We've also had visits from a little green hummingbird and a couple of pairs of goldfinches. But presently, the only feathered friends still hanging around are some loud bluejays and squawky grackles.

If I were asked to redesign the world, I would make Summer last for six months long.

Summer has a certain state of mind. We drink more lemonade in the Summer, but we switch to iced tea with our meals for the rest of the year. We don't make homemade ice cream except in the Summer months. I don't know why it wouldn't be possible to enjoy lemonade and homemade ice cream during the other seasons of the year, but it just doesn't seem right, does

We tend to eat richer, heavier foods during the cooler seasons of the year. The average American gains between eight to twelve pounds between the beginning of Fall through December.

Another Summer delight that I hate to give up is line-dried sheets. I realize that there are a lot of adult people alive today who have never even seen a clothesline, and they think that clothespins are for keeping skirts from falling off the hangers in their closets. Co. Amends Rural Fire Motion; City **Issues Protest**

problem of the payments for rural fire protection had been settled, Parmer County Commissioners amended the motion they had passed on September 13, and their amendment caused concern by the City of Friona, which is now responded to six per cent of the questioning the change.

(In the meantime, with the October 1 deadline having arrived, the city will continue to respond to rural fires, according to City Manager Paula Wilson, until the Farwell gets to keep their \$5,000

The amendment stated that in addition to the \$5,000 to be allotted to the Rhea-Hollene Fire Department, the remaining four departments were to also receive \$5,000 as an advancement on their pro-rata share. Then in December of 1994, the total moneys will be pro-rated and disbursed to Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie, based on quarterly reports submitted by these departments.



Mr. Gary Brown helped with getting him to the hospital. His wife Barbara helped me while he was there.


The hospital doctor and staff were so kind and good to us. Mr. Brown even sent someone from his bank to help us during our needs.


If you ever need help while out of town, the town of Friona is where you want to be.

Country Cooking Satisfies Appetite

By CARLA McKEOWN I visited my grandparents, Mr.

and Mrs. C.W. Vick, in Breckenridge last week. After all of my low-fat, low-cholesterol broiled chicken breasts, it was nice to have some old-fashioned country cooking for a change.

The first night I was there, we had roast beef with carrots, potatoes and gravy, biscuits, turnip greens and iced tea. The next night, it was fried round steak with mashed potatoes and gravy, potato rolls, cucumber salad and iced tea. For dessert both nights, we had cake and ice cream.

Of course, each morning we had fried or scrambled eggs, bacon and ham, toast with homemade plum jam, coffee and milk.

Needless to say, I haven't ventured over to the scales since I got back home.

These foods, as well as the favorites my mother fixed when I lived at home, are my comfort foods. Although I have developed my own cooking style since I've been cooking for myself, I still return to the foods of my parents and grandparents from time to time.

I tend to use very little fat-especially shortening--and not much sugar in my everyday cooking. But, on one of those gloomy, homesick kind of days, I'm apt to serve up a platter of fried chicken with Apple Surprise for dessert.

By all means, if you're on a special diet, follow the advice of your doctor, but if you can afford to splurge every now and then, try the following recipes for an oldfashioned Texas meal:

FRIED ROUND STEAK 1 large round steak

Worcestershire sauce, to taste Salt and pepper or lemon-pepper seasoning, to taste

1 cup flour Oil for frying

Tenderize the steak and cut into serving-sized pieces. Sprinkle each

piece with Worcestershire sauce and seasonings, and dip into flour. Heat 1 inch oil in a large skillet. Cook the steak in the oil, turning once, until dark brown and cooked through.

GRAVY 1 cup flour

2 cups milk

Salt and pepper, to taste Note: if you are making the

fried round steak recipe above, you can use any leftover flour for the gravy.

Mix the flour and milk in a glass or bowl. Drain any excess oil from the frying pan. Pour the flour mixture into the pan and cook, stirring, until it is of the desired consistency. Season to taste. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

MASHED POTATOES 6 to 8 potatoes

1 tablespoon butter or margarine Salt and pepper, to taste

Peel the potatoes and cut into quarters. Put the potatoes in a large saucepan and cover with water. Boil until soft. Drain the potatoes and place in a mixing bowl. Add a splash of milk, butter, salt and pepper. Whip with an electric mixer or mash by hand. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

APPLE SURPRISE 1 can apple pie filling

1 box yellow or white cake mix 1 stick (1/2 cup) butter or margarine

Pour the apple pie filling into a well-greased 8-inch or 9-inch square baking pan. Spread the dry cake mix evenly over the pie filling. Cut the stick of butter into thin pats and place the pats on the top of the cake mix. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until the top is golden brown and the mixture is bubbly around the edges.

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




said, "I love the Lord more than ever."

The Big "E"

To certain people who remember World War II, the big "E" was the U.S.S. Enterprise, but for most of us, the big "E" was the one on the top of the eye chart, followed by rows and rows of letters that got smaller and smaller.

Indeed, for some of us, the big "E" was the only one we could see clearly.

That famous old chart, the Snellen Chart, was designed more than 100 years ago to test the ability of school children to see the blackboard. It's still in use today in some places to test simple distance vision, but it doesn't really measure how well we see.

A complete professional eye examination does include checking visual acuity, but your optometrist goes on to examine the condition of your eyes and whether you are using them properly to see well. The retinoscope measures what lenses might be used to improve acuity. Precision instruments including the ophthalmoscope, slit lamp and tonometer are utilized to check for any signs of eye disease.

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
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
