When the Presidential Special rolls out of Washington in June, carrying President Roosevelt on his western tour, one of its stops will be at the home of his long-time friend and able political ally. Vice President John N. Garner.

For nearly eight years these Democratic leaders have worked together in the cause of political liberalism, and as the President's traditional second term draws to a close, the Vice President is being widely acclaimed as his most logical successor.

The announcement of the projected visit to Uvalde was made the day following the county conventions in Texas on May 7, and is being generally interpreted by political observers as expressing the President's gratification that the Lone Star State gave a ringing endorsement to the presidential candidacy of its distinguished native son. Texans adopted resolutions approving the Roosevelt-Garner administration, and endorsed Garner for the Presidency by a vote of 6 to 1 over proponents of a third term.

The German Army will have completed their pincer movement (which I mentioned in this column last week) by the time this goes to press, that is if a miracle doesn't come to pass. It is apparent that the German troops in the vicinity of Brussels-Antwerp have applied a holding tactics while the pincer movement was being completed toward the English channel, the town of Amiens. With possession of the coast line. Hitler will have a perfect jumping off line for his troops for an invasion of England. Land batteries of artillery can cover the landing operations at Hastings. The last invasion of England was in 1066,

Thus far, it appears that the successes which have marked the German advances have been due not to any one thing, but to well trained troops to sound and faithful application of the age old principles of warfare, and to the fact that conditions following the world war forced them to completely reequip their fighting men with weapons of the Pollard, Walter Grigsby, Bustin latest design. 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
