## Rotarians Hear Discussion of the Defense Guards

Members of the Sanderson Rotary Club were privileged to hear a discussion of the Texas Defense Guards and what the organization might mean in an emergency by Captain D. L. Duke.

In his discussion he stated that there were already 16,000 members of the home guards and that there were seventy-five more applications in for additional units. The organization of Company "C," 46th Battalion, marked the last of the units that would be accepted according to information obtained by Captain Duke.

He also pointed out that the organization lacked five men of having fifty members which are necessary before the company can be recognized. It was approved by Major George Thomas when here a few weeks ago but it cannot be recognized and shipment of guns, etc., made until the unit has at least fifty members. A vote of support was made by the Rotary Club and efforts are to be made to not only acquire the needed five members but to possibly obtain the full quota of seventy-five men.

The organization is strictly a voluntary one and no money will be asked of local people for their support. Each member buys his cap, belt and badge at a cost of \$1.33 and regular khaki trousers and shirt complete the uniform. Guns and ammunition will be furnished by the government. Enrollment is voluntary and to get out, a member simply requests a discharge. Age limit is 18 to 64 years.

## Prisciliano Escamilla Succumbs to Paralytic Stroke Saturday

Prisciliano Escamilla Sr. 74, died Saturday morning as a result of a paralytic stroke suffered nearly a month ago. Since the stroke he had been confined to his bed in a critical condition. Funeral services were held Sunday morning with Joe Oberkamp Funeral Directors in charge of arrangements.

He came to Sanderson in 1889 and was employed at the local roundhouse. In 1900 he started work as a boiler maker and followed that profession until he retired in June of 1937.

Survivors are his widow, 6 sons, Prisciliano Jr. and Alejandro, Sanderson; Felipe, Camp Leonard Wood, Mo.; Jesus, Santa Fe, N. M., and Manuel and Herberto, sons at home; and 2 daughters: Eulalia, Sanderson, and Hortencia Morales, San Antonio. All of his children and families were here for the funeral services.

## EXAMINATIONS TO BE GIVEN FOR BORDER PATROLMEN

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for Border Patrolmen, \$2,000 a year in the Border Patrol, Department of Justice. The salary is subject to a retirement deduction of 3 1/2 per cent. Registers will be established for the following Border Patrol Districts:

(1) Southwest A including the States of California, Nevada, Utah and the Territory of Hawaii.

(2) Southwest B including the States of Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma. Vacancies to be filled from eligible registers established on or near the Mexican Border. Applications must be on file with the Commission's Washington office not later than September 11, 1941.

Applicants must show that they have had certain experience requiring a regular program of arduous physical activity or training, such as that required of park rangers, forest rangers, member of survey parties, lieutenants and linemen for utility companies.

The United States Immigration Border Patrol is a uniformed police organization, and its primary function is to detect and prevent the smuggling and the illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The duties of this position are arduous and the physical and other standards that must be met are necessarily rigid. The age limits are 21 to 35 and will not be waived in any case. Eligibles selected for appointment will be required to take an extremely intensive course of training usually at the border patrol school at El Paso, Texas. Failure to pass this course will be sufficient cause to separate appointees from the service.

Full information as to the requirements for the examination, and application forms, may be obtained from the Secretary of the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners at the postoffice or customhouse in any city in the States named above which has a postoffice of the first- or second-class, from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or information may be obtained from local Border Patrolmen.

There's One in Every Family

By FRANCES EISENBERG

The story of a small-town American family, including a boy of six who knows what he wants and gets it, by being shy when that works, by sitting on a roof, or by blowing a trumpet for an hour if that works. There is a good older sister, too, who does everything she is told and complains about it.

The story deals with those who try to reform the small boy, but no one succeeds. Miss Eisenberg seems to have had experience with problem children, and also with the other kind you wish were a problem. Her descriptions of family life in the get-your-own-meal, father mowing-the-lawn kind of American home are delightful.

Everyone in this family has a psychological twist, but the reader is encouraged to feel that psychological twists have their good points, if you don't take them too hard.—from the review of the book by Henry Seidel Canby. Library hours: 2 to 5 Thursdays.

