## State Emergency Program is Under Way at This Place

Upon the approval by the Texas Relief Commission for an emergency educational program to be conducted in Sanderson, the work got under way this week. Seven teachers have been employed for this work.

Five teachers are conducting adult classes in cooking, sewing, and home nursing. These teachers are Mesdames H. R. Laurence, Ervin Grigsby, Kenderick Harrell, Ray Morris and Miss Myrtle Harrell. The classes meet every day, and night classes are also being held, with Mrs. Ervin Grigsby in charge of this work.

In the high school two classes are being offered in English by Mrs. McDuffy Kessler. These classes meet five days a week, Mrs. Kessler teaching two classes each day, one from 1:30 to 3, the other from 7:30 to 8:30 p. m. About twenty adults are enrolled in the English classes. No text books are required in this course and all work is done in class.

Mrs. Walter Grigsby has charge of the kindergarten work and has two classes each morning. Children from 3 to 5 years of age are taken in this class.

These classes will resume work after the holidays, Monday, December 31st.

Approval by the federal bureau of public roads of a highway construction program estimated to cost \$4,420,000 was announced the first of the week in Austin by the State Highway department. The work will be paid for from funds allocated by the federal government for the year 1935.

The program embraces 79 road and bridge projects among which are listed that portion of Highway 3 through the eastern part of Terrell county, starting at the Val Verde county line and running west nearly to Dryden. This road will be graded and surfaced.

The highway department reports preparation of plans and specifications on the projects would be started immediately and an early awarding of contracts sought.

Will Install Telescope in McDonald Observatory Soon After the Holidays

Fl. Davis, Dec. 19.—(TPN)—A 12-inch telescope arrived at the McDonald observatory this week which will be mounted within the observatory dome soon after Christmas.

This telescope will be used by Drs. F. E. Roach and Theodor Innes, astronomers studying "sky brightness" at the observatory this winter. The two astronomers have concerned themselves with making photo electric tests of the variable stars during their stay at Mt. Locke.

The large 8 1/2-inch lens, to be turned out by the Corning Glass Works, will be completed about the middle of 1936. The installation of this great mirror will mark the completion of the McDonald observatory. Astronomers will start their scientific work as soon as the 12-inch instrument is set up.

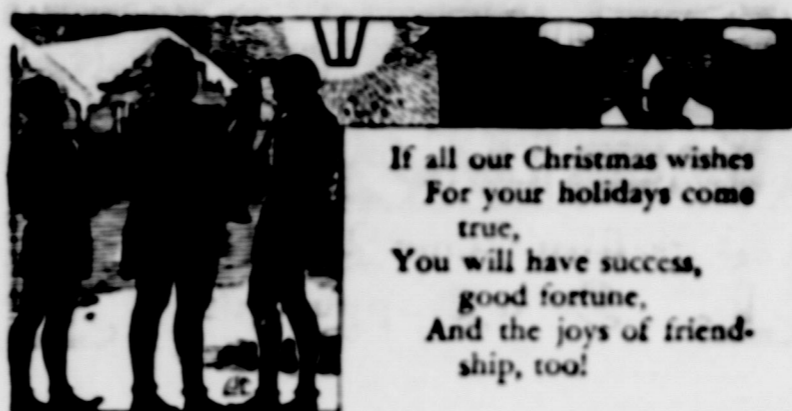

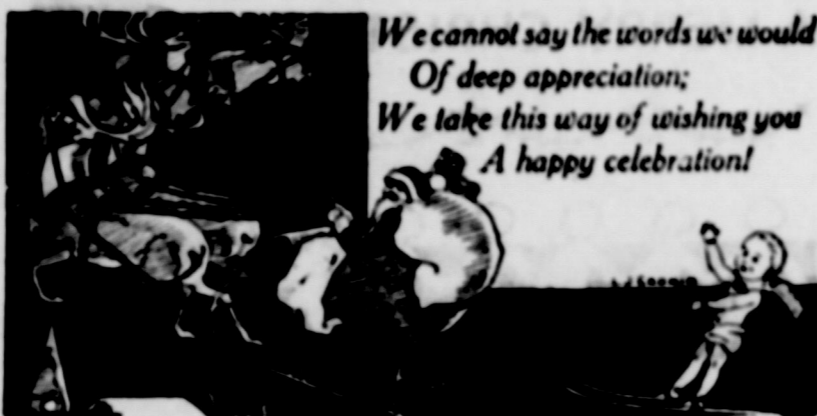

Helpful Household Hints

By BETTY WEBSTER

- C—cranberry jelly H—hot consomme R—roast goose I—rich potatoes S—salad T—tasty gravy M—mince pie A—apples S—weets

