## Anderson Band Odessa Friday Contest

Permian Basin's greatest contest will get under way 8 p. m. Friday afternoon. Bands in Odessa and will continue throughout Saturday and Sunday evening April 6th. Three bands with more than 1300 member musicians already entered the con-

test. High School Bands are from Grandfalls, Mid-Pecos, Kermit, Wink and Pecos. Judges for this event are John Johnson, Jacobs and Byrd. This contest will begin in the Junior High School building at 8:00 p. m. Saturday afternoon at 2:30 P. M. Sunday.

Bands organized within the district are entered from Sanderson, Kermit, Balmorhea and this contest will be held by the same set of judges. Junior High School Bands. Contest will be held in the Junior High School Auditorium; all begin at 8:00 A. M. Saturday April 6th.

Bands from high schools with enrollment under 250 pupils compete Saturday. April 6th beginning promptly at 9:30 A. M. in the auditorium of the Odessa School. Bands entered in contest are from Stanton, Fort Stockton, McCamey, Kermit, Grandfalls, Rancho and Lovington. N. M. Bands will be Messrs. Brandt, Bynum and Jacobs.

Schools with enrollment between 250 and 750 have entered bands from Midland, Monahans Odessa, Hobbs, N. M. This event will be held in the Odessa High School Auditorium beginning at Saturday afternoon. April 6th.

Crowning event of this contest, however, will be the Fly Field in Odessa Saturday evening, April 6th beginning at 8:00 P. M. Each of the bands entered will compete in a marching contest. Eight bands will be allotted to each side.

This stirring spectacle of bands, marching in all the glory that West Texas can put into such a spectacle, will be augmented interspersed with fire baton and many other spectacular events and spectacles. Climax of the evening will be when the more than 1300 dual band musicians will be used into one gigantic band and will render two numbers: "Honor March" and "God Bless America" G. That the Russo-Finnish pact has come to an unusual conclusion, that is for the Allies, there is discussion as to what Russia will do now. It is to the aid of Germany at the present time for Russia to remain neutral. In that capacity she is her limit of transportation facilities, supply the Reich with foodstuffs, oil and even with timber from Finland.

Such supply will not be sent for German needs, but above the normal that being received will be helpful to German foreign exchange. Military authorities of Germany are satisfied their troops hold the West Wall, and have ample reserves to meet Hitler's thrust through Belgium and Holland. Only in the event that the Allies should try to move through the Black Sea that Russian military aid be necessary. It is presumed this situation has been discussed between Hitler and Stalin. In connection with this prospect and the current situation, Hitler has had conversations with Mussolini.

Effort of the former is to Italy into closer relations with Russia. It is not understood whether Hitler wants his Axis partner to enter the war; he prefers to continue to back page)

## CONTRACT FOR HIGHWAY WORK TO BE LET APRIL 15

Notice is published in this issue of the Times to the effect that bids will be received April 15 for construction of 822 miles of grading, drainage structures, flexible base and double asphalt surface on Highway U. S. 90, beginning 9 of a mile west of Sanderson and coming east to Sanderson.

This contract, when let, will call for straightening of Highway 90 at the west edge of Sanderson where it goes around the point at the power plant. Instead of making the curve, the highway will continue only a slight curve and will come back into the old highway just east of the new bridge which was completed last year. The construction will eliminate a danger point and afford a full view of the road.

## Texas Ranchman Says Big Bend Park Would Be a Tourist Magnet

Development of the natural resources of Texas will never be complete until the Big Bend area is made a national park and one of the foremost tourist magnets on the North American Continent. C. M. Caldwell of Abilene, declared last week in Fort Worth. He expressed belief that, fully developed, Texas could take care of 100,000,000 people. Mr. Caldwell, a director and former vice-president of the West Texas chamber of commerce, also is a ranchman.

"An inventory of the natural resources of Texas should include all of those God-given assets which we are able to trade to those of other states via the monetary medium for those things we may need or at least desire but do not possess," Mr. Caldwell said. "Since the tourist business has grown to be the third largest industry in the United States and is exceeded only by agriculture and the textiles, we must regard as natural resources all of our tourist attractions."

