TOLL LINE TO BE ADDED FROM HERE TO DEL RIO

O. H. McAdams, manager of the local Del Rio and Winter Garden Telephone Company announces that a new toll line is being built from Del Rio to Sander and will add greatly to present facilities.

The new line will just about treble the capacity of the system and will enable the local office to complete their long distance telephone calls much faster than in the past. Bracket space is now being made and brackets are placed to three or four miles this side of Dryden. This work will probably be finished by the middle of next week, Mr. McAdams said.

The company is also eliminating many trouble spots by placing new high poles at all crossings and other places where low wires might cause a delay in service.

CONSERVING WATER AND SOIL



Water conservation, of interest in all parts of the state, and of special interest to dry West Texas, is pictured here in three of its many forms, contour ridges, spreader dams and dirt reservoirs.

For 25 years Texas has been saving soil and water on farm lands through the use of terraces but in the last two years the Texas Extension Service in cooperation with the AAA range conservation program has turned its attention to water conservation on permanent pasture lands. In 1937 terraces, ridges, contour furrows, and similar measures were carried out on over 230,000 acres of Texas rangelands, and even a greater acreage was protected by these measures in 1938. During that two year period these practices were carried out on about 20,000 acres in Terrell County. For the

same period some 20,000 tanks were built in Texas with an aggregate water holding capacity equal to that of the great Buchanan Lake. In Terrell County were built 77 rock and concrete dams or "headers" and 61 dirt tanks.

The better distribution of watering places will lesson erosion brought about through trampling and destruction of grass by livestock going long distances to water. Stock traveling long distances to water create trails that develop into washes and gullies, causing increased damage from erosion and run-off.

Contour ridges, furrows, and spreader dams and terraces are structures to hold water on the land where it falls, catch grass seed that would otherwise be lost, and help prevent erosion and keep the water out of creeks and gullies.

Devil's River News—In his report as to matters pertaining to the Lions Club Auction and 4-H Boys Wool Show to be held in Sonora June 10, H. C. Atchison told Lions Club members Tuesday that seven counties were lined up for this year's show.

Hudspeth County News—The largest herd of cattle ever driven into El Paso was the Hueco herd a few days ago. The Hueco Cattle Company sold 4,863 steers which were driven from the ranch in the northern part of this county Tobe Helms manager of the 700 section ranch reports that there remains on the ranch 7,029 head of cattle.

McCahey News — McCahey's new \$40,000 public swimming pool, built with a WPA grant and a county-wide bond issue, was opened Tuesday.

The pool is modern in every respect and is considered one of the finest in this section of the state. It is 50 by 125 feet with a maximum depth of ten feet. It has a capacity of 265,000 gallons of water, which is kept pure by three pressure filters and a chlorinating system. The water is in constant circulation during the operating period.

Fort Stockton Pioneer—The Swimming team of the Ambassador Hotel, Los Angeles, widely known on the West Coast as an outstanding group of water performers, has been booked for two days of the Fort Stockton Water Carnival, June 9 and 10.

Sabinal Sentinel — Freight rates on livestock feed for the drought stricken areas of Southwest Texas were reduced two-thirds of the normal rates by the Texas Railroad Commission this week. This followed a hearing of approximately 150 dairymen, stockmen and county agents from nineteen counties.

Monahans News—A school building in the north side of town is being sought by residents of that section and a petition asking the school trustees to put up a building to accommodate elementary pupils of the fifth grade and under who live north of the tracks, will be presented at the next meeting of the board, it was reported this week.

Temple Dickson, left of Sweetwater, and Doyle Pevehouse, of Corsicana, bondsmen who effected Anderson's release from the Travis County jail, after the self-admitted lobbyist for \$30 pensions for the aged had refused to post his own bail and had remained in jail for a week. Anderson was held on charges of contempt of the House of Representatives, the outgrowth of the pensions campaigner's refusal to testify before a House Com-

mittee concerning his own and the Union's activities in soliciting dollar membership contributions from the aged, unless given a hearing before a full House meeting and the proceedings broadcast over a state network, which he offered to pay for. Representatives Dickson and Pevehouse joined in a statement declaring that "we are of the opinion that the old people of Texas are entitled to a lobbyist in Austin, if they want one, and if they want to organize and contribute funds in support of their own campaign and just cause, they have a constitutional right to do so. Why have the members of the legislature not objected to and jailed other lobbyists in Austin?"

N. Y. A. Girls Hold Outing At Caddo Lake State Park

Austin—Scenic Caddo Lake State Park stirred with the excitement and activity of more than 200 young women from fifteen East Texas Counties who are attending National Youth Administration resident centers. Girls came from Jasper, San Augustine, Lufkin, Nacodoches, Carthage, Gladewater, Mount Pleasant, Texarkana, and Marshall Resident Centers. These girls spend two weeks each month in NYA Cooperative Homes and study fundamental homemaking practices under NYA supervision.

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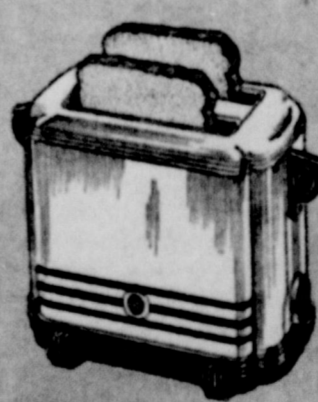

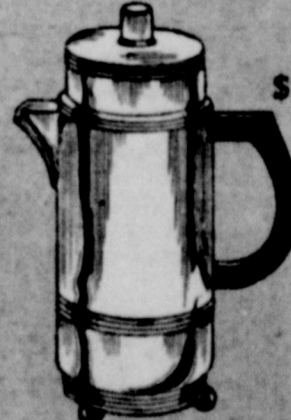

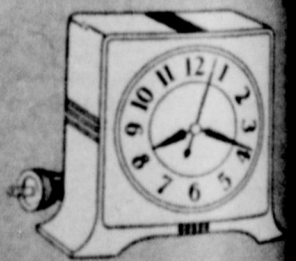

DIRECTOR PLAYS IN HIS OWN FILM

The Rev. Taft Holloway is in Pecos conducting the song service in a revival meeting being held at the Baptist Church there. W. M. Turner is pastor at that place.

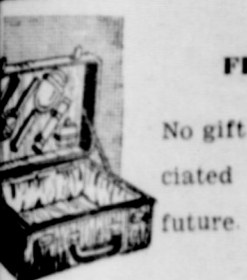

The supporting cast is one of the best seen in recent films. Edward Arnold is the suave munitions dealer. Charles Coburn has the role of a scientist. Joseph Schildkraut portrays the commander at the frontier post when war breaks out. Burgess Meredith is convincing as the idealist in the group of travelers who are caught in the conflict. The distinguished direction of Clarence Brown makes itself felt throughout the picture. "Idiot's Delight" will charm millions as a picture where it delighted thousands as a stage hit.