## It Happened in Sanderson TEN YEARS AGO This Week—Remember?

August 14, 1931

Traffic over the Southern Pacific lines was delayed here Monday as a result of a cloudburst west of Valentine Sunday afternoon that washed out several miles of track. Passenger train No. 104 was delayed about 12 hours here Monday and freight trains were delayed much longer.

Emergency crews were sent out to repair the damage and by Tuesday all traffic from the west was again normal.

A few headlines of ten years ago—Negro Given Sentence For Tossing Brakeman Off Top of Box Car... "School to Open on Monday, Sept. 14"... "Budget Items Public Target"... "Brown Estate Ranch Is Leased By Del Rio Man"... "P.T.A. Play Draws Large Crowd Saturday"... "Fine Pecan Tree Has Local History"... a story dealing with the planting of a large pecan nut by Dr. P. F. Robertson in the spring of 1919 in the yard of Jack McKee, which sprout was dug up by Mr. McKee when he moved to a new home, and replanted. It was reported as making a beautiful shade tree, besides having, up to that time, borne pecans for the past three years... "Former Teacher Here Translates Child's Story"... The teacher referred to was Miss Dorothy Weatherby, and while teaching Spanish at Fort Davis, translated the story, "The Tale of Peter Rabbit," by Beatrice Potter, into the Spanish language.

The meeting was devoted to attending to the regular business of paying monthly bills.

## WITH OUR NEIGHBORS

The Monahans American—Coach O. P. Adams, head coach for the Grandfalls-Royalty schools for the past three years, handed in his resignation this week to the board of education.

Mr. Adams has accepted a position with the Standard Oil Company at Royalty. He and Mrs. Adams will continue to make their home in Grandfalls.

Coach Adams accomplished much during his three years, including: a basketball team that won second in regional for two consecutive years, an admirable record as instructor in Chemistry and mathematics, and the completion of the John White Stadium. He was well liked by the entire student body and faculty at Grandfalls and will indeed be missed this year.

The Santa Anna News—Calahan county went dry last week in an election over legalization of beer. The majority was 101 against sale of beer anywhere in the county. The vote complete, was 974 against beer to 873 for beer. Four of the eighteen precincts, including Baird and Putnam where beer is now legal, returned wet majorities. Thirteen

precincts gave dry majorities and one was tied. Crossplains, adjacent to Brown County reiterated its dryness, 163 to 102. September 3 will be the last day in which beer may be sold in Baird and Putnam.

Sketch in Menard News—That "Victory" drive has served one purpose, at least. It has helped us make use of the letter V, which heretofore we have not been able to use very extensively in any way in our alphabetical agencies.

Menard News—A black deer, far more rare than albinos has been captured by a Comal county ranchman. The deer is the second of its kind to be seen in that Central Texas county in the last several years. One was killed there in 1935, the state game warden has reported to the executive secretary of the Game Department.

Black animals or birds are known as those afflicted with melanism, which is a condition which results in more than the usual amount of pigments in the hair or feathers. Many albinos (white) are reported in Texas each year, but birds or animals of the melanistic variety are extremely rare.

The State Observer—A slight decrease in the deficit in the state's general fund since July 20 was reported last week by State Treasurer Charley Lockhart.

The deficit as reported August 5 stood at 28,474,662, in comparison with the July 20 figure of \$30,128,084.

The deficit a year ago—August 5, 1940—was \$22,685,422, the Treasurer reported.

The deficit in the confederate pension fund is 664,443.73, Lockhart reported.

The Fort Stockton Pioneer—Visiting Rotarians of Sanderson presented the program at the Rotary meeting Tuesday noon. Johnny Williams, Sanderson club president, headed the group.

The Rev. John Byrd and Harry McAdams and daughter, Miss Edna Mae, appeared on the program. K. D. Oliver, local president, was in charge of the meeting. A report was made to the group of the work being done by the home defense guard committee.

The Winters Enterprise—A farmer with a 6-acre lake near Gilmer in Upshur county, has earned \$20 an acre each of the four years since the lake was constructed. He charges 50 cents a day for fishing privileges, and this gives him more easy cash per acre than any other of his land.




