These Clouds Mean Defense



Clouds arise as American farmers increase the fertility of their fields by sprinkling them with lime. Clouds arise as American soldiers increase heir skill through artillery practice. Both fertile soil and skilled gunsers are vital to the nation's defense. American farmers last year, cooperating with the AAA Farm Program, applied nearly six million tons of lime to their soil, enough to have powdered the face, at the rate of a ton per acre, of every acre of cropland in Maine, Vermont, New Hamp-hire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Connecticut.

Austin, Texas. Jan. 28.-Went down to Beaumont over the week-end and saw a freighter launched on bananas . . . 7,000 pounds of them cut up and smeared on the runways. The steel hulk slid down over them as easily as I did on half a peel a month ago . . . only the ship had some water to land in, and I didn't.

From where I stood, among a crowd of three thousand, peering through the feathers of a woman's hat, I was unable to read the ship's name . . . but it nowadays. Incidentally, this was the first ship launched from a Texas shipyard since 1918.






