Service Agencies Challenge

J. USO DRIVE ON



As southwestern chairman of the United Service Organizations for National Defense, E. B. Germany of Dallas is regional director of the nationwide campaign to provide recreational and welfare facilities for soldiers, sailors, and defense workers. Endorsed by the President and Army and Navy officials, the USO expects to raise \$10,765,000 to operate service establishments built by the Government. Texas' quota is \$400,000, and committees appointed to raise this fund began their drive officially June 3 in every Texas county. Mr. Germany urged all citizens to contact local USO workers and participate in this patriotic movement.

Opportunities Are Offered By National Defense Program

Because national defense calls for skilled and semi-skilled labor, many who otherwise could be utilized in the defense program either are without jobs, or in lower paid classifications. The national defense training program is paid for by the federal government, offering them opportunity to become employable in industries handling national defense contracts. While there is no great shortage of labor, there is a shortage of skilled labor. In Texas the program is handled through the State Board for Vocational Education. The programs have been set up locally through the public school systems. Men are being trained upon the recommendation of the Texas State Employment Service and the Work Projects Administration. Training also is provided for out-of-school youth and enrollees recommended by the National Youth Administration. For those out of jobs for several years, refresher training is afforded to make them employable. Placements are handled by the Texas State Employment Service. The place record in Texas has been about 85 per cent. Texans in the eligibility class who fail to take advantage of this free instruction placing them in a position for substantial earnings are losing a valuable opportunity.—Austin Statesman.

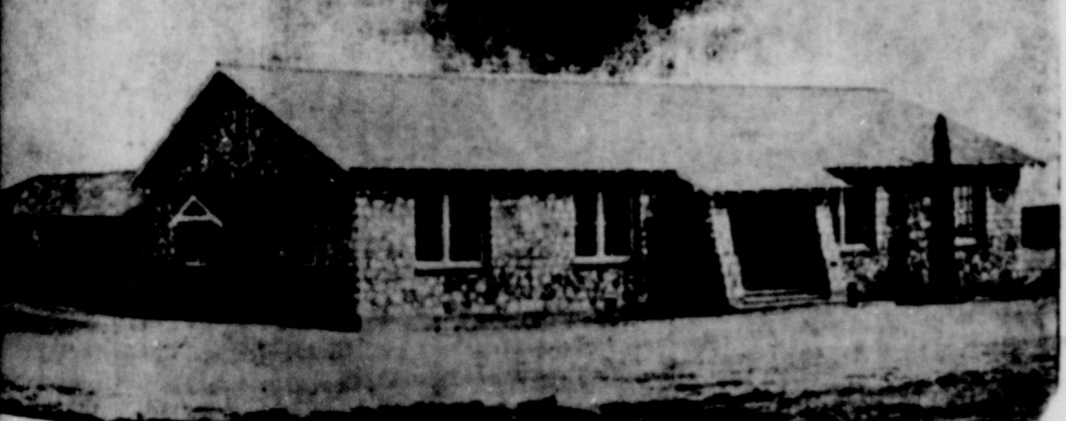