"When you consider what Texans have done with such natural resources as our broad productive cattle ranges, oil fields, sulphur deposits, and agriculture opportunities, we can at least fairly visualize the possibilities of our state as a tourist attraction."

Mr. Caldwell declared that the same pioneering spirit which raised the state to its present position in the production of oil and livestock if applied to amusement attractions would make Texas a vacation wonderland.

"We have in that area of Texas which dips down into the romantic old Mexico on the Big Bend of the Rio Grande, the making of a national park of nearly 800,000 acres of uniquely colorful and picturesque terra firma which includes deep gorges cut by the river made famous in song, verse

## Students Examined For Defective Teeth

Students of the Sanderson schools were examined last week by Dr. E. A. Robertson for defective teeth. Out of a total of 378 students examined only 172 were found to have perfect teeth. The balance had some kind of defect which should have attention.

Decayed teeth are the most common defect of school children. Dentists say that at least 85 per cent of American school children have dental defects to some degree. If only the most serious dental defects are considered, from 20 to 40 per cent of the children are in urgent need of dental care. Of all parts of the body perhaps none is more liable to disease than the teeth.

Decayed teeth may cause bone abscesses, and disease of the bony cavities of the nose called "sinuses" and may make the face and jaw grow out of shape.

The final result of such decay (known as "dental caries") may be very serious, since the germs from decayed teeth (like those from the tonsils) may pass into the blood, causing rheumatism, heart disease and kidney disease. Abscesses that result from decayed teeth are not always painful and hence may do great damage to the general health without causing a suspicion as to the real reason for the trouble.

Decayed teeth prevent proper chewing and hinder nutrition. They are a frequent cause of malnutrition.

A crooked, crowded set of teeth does not permit normal meeting of the biting edges. As a result, many children cannot close their mouths and so become mouth breathers.

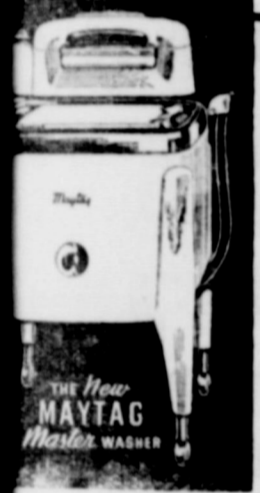

for exchange and trade reasons to have him continue the attitude of non-belligerency. But he is anxious that his two associates shall have an understanding about the Balkans, which is an Italian nightmare, and it is known there have been discussions on this matter between Berlin and Moscow as well as Berlin and Rome.

So far as the Allies are concerned, they would prefer to have Russia enter the war, but they are not afraid of her doing so. The myth of Russian military efficiency was punctured by the resistance of Finland. There are today no Russian military secrets, all technical information was disclosed by the Finnish captures, the extent of troop training was learned, and the character of morale of the men established. Further the Allies are convinced that Russia at war would restrict imports to Germany. British warships are interfering with German trade

passing through Norwegian waters, and no one should be surprised at the appearance of suicide submarines in the Baltic. Russian ships, laden with metals needed by Germany, have been seized in the Pacific. Reports are current that German submarines are to be based in the neighborhood of Vladivostok in order to cripple Allied trade in the Pacific. These reports are believed to be present without foundation; establishment of such a base would make Russia a belligerent. So recognized, the Allies would feel justified in moving with the consent of Turkey upon the Batum oil fields and in operating the Black Sea. Vulnerable, where Germany is not vulnerable, Stalin necessarily is considering what he has to gain or lose by entering the European war. His disposition is to be non-belligerent. But the Allies clearly are intending to make him less generous in his support of Germany or come out openly in support of her.

HERE AND THERE: Tomorrow Saturday, April 6, is Army Day. All Army posts and camps will be open to the public. Jimmy Roosevelt is promoting a deal to manufacture nickel picture machines to be placed in cocktail bars. These machines will show an entire picture including some sound effects.
