

FOODS SAFE IN CAN FOR STORAGE AFTER OPENED

Austin-"Keep it in the cansuggests Dr. O. B. Williams, University of Texas food bacteriologist who recently returned to the campus from six years of research for the National Canneries' Association.

Out to shatter a superstitution grown hoary through the years, Dr. Williams declared there is no reason for taking food from cans except to eat it. The can, when opened, is a perfectly safe place for storing the edibles but it should be kept in a cool place.

Citing precedent for his stand, Dr. Williams points to a recent U. S. Department of Agriculture publication which declares cans are probably safer for food than kitchen utensils because cans are generally cleaner.

In order to secure a of the border patrol stationed cussed Monday, December 1, and statement of wages paid, a the meeting will be held at the worker may obtain from any Social Security Board field office a self-addressed post-card form which he may fill out, stamp with a one-cent stamp, and mail. In return, he will receive a statement of all wages credited to his account since the law became effective in 1937.

In cases of discrepancy in the amount of wages credited to a worker's account, the matter should be reported to the local Social Security Board office where an effort will be made to reconcile and adjust any difference, Clark asserted.

"The old-age insurance law first became operative in January 1937 and it may be possible that some employers, through oversight, failed to show on their reports the social security account numbers of some of mean that such employees do

Any wage earner desiring a post card form may obtain it at the local Social Security Board office by personally calling at the office or by sending in a post card requesting it.


