MUST BE RETURNED TO DRAFT BOARD WITHIN FIVE DAYS

The first lot of questionnaires, totalling 50 in number, were mailed out Thursday by the local Draft Board and registrants receiving them are notified that they must be returned within five days. Failure to do so will automatically place you on the Class 1 A list which means that you are available immediately for training service.

The questionnaires were mailed out by Mrs. Marie Dyer, chief clerk of the board, and as soon as they are returned the board members, J. C. Mitchell, chairman, Alfred E. Creigh Jr., secretary, and W. F. Harrell, will take the information contained therein and make their classification. This classification will be made in regards to whether the registrant has dependants, is in business for himself, or is a producer. The registrant also has recourse to an appeal if he feels that the classification has been unfair. G. J. Henshaw has been appointed Government Appeal Agent for local Board No. 1, Terrell County. Any registrant who wishes to make an appeal of his classification may do so by contacting Mr. Henshaw.

Jack Hayre has been appointed as a member of the Advisory Board and registrants who feel that they need aid or advice in the filling out of their questionnaire are cited to go to Mr. Hayre. Both Mr. Henshaw and Mr. Henshaw were appointed by the President of the United States to fill these capacities and no charge will be made for their services.

Judge R. S. Wilkinson is ex-officio member of the Advisory Board and will also be available to aid in filling out the questionnaires. Persons needing advice will do well to go either to Mr. Hayre or Judge Wilkinson for if the answers made to the questions are not correct your class rating may be affected.

ONE CHARGED IN CONNECTION WITH DEATH OF MEXICAN

Examining trial was held Wednesday morning for Walter Stansell, charged with the murder of Pedro Gonzales, Mexican, Tuesday morning about 2 o'clock.

In a statement Stansell said he had discharged Gonzales at Sheffield early in the evening, and had turned the keys to the truck he had been driving to Pedra Salas, telling him to bring it to Sanderson. According to his testimony the truck left at least an hour and a half ahead of him and should have contained only Salas. He said when he arrived at a gate located about 4 miles east of the Mrs. Mary E. Mitchell ranch he overtook them and an argument started. He stated that he fired three shots in the air to frighten them, thinking that possibly they would go on and trouble would be avoided. The truck drove off he said, and Stansell followed, finding a body in the middle of the road about 125 or 130 yards from the gate. After getting out of his truck and looking at the body he decided he was dead and continued to Sanderson and reported the incident to Sheriff J. S. Nance.

Sheriff Nance, accompanied by Capt. W. L. Barler, went to the scene of the trouble, and Mrs. Mabel Yeates, justice of the peace followed. An inquest was held at the spot where the body lay, after which it was brought to Sanderson by the Joe Oberkamp ambulance.

Sheriff Nance, who said the occurrence took place about 55 miles out on the Sheffield road, made a statement to the effect that he went to the scene and found the body lying face down in the center of the road. Upon examination he discovered the man to be dead. He also stated that he found a fired 30-30 shell at the gate, and tracks about the immediate vicinity of the body. No bullet holes were found on the body, however, at any place, and it is believed that he was struck by one of the trucks and run over. Three ribs were broken and had punctured the lungs, according to a statement made by Dr. Francis E. O'Neill, and it was thought that Gonzales might have lived about two hours after being struck, although unconscious.

Stansell was bound over to the grand jury and Pedra Salas, driver of the other truck, was placed under bond as a material witness. Gonzales is survived by his wife and four children.

TEXAS OUT-O'-DOORS

Round Up Antelope by Plane

An airplane will replace hard-riding horsemen when the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission resumes the trapping of antelope on over-grazed areas and the transportation of them to less heavily grazed land is necessary because the fleet game animals will not jump fences higher than three feet.

The Game Department, using a technique developed by the New Mexico Game Department, trapped nearly 300 antelope near Sterling city last fall. Horsemen were used to round up the antelope and drive them into and through a series of pens into a net corral, where they were picked up, placed in crates and transported to their new homes, some times more than 200 miles distant. Despite the fact antelope are extremely wild when attempts are made to drive them so successful was the trapping of them last year that only six of the animals were killed.

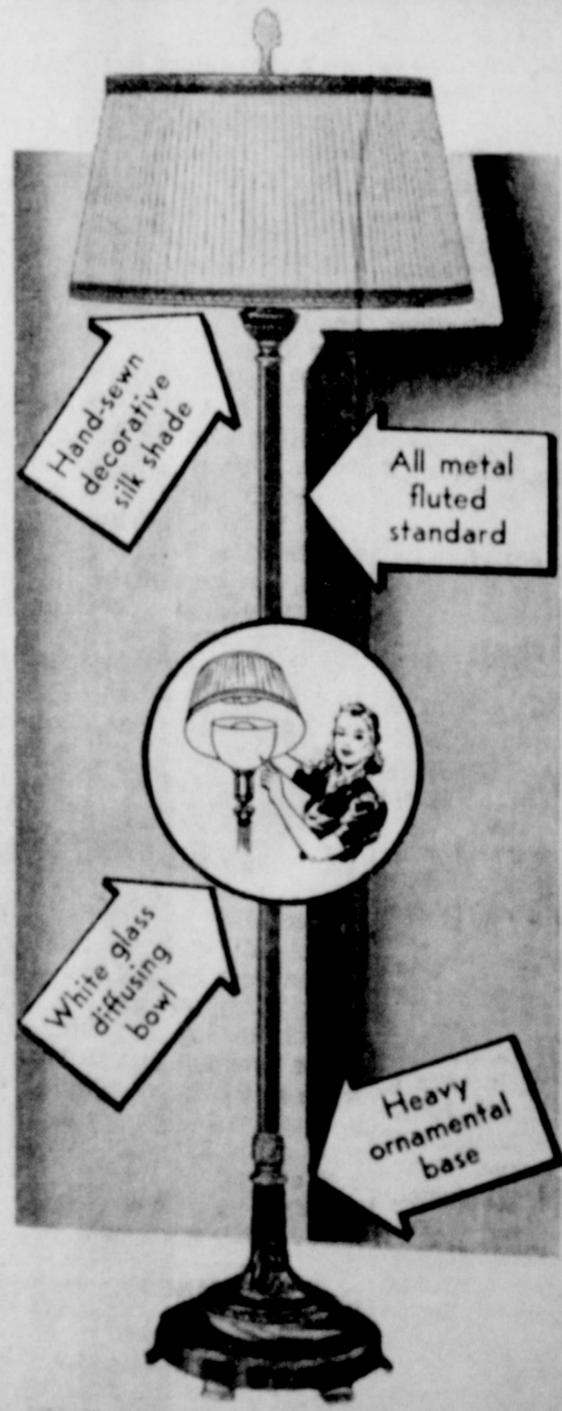
Experiments by game managers in attempting to turn antelope in any direction desired by the use of an airplane has proved successful, the executive secretary said. With a plane flying no lower than 500 feet, antelope can be directed. It is expected that not only will the Game Department be able to cut its trapping crew from a dozen men to four, but that twice as many antelope can be trapped in half the time. This will mean an appreciable saving to the department and also that more areas suitable for antelope which are not now stocked can be populated with the pronghorns.

There is now a closed season on antelope in Texas due to the fact that the animals decreased to a few thousand because of over-shooting. The Game Department is working toward an open season.
