

Deer Season Nov. 1 To 16th, Then Bear and Quail

Last Friday, October 26, marked the opening of the season for the hunting of migratory waterfowls under the new game laws, which permits the killing of such fowl only on Friday, Saturday and Sunday of each week, and the season will close on December 30. This period is in effect throughout the United

Every hunter of migratory waterfowls over 16 year of age is now required to have in his possession a federal migratory bird hunting stamp, which may be purchased at the post office in all county seat towns, and must be attached to the hunting license. These stamps cost \$1.00 each and the proceeds from their sale will be used in a contemplated program of waterfowl resto-

The stamp does not exempt the hunter of migratory waterfowl from complying with the state laws and federal regulations. 

Judge Johnson called for all gost protest because the government wasn't buying "mutton goats." A committee was appointed to meet with the executive committee of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association at Mason. They did-and got up on the horse behind the association president.

When they met with President Kincaid and government men in San Angelo, Mr. Kincaid asked that our "mutton sheep and goats" be pur-chased. He was voted down on the same request in Denver.

Goat men should have gotten on their own horse-or burro-and asked that mutton sheep be passed up in the government buying. and the chevons or "mutton goats" be bought, as they were overstocking the goatman's range just as old ewes were overstocking the sheepman's

The goatmen must get out and fight for their part of the "apples" the government is handing around to the cowman, sheepman, farmer, cotton raiser, corn, wheat and hog

Goat men and their goats have been at the little end of very gov-ernment and commercial deal long enough.

Don't you think so, Mr. Vice President Garner? The Sheep and Goat Raisers' As-

sociation was organized by a bunch of goat men at Del Rio for the needs of the goat men at that time. took the sheep men in as a sidekick. In naming the organization we split. Some thought the goat should come first; others the sheep I was called to take the chair by the late J. B. Murrah, who wanted "goat" first. A vote was demanded and a tie resulted. I, a "dyed-inmohair" man cast the deciding vote