There's a magic sound to the word "Christmas" which somehow seems to foretell delicious food. Suppose we use the above semi-acrostic as a basis and, today plan the all-important holiday dinner.

Of course, in the order of things, we must serve the consomme first. Home prepared soup stock may be used for this or one of the prepared soups or bouillon cubes. Salt wafers, plenty of crisp celery and olives accompany this course.

Then because this dinner is unusually heavy it is best to serve the main course and the salad next. The goose is the time-honored fowl for Christmas dinner, although turkey is a popular substitute among people who find the former too rich. However, since turkey is prepared just like chicken we'll discuss the preparation of the goose.

Dressing the Bird The selection of a young fowl is the first requisite, then clean it, remove the pin feathers, singe, scrub with soap and water on the outside and wipe out with a clean wet cloth. Dry carefully and fill with dressing.

Some people like a dressing of apples and bread crumbs. For this a cup of chopped apple, half a cup of seedless raisins and two cups of dry bread crumbs seasoned with a scant teaspoon of salt and pepper moistened slightly with warm water (about a quarter of a cup) will be

delicious. Rub the goose inside and out with salt, fill with the dressing and truss as a turkey. Roast in a moderate oven, allowing fifteen minutes to a pound, until done. Baste every 15 minutes first with warm water, then with the grease in the pan.

Mashed potatoes and candied sweet potatoes, cabbage salad, and cranberry sauce or jelly should be served with the meat.

For dessert, mince pie or plum pudding is ideal. Coffee may be served with the dessert or later. Bowls of fruits and nuts may be placed on the table.

RECIPES Oriental Chicken

- 1 cup grated pineapple. 4 tablespoons melted butter. 6 tablespoons flour. 1 1/2 cups chicken stock. Salt, Pepper. 3 cups diced chicken. Chopped almonds. Toast.

Cook the pineapple in the butter until heated; add the flour and blend until smooth. Add the chicken stock and season to taste; cook, stirring constantly until it boils and thickens. Add the chicken, pour on toast and sprinkle with chopped almonds.

Yorkshire Pudding

- 3 pounds prime roast of beef. 1 pine of flour. Pinch of salt. 3 eggs well beaten. 1 quart of milk.

Wash and season meat; place in a covered pan and roast until nearly done. Mix flour, salt, eggs and milk and pour over meat about thirty minutes before removing from oven. Serve hot.

Austin.—Reports from widely separated parts of Texas show that influenza is on the increase, according to reports made to the State Department of Health. It is expected that by the last of this month over 700 cases will be reported in Texas.

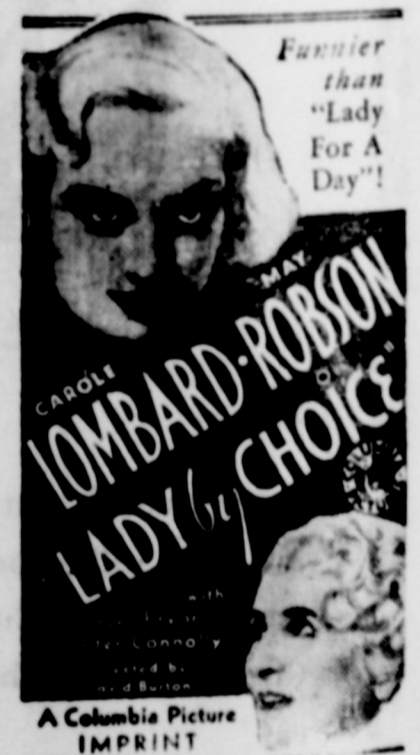
