



A drilling contract has been let between John T. Stockwell of San Antonio and Raul A. Basurto and Eduardo de la Fuenta of Bexar county, to reopen and drill the Bates-Pelps, Sides No. 1 well located in block A-4, survey 5, G. W. Turley grant, in northeastern Terrell county. The contract calls for drilling the well to a depth of 6,500 feet. Its present depth is 3,000 feet.

Just when actual drilling will be started on this test is not known as the Times goes to press. Basurto and de la Fuenta have subcontracted the lease to Thomas O'Brien of Bexar county, a brothed of the contractor who started drilling on the Goode No. 1 well. There are 4500 acres in the drilling block surrounding the well.
