my purpose to help build for Texas one of the best systems of schools in the nation, and this can and must be done without any additional taxes on homes, lands and real estate, which are already taxed to death. If elected, I intend to introduce a bill which will place a sufficient tax on natural resources of our State to bring in sufficient revenue to go into the available school fund, which will give us an opportunity to build the system of schools in Texas to which we are entitled. There are other matters concerning schools which will come before the legislature from time to time and upon which I will have an

open mind, keeping in mind all times those things which will be for the betterment of the public school system of Texas.

Automobile Registration

Automobiles are rendered for taxes as personal property in each county, and I will support a bill that will make \$5.00 the regular fee for the registration of all automobiles which are not used for commercial purposes.

Ranching and Farming Interests

It will be my purpose to support legislation helping ranchmen and farmers in destroying predatory animals, blow-flies and other matters in which they are interested.

In conclusion I want to say that the fight is on in Texas between those who want to control this State for selfish purposes, and the great plain people. If you believe in the principles as advocated in my platform, I shall appreciate having your vote and support, and I want to make this a personal appeal to you and will appreciate anything that you can do or say in my behalf.

Bullet That Dealt Death to One Man Wounds Another

DEPUTY IS CHARGED

BRAULIO GUTIERREZ PLACED UNDER \$5000 BOND, CHARGED WITH UNLAWFUL MURDER OF MANUEL CORONADO

Braulio Gutierrez, known here as "Brownie," is in the Terrell county jail today, charged with the unlawful murder of Manuel Coronado on July 4th, at about 11:30 a. m. in the Mexican section of Sanderson. Bond was set at \$5000 and Gutierrez was bound over to grand jury, which convenes here Monday, July 9. The prisoner refused to make a statement at the preliminary trial.

The peace and serenity of what might have been the quietest 4th ever witnessed in Sanderson was shattered about noon of that day by the report of a single shot. When the smoke cleared away Manuel Coronado, one of the most peaceful and industrious of Mexicans lay dead from a bullet through his heart, from a pistol in the hands of Braulio Gutierrez, acting deputy sheriff. The same bullet that killed Coronado entered the fleshy part of Pablo Carrasco's arm, inflicting a nasty wound.

Gutierrez was placed under arrest at his home shortly after the shooting by deputies Vernon Buchanan and W. D. Hunter.

No Testimony as to Motive

At the examining trial, conducted Thursday afternoon before Justice of the Peace R. L. Henry, with A. E. Creigh, Jr., county attorney, examining the witnesses, Gutierrez waived examination, resulting in failure of the court to bring out any motive for the shooting.

Dr. James C. Sharp, who was at the scene of the shooting a few minutes after it occurred, testified as to the nature of the wound, and stated that death was practically instantaneous, as the bullet pierced the heart, ranged downward, emerging at a point below the tenth rib in the back. Evidently the bullet then struck the sidewalk and ricocheted upward, passed through the fleshy part of Pablo Carrasco's left arm near the shoulder.

Herman Pauli testified he was on the porch of his place of business when the shooting occurred, heard the shot, saw the crowd gathered around. Hurrying over he stated he found Coronado laying on the sidewalk. He directed some one to go for a doctor. Seeing Gutierrez with the gun he asked him why he did it. Gutierrez was hurrying away. Mr. Pauli testified, and the only part of his answer heard by Pauli was: "That son-of-a-bitch." Mr. Pauli testified that Coronado made no statement to him.

W. D. Hunter testimony, in effect, was that he was driving through town, saw the crowd gathered, and when he learned the cause, summoned Vernon Buchanan. Inquiries as to Gutierrez's whereabouts established the fact he was at his home, and they went there and arrested him.

Questions at this point obviously were intended to establish facts as to Gutierrez's sobriety. Mr. Hunter stated he could not definitely swear that Gutierrez was under the influence of intoxicants, but did state that he acted queer.

Other witnesses were summoned, but not examined, the testimony of the men giving testimony establishing beyond doubt that Gutierrez did the shooting as charged.

