Ginger Rogers, Katharine Hepburn Co-Stars in Feature Film "Stage Door"

One of the season's outstanding pictures comes to the Princess Theatre next Wednesday-Thursday, March 2 and 3. It is "Stage Door," which sums in striking manner the lives and careers of stage-struck girls everywhere...

The picture is based on a famous stage play that ran for a half year in New York, and offers the stars their finest screen opportunities to date. Most of its vividly absorbing action takes place in a theatrical boarding house where scores of eager and ambitious girls live and hops and sometimes perish while striving for fame behind the footlights.

From every walk of life they come: rich and poor, sympathetic and selfish, but all motivated by one common dream of stage success. Their heart-throbs and heartbreaks are woven into the shimmering thematic pattern of the story. Two of the girl, particularly, stand out from the others, Katharine Hepburn, wealthy debutante who seeks a stage career against her family's wishes...

And Ginger Rogers, a happy-go-lucky wisecracking youngster with no background and no money, but confident that she can succeed on her own. Around these two and dozens of others at the "Club" is built the drama of the story. Miss Hepburn's assurance in the power of money to gain her ends, the scheme of her family to terminate her theatrical ambitions; Miss Rogers' carefree opportunism, Adolphe Menjou's suave performance as New York's most important producer, and his pursuit of Miss Rogers; Gail Patrick's secret love affair; Andrea Leeds' tragic despair when Miss Hepburn gets the role she yearned for; Lucille Ball's attempts at golddigging, and the dreams and disillusionments of them all, are woven together in a gripping and memorable film that climbs to tense dramatic heights.

"Thunder Trail" Another Thriller By Zane Grey

The story of two brothers, separated for almost two decades—and brought together under stirring circumstances, is dealt with interestingly in "Thunder Trail," which will be the feature attraction at the Princess Theatre to-night and Saturday, Feb. 25-26.

The story is unfolded in a setting of roaring guns, thundering hooves and lightning action, in a location that brings back memories of the Old West. The main role is played by Gilbert Roland, who plays his first western part with dash and verve. Featured with him are Charles Bickford as a desperado chief; Marsha Hunt, as a miner's daughter; James Craig, as his brother; J. Carroll Nash as a Mexican prospector; Monte Blue as Bickford's lieutenant, and Barlowe Borland as an old miner.

Roland and Craig are separated in the early boyhood when Bickford and his gang raid their father's wagon train and kill off everyone but the two boys. They leave Roland for dead and carry off Craig, to whom Bickford has taken a liking. A Mexican prospector finds Roland and brings him up; while Craig is raised by Bickford.

Finally their paths cross when Roland and Naish wander into a little town which Bickford and his man are ruling and enter a struggle to help Borland and his pretty daughter, Miss Hunt, protect their mine. The brothers has a terrific fight together before they discover their relationship; after that they join forces to cleanse the town of Bickford and his gang.

Roland and Naish, with the help of Craig, finally let Bickford know that his murder of their father is going to be avenged, and in a series of smashing battles, they rid the district of all the outlaws.

Comedy, Romance Runs Riot in 'Fight For Your Lady'

Presenting a notable cast in a series of mad, hilarious adventures, "Fight for Your Lady" is a volley of thrills and laughs. This romantic comedy comes to the Princess Theatre next Monday night, Feb. 28, and deals with the love affairs of an American concert singer, John Boles, with the comedy resting mainly on the ample shoulders of Jack Oakie.

The action starts at a ringside of a wrestling match in London, and moves swiftly across Europe to wind up in a big surprise on a duelling ground in Budapest. Boles' companion at the wrestling match is Margot Grahame, British gold-digger, to whom he is engaged. Jack Oakie, manager of wrestler Gordon Jones, is bettin on Jones' opponent. Jones has agreed to lie down, but changes his mind and wins when he sees Margot place a bet on him.

From then on the picture blazes into a glow of complications at cyclonic speed, but permits the introduction of several musical numbers which come naturally into its plot.

A large cast of favorite players are included in the supporting cast, with Erik Rhodes filling the virile role of a "killer" duellist, with 45 victims as his score. Ida Lupino is cast as a fascinating entertainer in a Budapest night club.
