ONE KICK AWAY. If former Texas Tech and Dallas Cowboys' placekicker Lin Elliott ever decides to write his autobiography, "One Kick Away" might be an appropriate title.

Last year, Elliott was the toast of the town--after his usual slow start. He finished just one field goal (one kick) away from leading the National Football League in scoring in his rookie year--no small achievement, against the premiere kickers in today's game.

In Super Bowl XXVII, the Waco native tied a record with seven successful point-after kicks, and scored 13 of the Cowboys' 55 points.

During the course of the season, Elliott set a new Dallas record by kicking 13 consecutive field goals, and the streak included some kicks beyond the 50-yard mark.

He had kicks that won ball games--others that gave the Cowboys breathing room toward the end of the game. His kickoffs regularly were deep in the end zone and very seldom returned.

Dallas fans probably recall that former kicker Ken Willis seldom got a kick to the goal-line, and his were almost always returned.

After the half, Portales kept the ball for 11 minutes and scored after converting two critical fourth and short situations by offsides on the Chiefs.


Those New Mexico offsides calls really hurt the Chieftain effort.

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

This new section provides that, in addition to the general obligation bonds authorized to be issued and sold by the Veterans' Land Board (the "Board") by sections 49-b (\$950 million) and 49-b-1 (\$1.3 billion) of article III, the board may provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not to exceed \$750 million to provide financing to Texas veterans. \$250 million of the bonds authorized by this new section shall be used to augment the Veterans' Land Fund (the "Land Fund"). The Land Fund shall be used by the Board to purchase lands situated in Texas owned by the United States government, an agency of the United States government, the State of Texas, a political subdivision or agency of the State of Texas, or a person, firm, or corporation. The lands shall be sold to veterans in quantities, on terms, at prices, and at fixed, variable, floating, or other rates of interest determined by the Board. Lands in the Land Fund that are offered for sale to veterans and that are not sold may be sold or resold to the purchasers in quantities, terms, prices, and rates of interest

determined by the Board. New section 49-b-2 creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II (the "Housing Fund II"), and \$500 million of the general obligation bonds authorized by the section shall be used for the Housing Fund II. The Housing Fund II is a separate and distinct fund from the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund (the "Housing Fund") established under section 49-b-1 of article III. Money in the Housing Fund II shall be administered by the Board and shall be used to make home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within this state in quantities, on terms, and at fixed, variable, floating, or other rates of interest determined by the Board. The principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by this section for the benefit of the Housing Fund II shall be paid out of the money of the Housing Fund II. The principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by section 49-b-1 of article III for the benefit of the Housing Fund shall be paid out of money in the Housing Fund. If there is not enough money in the Land Fund, the Housing Fund, or the Housing Fund II, as the case may be, available to pay the principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds authorized by this section or by sections 49-b or 49-b-1 of article III, there is appropriated out of the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal of, and interest on, the general obligation bonds that mature or

become due during that fiscal year. If the Board determines that assets from the Land Fund, the Housing Fund, or the Housing Fund II are not required for purposes of the fund, the Board may transfer the assets to another of those funds or use the assets to secure revenue bonds issued by the Board. The revenue bonds shall be special obligations of the Board and payable only from and secured by receipts of the funds, assets transferred from the funds, and other revenues as determined by the Board and shall not constitute indebtedness of the State of Texas or the Board. The Board may issue revenue bonds from time to time, which bonds may not exceed an aggregate principal amount that the Board determines can be fully retired from the receipts of the funds. The revenue bonds shall be sold in forms, denominations, and in installments, and bear a rate or rates

of interest as the Board determines. The general obligation bonds authorized to be issued by the Board by this section or be sections 49-b and 49-b-1 of article III shall be issued and sold in forms and denominations, on terms, at times, in the manner, at places, in installments, and shall bear a rate or rates of interest the Board determines. In the amendment, the term "violent offense" means murder, aggravated assault (if a deadly weapon was used or exhibited during the commission of the assault), aggravated kidnapping, or aggravated robbery. The term "sexual offense" means aggravated sexual assault, sexual assault, or indecency with a