A verdict of unlawful murder was rendered by Judge Henry, and bond set at \$5000, and the case bound over to action of the grand jury. Bail not being made, Gutierrez was remanded to the custody of the Sheriff and placed in jail.

Coronado's body was prepared for burial and interment was made at the Santa Rita cemetery Thursday at noon. He leaves a wife and one child of his immediate family. He was well liked by both the American and Mexican population, and following the shooting feeling was bitter against Gutierrez—but the efficient handling of the case by our local officers, this feeling has passed.

Monday First Day For Absentee Votes

Approximately 1500 ballots for use in the democratic primary election on Saturday, July 28, are being prepared at the Times office and will be in the hands of the proper officials in plenty of time for those who will want to vote an absentee ballot.

The first day for such voting will be next Monday, July 9th, and is for the convenience of the qualified voters of this county who are out of the county at the present time, and will not be here on election day.

Qualified voters now out of the county of residence desiring to vote must mail their poll tax receipts to the county clerk with their application for an official ballot. Where such tax receipt is not available—lost or misplaced—an affidavit must accompany the application for the

ballot.

Qualified voters who will be out of town on the day of the election may vote by presenting themselves at the county clerk's office on or after Monday, July 9. All absentee ballots must be filled in and be in the office of the county clerk by Wednesday, July 25.

Due to the fact that this year the candidates for county and precinct officers participate in a primary election for the first time, it is of prime importance that all voters familiarize themselves with the laws governing the primary election.

As far as candidates for county and precinct officers are concerned, their election will be determined by a plurality of votes cast in the first primary, July 28—for them there will be no run-off.

