

OLD AGE ASSISTANCE

This is No. 2 of a series of explanatory articles, which persons intending to apply fo the Old Age Assistance should read carefully. Compliance with the rules laid down will expedite matters considerably.-Editor

Austin.-Applicants should be able to prove their yearly income because the old-age assistance law provides that \$360 yearly for single persons and \$720 yearly for married couples must be the total of revenues received by applicants from all sources including the State aid, according to Orville S. Carpenter, executive director-designate of the Old-Age Assistance, indiscussing the new