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

article VII, section 17(a), of the Texas

Constitution to provide that, of the \$100 million currently appropriated by that section for the use of public institutions of higher education during each fiscal year, those institutions may also utilize this money to pay for acquiring, constructing, or equipping or for major repair or rehabilitation of buildings, facilities, other permanent improvements, or capital equipment used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises to the extent of their use for educational and general activities. For the five-year period beginning on September 1, 2000, and for each five-year period thereafter, the legislature, during a regular session that is nearest, but preceding, a five-year period may, by a twothirds vote of the membership of each house, increase the amount of the \$100 million constitutional appropriation for the five-year period. The amendment also reflects name changes that have been made to some of the institutions of higher education for which such funding is available. The amendment adds the Texas State Technical College System to those institutions eligible to receive such funding, but limits its allocation of the annual appropriation to 2.2 percent of the total appropriation each fiscal year. The amendment also provides that each governing board authorized to participate in the distribution of money under article III, section 17, may also issue bonds and notes for the purposes of refunding bonds or notes issued under that section or prior law for the purposes of acquiring capital equipment, library books and library materials, paying for acquiring, constructing, or equipping or for major repair or rehabilitation of buildings, facilities, other permanent improvements, or capital equipment used jointly for educational and general activities and for auxiliary enterprises to the extent of their use for educational and general activities. The amendment deletes language in article III, section 17, which authorizes the legislature to designate a single agency to issue such bonds or notes in lieu of the governing bodies, and to transfer to that agency the authority to collect and pledge money to the payment of such bonds and notes as directed by the governing body of each eligible institution. Funds appropriated under article III, section 17, may not be used for the purpose of constructing, equipping, repairing, or rehabilitat-

ing buildings or other permanent im-

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment that adds a new subsection (e) to article III, section 49-h, of the Texas Constitution. The new subsection provides that, in addition to the amounts authorized by subsections (a) (\$500 million), (c) (\$400 million), and (d) (\$1.1 billion) of section 49-h, the legislature may authorize the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds and may use the proceeds of the bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new corrections institutions, including youth corrections institutions, and mental health and mental retardation institutions and for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those corrections and mental health and mental retardation facilities. The amendment also provides that the provisions of subsection (a) of section 49-h, relating to the review and approval of bonds, and the provisions of subsection (b) of section 49-h, relating to the status of the bonds as a general obligation of the state and to the manner in which the principal and interest on the bonds are paid, apply to bonds authorized by this amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for projects relating to facilities of corrections and mental health and mental retardation institutions."

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 37 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the county commissioners court of a county to call an election to abolish the office of county surveyor. The office of county surveyor is abolished if a majority of voters of the county voting in the election approve the measure. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Legislature to provide for the issuance of bonds for the state financing of start-up costs for historically underutilized businesses. The amendment provides that the legislature by law may establish a Texas historically underutilized business capital growth and start-up fund. The money in the fund may be used without further appropriation and only for a program established by the legislature to aid in the start-up costs of a historically underutilized business, as defined by the legislature. To carry out the program, the legislature may issue up to \$50 million of general obligation bonds to provide funding. The legislature may require review and approval of the issuance of bonds, the use of the bond proceeds, or of the rules adopted by an agency to govern use of the bond proceeds. Bonds authorized by the amendment constitute a general obligation of the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the issuance of \$50 million of general obligation bonds for the recovery and further development of the state's economy and for increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents through state financing of the start-up costs of historically underutilized businesses."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature, by general law, to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of real and personal property used, constructed, acquired, or installed wholly or partly to meet or exceed rules or regulations adopted by any environmental protection agency of the United States, Texas, or a political subdivision of this state for the prevention, monitoring, control, or reduction of air, water, or land pollution. The amendment applies to real and personal property used as a facility, device, or method for the control of air, water, or land pollution that would otherwise be taxable for the first time on or after January 1, 1994. The amendment does not authorize the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real or personal property that was subject to a tax abatement agreement executed before January 1,

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to promote the reduction of pollution and to encourage the preservation of jobs by authorizing the exemption from ad valorem taxation of real and personal property used for the control of air, water, or land pollution.'

