Contract Let for Construction of Mexican School Building

PWA Contract Signed for Work to Begin Today, Dec. 30

At a meeting of the Terrell County School Board Thursday morning bids were received and opened on the construction of the new Mexican grammar school building and on other improvements to be made in the local school systems.

Low bid was made by the J. S. Clements Construction Company of San Angelo, whose figure for the complete job was \$41,680.00.

The next bid was made by Stubblefield-Cauliron Co. of Pecos who bid \$42,000.00, and C. L. Browning of San Antonio bid \$49,867.00. The three bids were all that were received due to the time limit between the time the PWA grant was received and the time set for bids to be received by the PWA office so that they might start work on the project before the end of the year, thus making it a 1938 project. At the time of the letting of the contract there was also a contract signed with a PWA official agreeing to start work on the project December 30. Roland of Alpine will be the construction superintendent representing W. C. Hendrick, architect, and C. M. Breeding of Sanderson was recommended by the School Board as superintendent of construction to represent the Board and Terrell County.

The construction contract calls for the building of a four-room brick for the Mexican school building, with the partition walls to be of the folding type so as to enable them to be rolled back, thus turning the entire building into one large auditorium. There will be a stage built in one end of the building with dressing rooms and rest rooms. The contract calls for new floors and repainting of all interior walls in the present Mexican school building. There will also be a new boiler and complete new heating system.

In the present American grammar school building all inside walls will be painted and the present stairway will be rebuilt. The band room and the manual training room will be walled and ceilinged with a special fiber board which will deaden sound. This will prevent the noise from these rooms disturbing other classes in the building. The restrooms in this building will be re-conditioned.

The present gymnasium will receive additions of dressing and shower rooms for both boys and girls. There showers will be supplied with hot and cold water supplied from a boiler independent of the main heating system. There will also be installed ample lockers for the players and others who use the dressing rooms and showers.

There is to be 250 new desks which are to be used as the need arises throughout the school system after the necessary amount have been taken for the new building.

Members of the School Board who received the bids, let the contract, and signed the PWA contract are W. H. Savage, R. H. Murrah and R. N. Allen.

Rainfall grew heavier to the east with 89 of an inch reported at Del Rio, which gave general relief, filling storage tanks and benefiting the ranges.

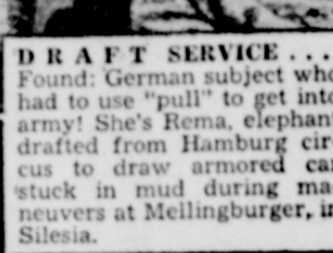

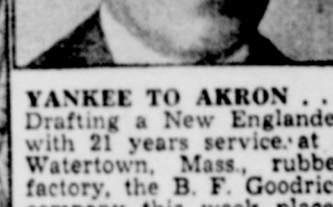

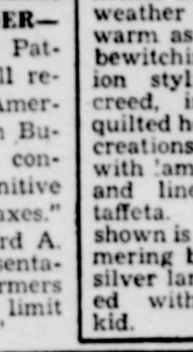

REGAL ROAST BEEF FOR NEW YEAR'S DINNER

Roast beef, in order to be at its best, should be cooked at a low temperature. Here is the way: Place the beef roll on a rack in an open roasting pan. Season it with salt and pepper. Do not cover the pan, and do not add water. Put the roast in a slow oven (300 degrees F.) and roast until done.

Beef roasts are served rare, medium, or well-done, as you prefer. A rolled rib roast cooked to the rare stage will require about twenty-eight to thirty minutes per pound in an oven at a temperature of 300 degrees F.; for medium it will require about thirty-two to forty minutes per

course, and practically any kind of vegetable or salad may be chosen with roast beef. A cooked vegetable and a crisp salad may complete the main

Seek Monies for Sanitation Research Work in Texas

Austin—To assist Governor-elect W. Lee O'Daniel's "industrialization program," the year-old Texas Building Sanitation Council will seek legislative approval of a \$50,000 to \$100,000 annual program for sanitation research, W. R. Woolrich, vice-chairman, said here today.

The twelve-man council, an outgrowth of a sanitation conference of municipal, health industrial and education officials here last spring, drew its proposal after an all-day conference Monday on the campus of The University of Texas.

