Highway 51 Association Meet in Iraan, Discuss Plans for Direct Route From Big Bend Site to the Canadian Border

Members of highway 51 association held their regular monthly meeting in Iraan last Wednesday, meeting with the Lions club of that city. G. J. Henshaw, county judge of Terrell county, attended the meeting of the association, which voted that all county officials decide definitely the exact route of the proposed highway through their sections. The route will extend from Dryden, in this county, to Sheffield, to Iraan, and northward to the Oklahoma line. The road is paved from McCamey to within a few miles of Brownfield, in Terry county.

To further the program representatives from the south half of Highway 51 association voted to meet in McCamey at an early date to map out a definite route for the proposed highway. F. W. Gwin of Odessa reported briefly of a meeting held in Austin recently when association members filed a request for completion of the highway before the State Highway Commission.

Work on that part of the highway in Terrell county has been under construction for some time, and is listed as a WPA project. The stretch under construction is from Dryden to Sheffield and Mr. Henshaw, exhibited a plat of the proposed route at this meeting.

The next meeting of the entire association will be held in January, when delegates and their families will meet at the CCC camp in the proposed Big Bend Park. A committee, with Judge Henshaw, and which included J. T. Bickley of Iraan, was elected to plan the program.

With the opening of this route from Dryden to the Oklahoma line, representatives from towns along the proposed route declare it will be the most direct route into the proposed Big Bend Park, and will be of untold benefit to all concerned. The association, seeking state designation for the entire route, plans eventually to continue it north through the United States until it meets the Canadian border.

Total Donations In Terrell for Big Bend Park \$127

A total of \$127 has been collected to date, as Terrell county's contribution to the fund being raised for the purchase of land in the proposed Big Bend National Park, according to a report given the Times Wednesday by L. M. Baze, a member of the committee soliciting funds.

Of this amount \$15 was given by the members of the Sanderson Culture Club, and \$7 was contributed by residents of Dryden.

They Buy Seals To Save Others A Like Fate

Sanatorium, Texas.—Out at the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium, doctors, nurses and patients contribute annually in the Christmas Seal sale, according to Roy W. Henson, director of the Sanatorium Bureau of Correspondence, who has served as chairman of the seal sale in that institution for many years.

"Some of the contributions are small, it is true," Mr. Henson said "but the patients here, grateful for sanatorium care to aid them in their personal battle with tuberculosis, are eager to share in the work which the national, state and local tuberculosis associations are doing to wipe out the scourge of which they are victims. Their knowledge of tuberculosis comes by bitter experience, and their pennies for Christmas Seals are contributed gladly in the hope that others may be spared that experience."

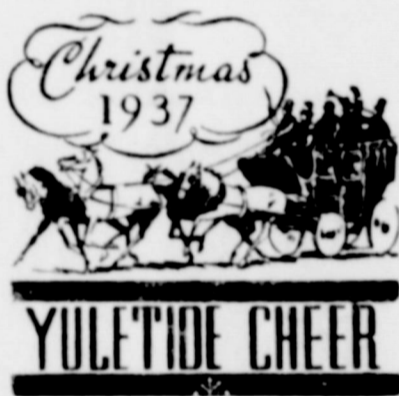