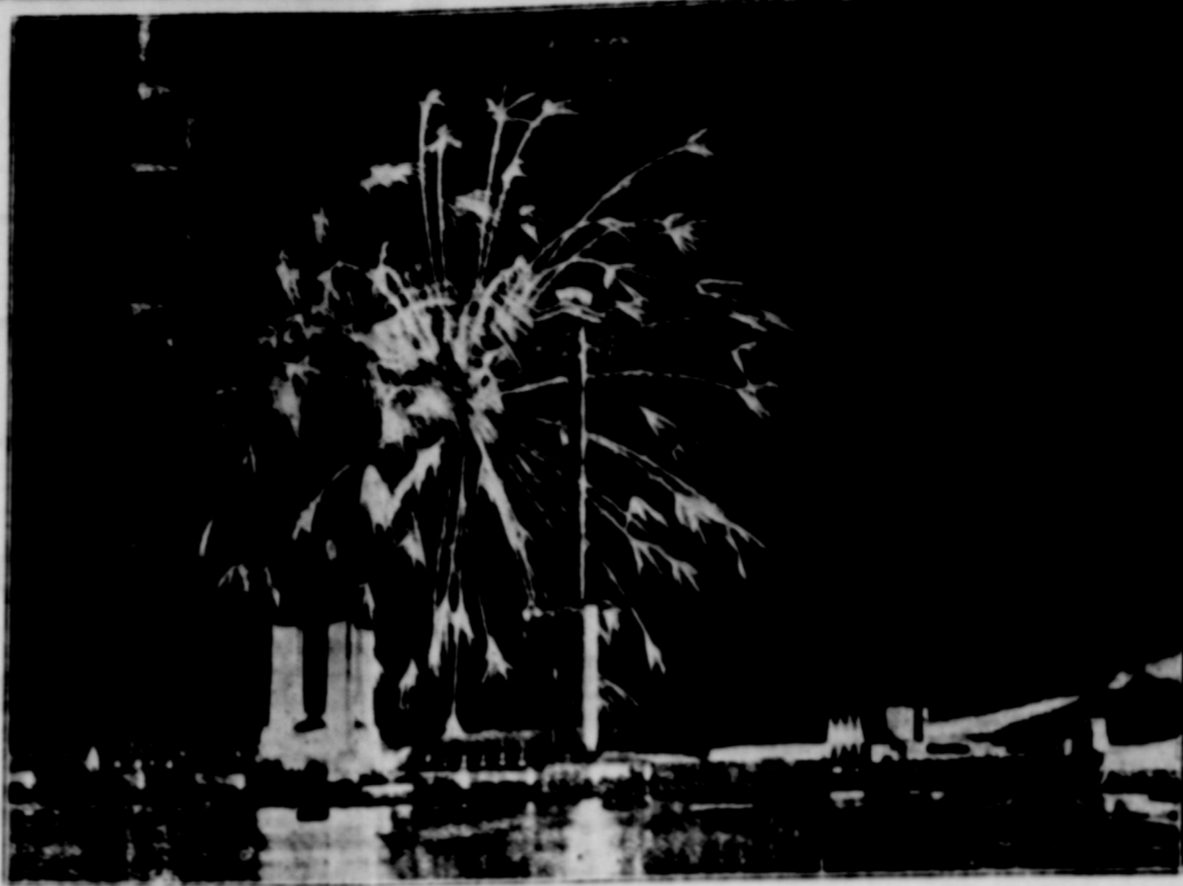

POLITICAL TRADING

ANOTHER political year is here and with the approach of the campaign it behooves the good citizen to take a greater interest in the affairs of the machinery that gives us government.

Politics is good or bad as we make it. Too often it is bad. One of the evils that has grown up in practice to make it bad is political trading—one political party swapping off one of its candidates to the other party; "you vote for our candidate for such-and-such an office and we'll throw our support to yours for another place on the ticket."

Political trading is playing the game unfairly, playing one's own nominees falsely—this, quite often, the better to serve the ends of worthless politicians and corrupt gangs and machines.

It is not necessary to go afar to see the unhappy results of political faithlessness, which we know as political trading. No particular town, city, county or state has a monopoly on the practice, however. And the evils are readily apparent. A political group that will sell out its own candidates certainly will not refrain from selling out the people.

It may be smart politics, but political trading is traitorous, despicable. It can only result in political turpitude. And, of even more importance, inefficient government, corrupt and undependable.—Farm News, Colo.

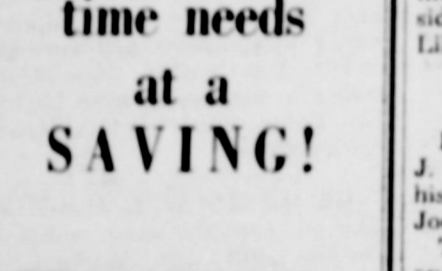

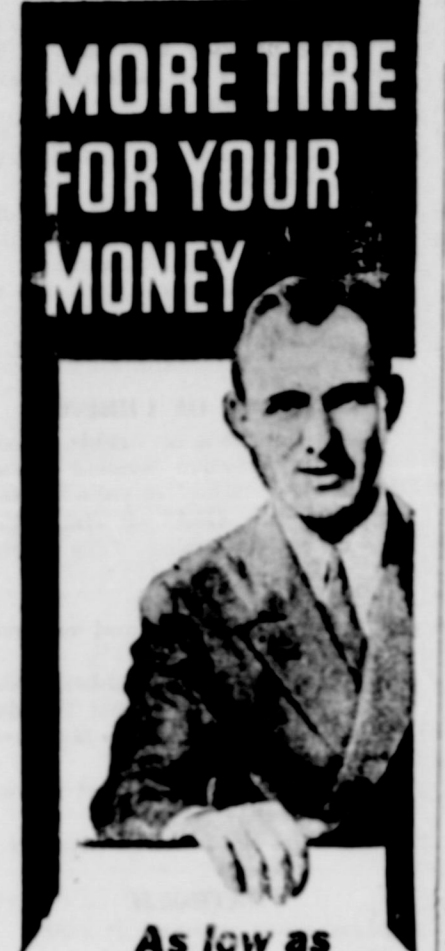

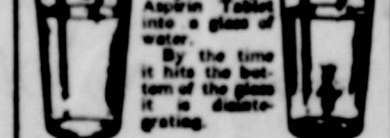