The council will seek its funds from legislative earmarking and "personal gifts." Vice-chairman Woolrich added.

Engineering heads of the state schools are cooperating in the project independent of their schools and strictly as members of the council, it was pointed out.

Included in the research program would be "comprehensive studies" of water sterilization, chlorination, filtration and softening; utilization and sanitary disposal of sewage and industrial waste; expansion and control of refrigeration and air conditioning.

The program was mapped by the deans of Texas engineering colleges and the sanitary engineer of the State Health Department acting jointly as a research committee for the council.

Hundreds Attend Opening Christmas Display at Madrid

Editor's Note—The following article was sent to Mrs. Clyde Higgins from a niece who resides at the scene of the gigantic Christmas display, and gives an idea of what the citizens of Madrid have done to attract hundreds to their city each year during the holidays. By a Journal Staff Writer

From a remote spot in the old powerhouse at Madrid Gov. Clyde Tingley threw a switch at dusk Sunday that turned the little coal mining community into a gigantic and colorful Christmas display while hundreds of persons, many of whom are annual "pilgrims" to the village, marveled at the spectacle. It was a proud group of townstolk that escorted the governor on a tour of the village, with none willing to accept any special praise. They said it couldn't be done without the cooperation of the village's some 1200 inhabitants.

Memorial to Kaseman But there was a tinge of sadness among the citizenry with the official opening of the Yuletide season. In a short talk over a public address system from the living room of one of the homes, the governor asked all to stand in silent prayer in memory of George A. Kaseman, president of the Albuquerque and Cerrillos Coal Co., one of the originators of the "Lights of Madrid," who met a violent death early in the summer. Gov. Tingley termed the holiday scenes "more beautiful than ever—one of the prettiest sights in the nation."

He praised miners for the workmanship displayed in the spectacle under construction since early summer. More than 1,000,000 feet of cable were laid, and more than 40,000 lights were installed.

Many New Features Besides the City of Bethlehem scene on the hillside, with the angles, the Wise Men, Mary and Joseph, many new features have been added. There are pyramids and the Sphinx representing the land of Egypt. Fires of cedar rimmed the valley when Gov. Tingley and his party stepped from a reception by the community at the Lamb Hotel.

Choir music issued from a floodlight scene of choir boys and from the Bethlehem scene, while gay holiday music poured from loudspeakers in Toyland, with its miniature train operated by Santa Claus, characters of the cartoon strips and Mother Goose tales. Gov. Tingley estimated nearly 80,000 will visit the city this season. "Mr. Oscar Huber, manager and the people of Madrid the extending a invitation to the world to see this wonderful Christmas setting," the governor said.

November Banner Safety Month for Texas Motorists

Austin—Texas scored its banner safety month in November when the lives of 83 pedestrians and motorists were saved, compared with the records of the corresponding month of 1937. State police said the record shattering figures, which showed that 137 persons were killed in traffic crashes last month, made "wrong guessers" out of safety statisticians who had predicted a toll of 165 for that foot-ball-fanned period. Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr. referred to the sharp decrease as "the biggest encouragement state officers have had in many months." Faced with the prospect of unfavorable weather, heavily trafficked roads and shortened periods of clear visibility, highway patrolmen, Director Garrison said, strengthened their vigilance along death "corridors" in November and worked many extra hours in their efforts to discourage speeding and reckless driving. Even the Thanksgiving holiday death record was halved, he said. With 36 pedestrian deaths listed on the November crash reports—19 less than that month last year—the safety director declared that the education of those who walk the streets and highways is the most likely way to make headway in pedestrian

safety work. "With nearly 40 pedestrians killed each month in Texas," Director Garrison said, "there is every need for increased vigilance on their part. Motorists, contrary to many opinions, are rarely at fault when a pedestrian is struck down by a vehicle." Selective enforcement, the safety department's remedy for decreasing serious and fatal vehicle collisions, will be continued "more intensely than ever before," Director Garrison continued. He said necessity for a strict and impartial program of that type had been proved in the general 22 percent death drop maintained in Texas this year.

