HISTORY OF SHORTHAND Ethel Breg

Shorthand was an ancient art, but was almost lost during more than seven centuries. In the first century, B. C., Tiro, secretary to the Cicero, invented a crude system of shorthand and called it "Brief Writing." In the fifth century there were 13,000 characters. The system of shorthand disappeared in the eighth century for reasons unknown.

The beginning of modern shorthand dates from 1588, when Timothy Bright prepared a list of several hundred words with abbreviations. The best production of the seventeenth century was by William Mason, and later followed by others.

Shorthand is a system of writing by symbols which so shortens the labor that the pen can keep up with the voice. The most rapid writer of "longhand" can write fewer than sixty words per minute, when the most competent writers of shorthand are able to write 250 words per minute.

Very many people learn the art of shorthand for personal converience, to save time.

There are four standards systems in general use. They are Isaac Pitman, Ben Pitman, Graham and Munson. Isaac Pitman was an Englishman and in England his work has been adopted practically to the exclusion of all other systems.

Among the non-Pitmanic systems the one which has been more successful and is more practical is the invention of John Robert Gregg, formerly an English citizen.
