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## THREE INJURED IN AUTOMOBILE WRECK SUNDAY

James Word, Durwood Hartsfield and Miss Ellen Appel were injured Sunday when their car left the highway and turned over in the bar ditch.

They were enroute home from Del Rio when the accident occurred, the front spring of the car breaking and allowing the fender to fall on the front wheels locking them. The car left the paving just beyond the bridge over Sanderson Canyon some 12 miles east of town. Mr. Hartsfield was driving when the spring broke but was unable to control the car because of the locked wheels.

Miss Appel received cuts and bruises and fractured the small bone in her left arm. Mr. Word received painful injury to his back and cuts on the face and body and Mr. Hartsfield received severe cuts around the mouth and part of his teeth were knocked out. They were brought to Sanderson by Mrs. James House and Mrs. John Glenn.

The car landed in the bar pit on its top with the wheels up in the air. It was completely demolished on the large boulders upon which it crashed.

M. F. Hill. It was taken three miles upstream from the mouth of the canyon in April, and was published recently in the El Paso Herald Post. The scene above is at the mouth of a side canyon which comes in from Mexico. The black vertical spot is a shadow, while the intense black spot near the tip of the cliff is the cavity under a natural stone bridge probably 1500 feet above the water. At the left, but not shown in the picture, is the entrance to beautiful Fern Canyon.

## Enrollment of Sanderson Schools Sets New Record

The second week of the 1939-1940 session of the Sanderson Public Schools marks the largest enrollment in the schools to date.

A total of 152 pupils has been enrolled in the Sanderson High School. These are divided into classes as follows:

7th grade, 33; 8th grade, 45; 9th grade, 24; 10th grade, 27; 11th grade, 23.

In the Sanderson American Ward School the enrollment by grades is as follows:

1st grade, 17; 2nd grade, 20; 3rd grade, 16; 4th grade, 31; 5th grade, 31; 6th grade, 19 making a total of 134.

In the Sanderson Mexican Ward School the enrollment to date is approximately 340 with the number of boys and girls about the same. The largest enrollment in any room is the 3rd and 4th grades, with a total of more than 60 while the high second room has a total of approximately 60.

Monahans News—A suit to end all suits in the Ward County County Seat squabble filed by Monahans Attorneys in July will be heard next Thursday, Sept. 14, before the Court of Civil Appeals in El Paso.

Fort Davis Dispatch—After being closed for several months, the Valentine telephone exchange, locally owned, was reopened in its former location, the Waterworks building. The long distance of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, which has been until recently in Bell's Garage, has been moved back also. Mrs. Jack Gray, formerly of Fort Davis, is the new manager and operator.

Big Bend Sentinel—Taxpayers of Marfa Independent School district having approved at the polls last week of a \$50,000 bond issue for school plant improvements, trustees this week continued steps to bring to a reality the building of a gymnasium as well as additional rooms and improvements at the Ward School.

Alpine Avalanche—The Texas Highway Commission Thursday began favorable consideration of improvement of Highway No. 67 connecting east and central Texas with the Big Bend and Davis Mountains after a delegation presented the needs of the project at a hearing.

Highway No. 67 is to be officially designated as the Big Bend Trail, and while most of the long route is already hard surfaced from Texarkana to Presidio, the delegation requested the closing and improving of three gaps.

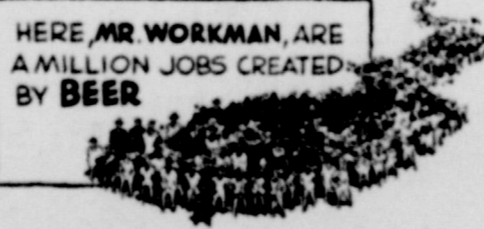

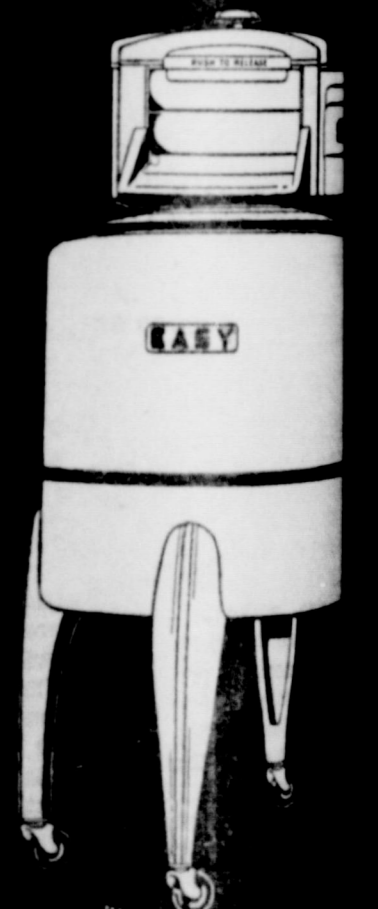