Education of Public to Help Prevent Disease

Austin—"Guard Against Syphilis" is the slogan of National Social Hygiene Day to be observed throughout Texas on February 1. The day will be marked by meetings to highlight community campaigns against syphilis and will focus public attention on vital steps in the conquest of syphilis, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Evidence of interest in the forthcoming event, the third annual observance in the current attack on syphilis, point to a larger demonstration than those of previous years, Dr. Cox said. Increased activity and interest

on the part of official and voluntary health and welfare agencies, civic groups, service clubs, women's organizations, churches and schools is expected.

Defining the objectives of the 1939 attack in terms of the slogan, these points were said to underly present national, state-wide and community planning in social hygiene:

Guard against syphilis by telling the American people about this dangerous disease—how it can be prevented and cured.

Guard against syphilis in youth, the age of greatest incidence, by strengthening the efforts of church, home, and school to provide better facilities for sex education, character development, and preparation for marriage; and by correcting community conditions which threaten the health and welfare of young people.

Guard against syphilis in marriage and childhood by encouraging good laws—and their observance—requiring examinations for all those about to marry and for all expectant mothers.

Guard against syphilis by attacking quackery, an arch-complice of disease.

Guard against syphilis by supporting adequate voluntary and official health programs, both state and local.

NEW COMEDY MIRTHQUAKE OF LAUGHTER

Budding comedians would do well to follow the precedent laid down by famous funmakers of the movies and adopt a personal "prop."

That's the recommendation of Harold Lloyd, whose new film "Professor Beware" shows Saturday night only at the Princess Theatre. And he cites examples of his own famous horn-rimmed spectacles, Charlie Chaplin's cane, Harpo Marx's fuzzy wig, Bob Burns' Bazooka, and Jack Benny's ever present cigar.

Perhaps the most famous single object on the screen throughout the years has been the horn-rimmed, lenseless glasses which Lloyd employs on the screen. He first adopted them back in the two reeler days and they are still as much a part of his characterization in "Professor Beware" as they were originally.

The story of their adoption goes back to a day many years ago when he happened to witness a dramatic picture, in which the hero, a peaceful person, who wore glasses, suddenly became a raging tornado when aroused by the villain. Lloyd, looking for something to supplant his "Lonesome Luke" characterization figured the spectacles would create the impression desired, that of complete placidity, so he bought the first pair he could locate. The lenses were done away with immediately because of the light reflection.

After such an audit your doctor will assist you in making a health budget. This should include plenty of rest, fresh air, exercise, proper food, and moderation in the items used to excess in the past. If this is done you will not only add years to your life but will make these years more worth living and enjoyable.

Texans Buy Less Clothes in 1938 Than Past Year

Austin—Texans continue to buy less clothing than they did last year, the Bureau of Business Research at The University of Texas revealed here today.

Sales in dollars by Texas department, men's clothing, dry goods-apparel stores and women specialty shops during November declined under the preceding month. The slump, however, was slightly less than the usual seasonal amount from October to November. Aggregate sales during the first eleven months were slightly below those of the like period last year.

Reports from 104 representative Texas establishments indicate a decline in sales of 15 per cent from October and 4 per cent from November last year.

For the year-to-date the decline was 2 per cent. The proportion of credit sales again was slightly greater than a year ago, while the percentage of collections of outstanding accounts was somewhat smaller.

Association Says Post-Graduate Courses Aid to Students

Austin—Two-year post graduate courses in high schools for students who cannot go to college are suggested by the American Vocational Association. Such work is necessary, it is believed, to keep the average graduate, who is 16 years old, occupied until legally he can go to work two years later.

Miss Laura Murray, director of the Bureau of Industrial Teacher-Training at the University of Texas, who has just returned from the association's convention in St. Louis, Mo., reports her organization urges high schools to offer two-year post-graduate vocational courses for the young graduates who cannot go to college nor to work.

The recently established Wage and Hours bill pegs the minimum legal working age at 18, Miss Murray explained.

"This has created a 16 to 18-year old group for which there is much concern," she said. "The convention was generally agreed that high schools who are graduating their students at the age of 16 should establish post-graduate vocational training courses for the boys and girls who cannot go to college.

"The University's Bureau of Industrial Teacher-Training supports the establishment of a two year post-graduate course in Texas high schools. This work to be offered those graduates who are unable to attend college. A very definite campaign to that end is being planned by the bureau," she stated.
