



How to clean aluminum properly, prolong its life:

Wash the utensil in hot, soapy

Rub with steel wool and soap.

Rinse with clear water. Dry the utensil thoroughly. Caution! Never use soda, lye,

ashes, ammonia, of any washing compound containing a strong alkali. These discolor and injure pure aluminum.

If a utensil becomes discolored through boiling water or foods containing iron or alkali. you can remove this surface stain by boiling a solution of 2 tablespoons vinegar to 1 quart of water in the utensil for a few minutes. Neither the stain nor its removal in this manner is in


