Preliminary census figures of Terrell County were released Thursday by Harold M. Fennell. Supervisor of Census, with offices in Midland.

The figures, which are subject to correction, gave Terrell County a total of 2.858. as compared with 2,660 on April 1, 1930. This shows a gain of a little more than 9 per cent for the past 10 years. Figures for Sanderson and Dryden were not made available