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 3 proposes a constitutional amendment to clear land titles in which the State of Texas relinquishes and releases any claim of sovereign ownership or title to an undivided one-third interest in and to the lands and minerals within the Shelby, Frazier, and McCormick League (now located in Fort Bend and Austin counties) arising out of the interest in that league originally granted under the Mexican Colonization Law of 1823 to John McCormick on or about July 24, 1824, and subsequently voided by the governing body of Austin's Original Colony on or about December 15, 1830. Title to such interest in the lands and minerals is confirmed to the owners of the remaining interests in such lands and minerals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim in a fractional interest, arising out of the voiding of an interest under a Mexican land grant, to the owners of certain property in Fort Bend and Austin

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would prohibit a state personal income tax without voter approval and would dedicate the proceeds of any income tax, if enacted, to property tax relief and education. The amendment provides that a general law enacted by the legislature that imposes a tax on the net incomes of natural persons, including a person's share of partnership and unincorporated association income, must provide that the portion of the law imposing the tax not take effect until approved by a majority of the registered voters voting in a statewide referendum held on the question of imposing the tax. The referendum must specify the rate of the tax that will apply

to taxable income. The amendment also provides that a general law enacted by the legislature that increases the rate of the tax, or changes the tax in a manner that results in an increase in the combined income tax liability of all persons subject to the tax, may not take effect until approved by a majority of the registered voters voting in a statewide referendum held on the question of increasing the income tax. The referendum must specify the manner in which the proposed law would increase the combined tax liability of all persons subject to the tax. The legislature may repeal, or amend without increasing, a tax approved by the voters without submitting the amendment or the repeal to the voters. If the legislature repeals a tax approved by the voters, the legislature may only reenact the tax without voter approval if the effective date of the reenactment of the tax is within one year of the effective date of the repeal of the tax.

In subsequent years, not less than two-thirds of all net revenues of the tax shall be used to continue such ad valorem tax relief. The net revenues of the tax remaining after the dedication of money for reduction of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes shall be used for support of education. The maximum rate at which a school district may impose ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes is reduced by an amount equal to one cent per \$100 valuation for each one cent per \$100 valuation that the school district's ad valorem maintenance and operation tax is reduced by the minimum amount of money dedicated under the amendment, provided that a school district may subsequently increase the maximum ad valorem maintenance and operation tax rate if the increased maximum rate is approved by a majority of the voters of the school district voting at an election called and held for that purpose. The portions of the amendment relating to dedicating tax revenues to reduce the rate of ad valorem maintenance and operation taxes apply on or after the first January 1 after the date on which an income tax takes effect, except that if the income tax begins to apply on a January 1, the amendment applies to ad valorem

Apple Season Begins When Other Fruits Are Gone

By CARLA McKEOWN

the peaches are about played out for the summer, but then I remembered apples and got so caught up in the planning of apple recipes, that I forgot to miss the peaches!

I've been to the first football game of the season, felt the cool nip of autumn in the air. It is indeed apple season. While fresh peaches remind me of peach ice cream and fresh peach shortcake with piles of whipped cream, apples make me think of thick-crusted pies and hot spicy crisps.

There are several apple orchards in West Texas where you can pick your own fruit. Additionally, the farmer's markets often have baskets of freshly picked apples, and many grocery stores carry locally grown apples throughout the fall.

