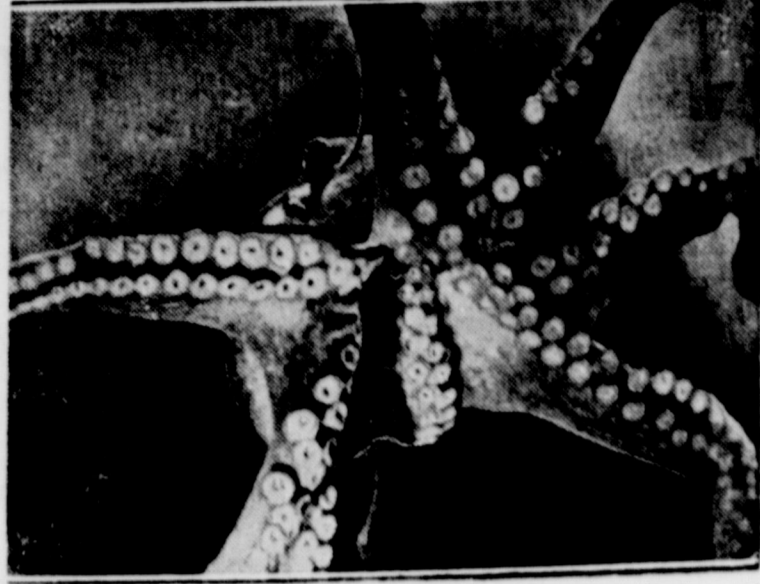

ably reported that the rain totaled eight inches at Con Can, nine inches at the Streib ranch, and the same at Garner Park. The rain fell last Thursday night.

Total rainfall in Leakey at same time was only two inches, while at Sabinal rainfall was even less.

Due to the rain, the Frio Rivers and tributaries were out of banks Friday morning, with the Dry Frio probably being highest. South of Leakey several short draws ran over Highway 4. Since the heavy rain, moisture in and around Leakey has been much lighter than in previous weeks.

The McCamey News—L. E. Bass brought to The News office the past week a cluster of thirteen butter bean pods growing from one twig, and each pod contained beans.

Mr. Bass and his next door neighbor, "Cal" Harding, grow as fine Magnolia figs as you could find in South Texas. In fact, both Mr. Bass and Mr. Harding have practically lived off fruits and vegetables grown in their back yards. And, best of all, it was not necessary to do any irrigating, except from the water which was stored from the roofs of their own buildings.

The Fort Stockton Pioneer—Adding last Friday evening's rain to that of the month of October plus the fall for Thursday, the total reaches 28.05 inches for the ten months of 1941.

This figure exceeds all previous records with the exception of the 1880 total, when 33.76 inches were registered. At the average rate per month for this year, the final mark for 1941 bids fair to pass the 1880 history making mark, reports Judge H. H. Butz, volunteer government weather observer.

The Ozona Stockman—Dripping skies hung low over West

Texas again yesterday and this morning as light drizzles continued to fall. Cooler weather seemed definitely on the way with sharp winds from the northeast early in the week, but the threatened change turned into more rain. The area came close to frost Monday morning when the temperature dipped sharply through the night but moderated shortly.

Intermittent rains have added a total of 2 of an inch of moisture to the already record fall for 1941 during the past week. With this addition, the year's total to date now stands 37.08.

"ADIOS AMIGOS!"

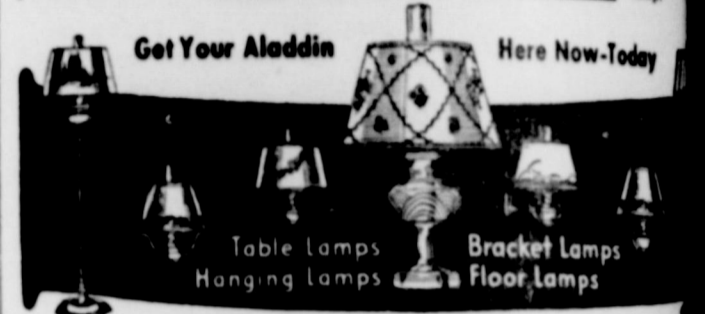
