1830.—Law of April 6 was made effective, practically forbidding further American colonization of Texas; sending Mexican soldiers into Texas; establishing customs houses at ports to tax Texas trade with New Orleans.

1836-Santa Anna advanced arriving at San Felipe Apr. 7.

1836-As Santa Anna arrived at Thompson's Ferry on April 11, Sam Houston began crossing the Brazos in advance southeast toward New Washington, Galveston Bay.

Austin.-No "pauper's oath" is required to obtain assistance under the new law. Orville S. Car- bur Garton, a prominent south penter, director of Texas Old Age Assistance commission, said this

"It is unfair to consider a man or woman a pauper when he or she has \$5000 to \$7500 worth of property and has \$500 to \$1000 in the bank. These are the maximum amounts of property and cash an applicant may have and still qualify for assistance. The larger amounts are for married applicants," he explained.

Broader qualifications would keep us from receiving federal aid. If our laws were changed to make everyone past the age of 65 eligible we could not obtain funds from Washington. Cooperation of the federal government is limited to only those states giving aid to

Fort Stockton, which state that the bodies of a woman and girl Old Age Pension the bodies of a woman and girl found in the Pecos river 6 years ago were positively identified as Mrs. Leta Bell Garton, 27, and her daughter, Joyce Lynn Roberts, 10. Sheriff Will Rooney placed Wil-Texas liquor dealer and ex-husband of Mrs. Garton, in the Pecos county jail after he was apprehended in Corpus Christi and turned over to Sheriff Rooney.

Deputy C. I. Miller of the Pecos county sheriff's office announced that the bodies were identified by Mrs. Mary Damron of Rising Star, Texas, mother of the slain woman, through clothing and rings found on the victims. The identifications remained secret until officers had made an arrest.

The body of Joyce Lynn Roberts was first discovered in the Pecos river on February 21, 1930, by a Mexican who notified Sheriff Rooney. It was while officers were searching for clues to the girl's death when the body of Mrs.

The girl wore a street dress and appeared to be about 12 years of age. Mrs. Garton's body was clad in night clothes and wrapped in a sheet. Bruises on the child's neck indicated she had been choked to

Both bodies were badly decom-

For the past six years officers in the case, and then a new angle would turn up for investigation by the officers. The Garton com-

preliminary trial was scheduled for yesterday morning.

Austin.--Utilizing the existing party machinery, built around the state Democratic executive committee and the county Democratic chairman, the national Democratic campaign organization recently named in Washington, has opened headquarters in the Austin Hotel, and begun a vigorous drive to get voters out to precinct convention on May 2.

Headed by Roy Miller of Corzation will concentrate on turning out a record vote for the Roosevelt-Garner ticket after the national convention is held at Philadelphia in June.

"Meanwhile, we are working through the organized party machinery," said Miller, "to turn out an impressive attendance of Texas Democrats at the precinct and county conventions. We will also seek to raise sufficient funds to finance a suitable campaign headquarters in Philadelphia for the vice president, Mr. Garner, feeling that Texas will want to do the honors suitably for its only vice president in history. We anticipate a tremendous Democratic majority in Texas, and a strong Roosevelt-Garner delegation to the Philadelphia convention."

After the national convention, Miller's organization will begin its real job of raising funds in Texas for the Democratic war chest.

GAS RATE CASE-

A sweeping victory for the Texas railroad commission and the gas consumers of Wichita Falls marked the decision of Judge Ralph W. Yarborough of the 53rd district court here in the celebrated Wichita Falls gas rate case. but prolongation of the litigation was indicated when the Community Natural Gas Co., a Lone Star subsidiary, filed a motion for new trial, and indicated it will appeal. Despite the finding of a jury, favorable to the company, after 8 weeks of testimony, the court ordered refunds amounting to \$4 per year to Wichita consumers from Dec. 1, 1933, and reduction of the gas rate from 671/2 cents to 61 cents per 1000 cu. ft., the rates ordered by the railroad commission. Attorney General Bill Mc-Craw promised to expedite the appeal, in order to hasten the effectiveness of the reduction, if it is sustained. The Wichita Falls rate case, when finally decided, probably will set a legal precedent for many other Texas cities seeking lower gas rates.

PENSION FACTS-

Posturing office seekers, who glibly promise "30 a month pension for all the old folks" and carp at the restrictions set up under the state law which requires applicants to show need for a pension, might well examine the constitutional amendment, the state law itself, and the regulations of the federal social security board, which puts up half of the pension money. Under the terms of the federal social security act, states qualifying for the federal constitution must meet the regulations of the board, which limits its aid to "aged, needy individuals." Any blanket pensioning of all persons over 65 by Texas or any other state would immediately deprive the pensioners of \$15 per month each, the federal contribution. Investigation of applicants, required by Texas law, is also a requirement of the social security board. The existing setup for pension administrationin Texas was submitted by Director Orville Carpenter to the board in Washington, and Its approval obtained, before it was organized, fulfilling another requirement for federal funds. The total applications for pensions have reached 145,000. Federal census figures indicate fewer per-