Now is the time to stock up on apples for the winter. Apples, when properly stored, can stay fresh for several months. Pick apples that are not bruised or blemished. Place the apples in a plastic bag, seal and store in the vegetable compartment of your refrigertor for several months. Check the bag from time to time for any fruit that has started to deteriorate.

Apples also can be frozen or made into jelly or applesauce for later enjoyment. To freeze apples, wash, peel, core and slice the fruit. To each quart of prepared apples, add 1/2 cup sugar and stir. Pack the apples in freezer containers or bags. (Leave 1/2-inch headroom if you use rigid plastic containers.) Seal the containers and place in the

Try the following recipes with this year's apple crop:

APPLE STUFFING 2 apples, peeled and diced 2 onions, chopped 2 stalks celery, chopped

10 cups whole wheat bread crumbs Pinch of dried thyme or 1/4 teaspoon chopped fresh thyme

1/2 cup milk

Mix the apples, onions and I started to complain because celery with the bread crumbs and with water. Add the lemon juice thyme. Beat the egg briefly with a and simmer until the apples are wire whisk in a separate bowl; add the milk. Stir the egg and milk mixture into the bread crumb mixture. Place in a large saucepan and cover large, heavy saucepan. Add about 2 inches of water and cinnamon stick. Cover and cook over medium heat. stirring often to prevent scorching. When apples are soft, remove cinnamon stick from pan and put apples through a food mill or strainer. Add sugar or sweetener to taste. Return the applesauce to the pan and heat just to boiling, stirring often. Pour the hot applesauce into hot, sterilized jars, leaving 1/2-inch headspace. Wipe the rims with a damp cloth and adjust the lids; process in a boilingwater bath for 15 minutes (pints) or 20 minutes (quarts).

Rural Fire Payments....

(Continued from Page 1) During the commissioners' meeting, Mayor Clarence Monroe was asked how much money the city needed per year to make their situation workable. His answer was "between \$26,000 and \$36,000."

Using the averages for the past three years, the motion passed by the commissioners should create approximately \$19,000 per year for Friona, \$12,800 for Bovina, and \$8,700 for Lazbuddie.

Since the estimated \$19,000 per year for Friona was still considerably below the city's required estimate, Commissioner Johnny Mars offered to find an additional \$5,000 from his precinct

The head-on confrontation between the City of Friona and Parmer County was brought about after the city had approached the county with a contract asking the commissioners to adopt by October 1, or else the Friona Fire Department would be forced to stop making rural fire calls.

Commissioners stated that they had a problem with liability implied in the contract. Mrs. Wilson said the contract shouldn't put liability on the county, as the City of Friona had all of the

equipment insured, plus worker's

comp on the firemen.

Rector asked the court if the court was legally-bound to provide fire protection for its rural residents.

County Attorney Charles Aycock said that as far as he could find, the county was not obligated. "A county MAY provide fire protection for its residents, but it is not legally bound to do so," Aycock said.

However, County Judge Bonnie Clayton stated that although not legally bound to provide such protection, she felt strongly that the county was MORALLY obligated

During the meeting, Monroe pointed out that 47 per cent of the county's tax base is located within the Friona School District, and it was the feeing that the Friona area was not getting its money's worth in services back from the county.

Strabismus

The dictionary definition of strabismus is "a disorder of the muscles of the eyes in which both eyes cannot be focused on the same point at the same time." The more common name is "crossed eyes."

Most often it's a parent or grandparent who first notices that a child's eye is turning in or out, usually before the child is six years old. That's a signal to see your eye doctor right away.

Because the condition is rarely outgrown, treatment should start as soon as possible. If strabismus is left uncorrected, the child--in order to avoid seeing double images-will suppress vision in the weaker eye. In time, the brain learns to disregard that image and the eye is largely unused. But if treatment is started in early childhood, correction is usually permanent and the eye will no longer wander off.

One method of treatment is visual training, teaching the child to coordinate the eye muscles. Glasses may be used to enhance results. Surgery is only a last resort if other methods of treatment fail.

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
