Other unions representing a greater number of railway employees are demanding wage increases ranging as high as 95 per centaveraging 47 per cent - and amounting to 580 million dollars a year - although their present rates of pay also are the highest in history.

Thus the wage increases being demanded by the labor unions amount to 770 million dollars a year, an average increase in excess of 41 per cent.

In addition, certain of these labor unions have demanded advances in their pay not included in the above figures, and more rules for the creation of unnecessary jobs.

The situation, then, is this: The total cost of complying with all the demands made would be approximately 900 million dollars a year!

The average weekly earnings of railway employees are now 15 per cent higher than in the peak year 1929, while the cost of living is 12 per cent less.

The demands of the railway labor unions are being made when the entire nation has just been asked to make a supreme effort for National Defense.

The railways cannot meet these demands without a great increase in the cost of transportation. They exceed by more than 700 million dollars the income that the railways had left after paying their annual expenses, taxes and charges in 1940.

The railways have a vitally important job before them. They need all their resources to continue adequately to serve you and contribute effectively toward the National Defense Program.

> When applied to infested vounds, the compound is efficient in rapidly killing all screwworms in a wound. At the same time the remedy gives as good protection, or better, to all wounds against subsequent attack as materials heretofore recommended for this purpose. Siddall says.

> Full particulars for preparing and applying the remedy has ed through research by the buquarantine during 1940 and 1941. The smear is best applied with one-inch paint brush.

Vaccination Against Typhoid Fever Urged

Austin-Vacation time is once again at hand, and among preparations for your summer vacation, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges that you include vaccination against typhoid.

"If you have not been vaccinated against typhoid fever recently-within the last year or two-go at once to your family physicians for the three shots of typhoid vaccine that will protect you against that disease. Don't wait until just before your vacation to be vaccinated against typhoid," he urged. "Do it now. because the three shots are given at weekly intervals, and it takes several weeks for the protective treatment to establish itself throughout your system.

"Typhoid fever is a germ disease. Water. milk, or other foods that have been contaminated by typhoid germs are the main sources of the disease.

"A great deal has been accomplished by public health measures to prevent the spread of typhoid from such sources. The protection of public and private water supplies from contamination, the extension of community sanitation, the sanitary su-Fireman F. E.
