LICENSES REQUIRED BY HUNTERS, TRAPPERS

O. Z. Finley, the game warden for this district, was a caller at this office the other day, and gave the following interpretations of the laws governing hunting. fishing and trapping:

To hunt every person over the age of 17 must have a hunting license, exceptions being persons hunting on their own land or land on which they reside.

All fishermen over 17 years of age must have a fishing license.

Trapping-Anyone taking the pelt of a fur-bearing animal for barter or sale, is required to first secure a trapper's license. No exceptions, as to age or sex.

A fur dealer is held responsible if he purchases a pelt of a fur-bearing animal from anyone but a legalized trapper.



Took Refuge in Wireless Shack

"About eight of us were hanging there," says Barney, " the heavy seas came tumbling over the top of the wireless rou drenching us with icy water. One man trying to cross the hate way to shelter on the bridge was washed overboard almost imm iately. We had left the wireless shack because we feared it met be carried away by the heavy seas, but the frequent icy drending convinced us that it would be better to take a chance and go better. Soon the room was filled to capacity with straggling survival.

Everything movable was thrown out to make room for them. The vessel quivered violently at avery wave, and water poured in the ventilator on the roof.

We had a few blankets in the room and we spread them over everyone they would cover. One unfortunate man was wedged in directly under the gaping ventilator hole, and he finally lost consciousness under the icy deluge from above-and died there. Reluctantly we moved the body outside to make room for someone else.'

Twelve Hours of Agonized Waiting


