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HOLIDAY ACCIDENTS TAKE TOLL

With each holiday we see a number of deaths piled up against the automobile. During the Fourth of July 322 deaths were recorded and of that number 183 were chalked up against the automobile and its driver. There are drivers who, even after pleas and warnings have been issued, fail to see the danger of fast driving, driving on the wrong side of the road, failing to observe crossing, and the many other rules that drivers are prone to break. In an editorial appearing in the Rotarian Magazine we find some sound advice. The editorial follows:

We still have to learn how to live with the automobile. Both as pedestrians and drivers we are much at the mercy of other drivers. At the wheel, we are also at the mercy of ourselves, when our driving skill is inadequate. And in a sense, we are at the mercy of the machine.

For one thing, many modern motorcars can go faster than many modern drivers can think—and act. "Cannonball" Baker, professional record-smasher, who has driven more than 3 million miles, often at forced speeds, and who has had only one accident and that when his own car was standing still, says: "The average man's reflexes are not fast enough to handle the top speeds of today's automobiles."

Each driver has a "safe" speed. It is a balance of his personal reflexes against his car's speed. It is a speed that is right for him, given his physiological and mental makeup. For some exceptional drivers this "safe" speed may be high, but for many it is certainly not more than 40 or 45 miles an hour.

But the campaign for highway safety—while it focuses chiefly on eliminating auto deaths and maimings, as, patently, it ought to—has other aspects. For instance, bad conduct on the highways can pump up the blood pressure, perhaps can harden the arteries, and surely can upset the digestion, and with it one's peace of mind.

Here is a driver—and where is he not?—who feels that that car ahead, moving a little slower than his own, must be passed at all costs, that the light must be beaten, that any other driver on the road who seems to violate the rules or infringe on his pride, must be disciplined with inner anger and perhaps with downright discourtesy and cursing. Of course, he may cause no accident. He may leave the death and injury toll where he found it. But the resultant turmoil has a price—and he will pay it, in frayed nerves, in an over-worked heart.

Yes, we must not only make the highways safe for others, but we must also make them safe for ourselves. We must learn how to drive with serenity. Otherwise we are not driving the car. It is driving us.

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Drama of Early American Life Touches Heartstrings

Gripping drama, heart throbs and comedy mingle in a story told in terms of down-to-earth human characters in "Of Human Hearts," dramatic story of Lincoln's day which brings Walter Huston to the screen for the first time since his triumphs in "Dodsworth." The picture opens July 11-12 at the Princess Theatre.

"Of Human Hearts," like "Ah Wilderness!" was directed by Clarence Brown. Though the story is entirely different and the dramatic theme one of the greatest in literature, it shares with the O'Neill play the quality of sheer humanness, with characters so genuine that the audience veritably looks upon a cross section of American life.

Based on Honore Morrow's story of an itinerant preacher in a pioneer Ohio village, its principal characters are Huston, as Ethan Wilkins, the zealous clergyman; Stewart as his son, who prefers medicine to saving souls; and Beulah Bondi as the adoring wife, who tries to follow both blindly. Huston plays his character with restraint and a genuine human quality. Stewart is given an opportunity for some of the finest dramatic acting in his career, and Miss Bondi as the mother is a gripping figure in the drama.

The story starts before the Civil War. Father and son do not understand each other. There is a quarrel and the boy leaves for medical college. When the father dies the mother sacrifices everything she owns to educate her son. He becomes a great surgeon but forgets his mother until his feet are set on the right path by Lincoln. The story is told with many simple, homely characters; Charles Coburn as the bibulous, kindly village doctor, Guy Kibbee as the skinflint storekeeper, John Carradine in an amazing portrait of Lincoln, Ann Rutherford as the boy's sweetheart.

Leatrice Joy Gilbert, daughter of John Gilbert, plays the heroine as a child and Gene Reynolds plays Stewart in boyhood. Charley Grapewin as the horse trader, Clem Bevans as the comical Elder Massey, Charles Pack, Arthur Aylesworth, John Miljan, Gene Lockhart, Sterling Holloway, and Leona Roberts are other bright spots among the character players.

Though not a war picture, a flash of a cavalry charge of 500 horsemen and base hospital sequences are shown. Dramatic highlights are the fight between Stewart and Huston, the death of the clergyman, the tragic Christmas of the lonely widow, the great scene with Lincoln and the reunion of mother and son.
