Austin, meanwhile, was agog over preparations for the Monday reception to Jesse Jones of Washington and Houston, distinguished democrat and able RFC administrator. Bankers, insurance executives and politicians trooped to the capital to participate in the portrait unveiling and reception ceremonies. Talk of Jones as a possible 1940 democratic nominee for president is heard frequently among these groups. Jones was met at Dallas by a group of close intimates who rode to Austin and conferred with him for 5 hours. The group included Gov. and Mrs. Allred, Maj. Paul Wakefield, U. S. 
