Foreign countries which now have only impersonal commercial exhibits in Chicago will be encouraged to become an integral part with Texas in the celebration of an epoch in which their own ancestors held imperial sway. The flags of France, of Spain and Mexico, as well as the Texas Republic, the Confederacy, and the United States, have all ruled over the land in which the Centennial is being created today, and for that reason the exposition will be distinctly international in character.

The greates advantage possessed by the Centennial, however, is that, while depicting the progress of the past, it opens the door to a future of munificent promise. Texas has only barely begun to expand to the potentialities of its resources, and it has been reliably estimated that a successful Centennial celebration will bring not only millions of visitors but probably a million new residents to the State. CRIME BEGINS AT HOME

(Editorial from Rotarian Magazine)

Clarifying the channels of justice is important. So is "clamping down" on law-breakers, especially such desperadoes as Dillinger. But such efforts do not eradicate crime, only the criminal. Jailing the lawbreaker or sending him to the electric chair disposes of him, but what is the net social gain if two restless youngsters immediately aspire to the underworld role he vacates?

Here, then, is the nubbin of the whole crime problem, notwithstanding the expediency and necessity of coping with existing crime.

Even a cursory glance at the picture reveals that youthful criminality is on the increase. The recent growth in the United States' annual thirteen-billion-dollar crime bill is due not to the hardened criminal whose ranks are thinning, but the youthful recruit. Statistics from England and Wales bear that out, for there forty-two percent of the persons found guil y of indictable offenses in one year were under twenty-one

The psychologist and criminologist have charted the field, but when they are through the problem comes back home, to the community, the family, the individual. And there it will stay-until solved.

WHY YOUTH GOES WRONG

"The two dominant impulses of youth are toward activity and toward some kind of collective association. Our failure to provide for these two impulses under the changed conditions of rural as well as city life, is at least a partial measure of why we are getting unsatisfactory results in character development."-Dr. John Dewey in Rotarian Magazine.


