

EDITORIAL COMMENT

A NATURAL RESULT

(El Paso Morning Times)

"Huey Long had it coming to him." This was the remark most frequently heard Sunday night and Monday as the people read the Times' extra and regular editions reporting the shooting of the Louisiana senator by Dr. Weiss, the ascetic young physician-specialist whose father-in-law Huey Long was about to ruin politically by abolishing his district judgeship.

The Times agrees that "Huey Long had it coming to him." This does not mean that we approve of the assassination of Huey Long or of anyone else. It means that Huey Long in creating and maintaining his absolutism in Louisiana, had committed a great number of cruel and vengeful acts against people either because they stood in the way of his rise to power or because they opposed him; and in consequence of these acts an attempt against his life was to be ex-

Long knew this. He realized that he had earned the hatred of many who thought they had been wronged by him and that at least some of the many would like to kill him. He often spoke of this. He even related on the floor of the senate an alleged plot to assassinate him. He went nowhere without his armed guards-gun-carrying bullies, eager to shoot at the first sign of menace to their master. Their eagerness was attested by the way they stood over Dr. Weiss, pumping bullets into his body after he had already been shot down and lay helpless on the floor.

It is not surprising that someone finally did what many had been wanting to do. That it had not been done sooner, by others, is probably explained by the fact of the armed guards; by the fact Austin as the solons prepared to that whoever attempted to kill Long would himself certainly be slain. In and Around the Home INTERESTING ITEMS PICKED UP HERE AND THERE

The five food elements needed to properly nourish the body are protein, fats, carbohydrates, minerals and vitamins. Vegetables supply some of all, but more of the minerals and vitamins, and also cellulose, or roughage.

While the latter has little fuel alue it is most essential because of its mechanical effects upon the intestinal tract.

Use all edible parts of vegetables. If you use lettuce for the salads and find some outer leaves unattractive, these may be washed and used in soup along with the outer leaves of cabbage and pour into sterilized jars and seal. other vegetables. Water in which pared and leafy vegetables are cooked should be used for soup.

Before heating milk in a sauce pan, rinse the pan with water and it will not scorch so easily.

A pinch of baking soda added to boiled syrup will help it from crystalizing.

If cooked frosting has boiled too long it may be made smooth

To keep cake fresh put a few dices of fresh bread in a box with he cake.

To grind raisins without sticking place food chopper in boiling water before using.
