



At the same time, a proposed bond program of \$1,000,000, to be issued only in the event the forthcoming Texas Legislature amends the bond assumption act to permit payment of the bond maturities from the state gaso-

line tax, has been proposed. Sanctioned by the Texas Highway Department as a means of temperature to develop a nice securing funds now for building of highways needed in the national defense program, the plan would become operative only in the event that their assumption on a 100 per cent basis is assured. Proceeds of the bonds, is assumed by the state board. would be turned over by the counties to the highway department for the building of roads.

Highways out of Fort Stockton to be included in the program would be U.S. 67 to Alpine, U.S. 285 to Pecos and to Sanderson, and 82 to Grandfalls.




