## Boy Scouts Ready To Start Collection Of Waste Papers

The Sanderson Boy Scout troop having secured a storage place, is now prepared to begin collection of waste paper and cardboard to be sent to national defense centers for use in the manufacture of war materials.

With little means of conveyance, the scouts cannot themselves pick up all the paper, but suggest that those having any bring it either to the scout house or to their warehouse just north of there, or tell a scout where it may be picked up.

The wastes must be assorted and bound before they are acceptable, and to decrease the immense work the scouts will have, donors are asked to have the paper in as good order as is possible.

Registration of Sanderson scouts has begun, and Scoutmaster Duane Smith estimates that from 35 to 40 boys will join the organization. To enroll in the scout troop, a boy must be twelve years old or more, and before he is technically a scout he must have passed his tenderfoot tests.

The local Boy Scout Council for 1942 will be chosen soon. This council includes five members picked from local citizens having an interest in the scouts, to sponsor and aid the group in its work.

## Quannah Parker, Famed Indian Chief, Once Sought Magic Herb in Big Bend

Fifty-seven years ago Saturday, December 13, Quannah Parker, Comanche chief, took a room at a Fort Davis hotel and said he had come here to find some gift-of-God cactus to lighten the redman's burden.

In December 1913 the Fort Davis Weekly Post ran a story which contained a list of guests at the old Hotel Lempert here as of Dec. 13, 1884. The list contained 14 names. Four of these were Quannah Parker, Rising Sun and Nan Notes, all Indians from the Indian Territory, and Geo. W. Fox, of Wichita Falls. The item from the Post had been retained by the late Mrs. Susan M. Jones, who gave it to a Fort Davis friend. The item said relative to the December day in 1884:

**Explain Mission**  
"Miss Finck heard a knock at the door and was somewhat startled upon opening it to see three heap big Indians standing there in stately silence. Mr. Fox was an Indian Agent accompanying them. He stepped forward and explaining that the chief and his two lieutenants were here on a peaceful mission, simply wishing to be accommodated with bed and board while they sought in the vicinity of Mitre Peak for a certain wonderful herb which, the Comanche traditions taught, could be found in any other locality."

"Miss Finck is now Mrs. James Stewart, wife of County Clerk Stewart."

James Stewart was clerk of Jeff Davis county for 30 years. He and Mrs. Stewart conducted the old hotel for many years, under the name of Stewart Hotel. The building, with about 40 rooms, was converted into an apartment house about 10 years ago, and is now the property of J. Hunter Clark, Fort Davis bank cashier since 1913.

**Peयोte Is Herb Sought**  
The cactus or herb which Chief Parker sought was the peyote. It is declared. In speaking of the incident recently, Judge O. W. Williams of Fort Stockton said the Indians remained here about two weeks.

The peyote has been called both the devil's drug and a gift of God to the poor Indian. It is

said to give visions to those who partake of it. Use of the cactus or small button-like growth, is said to have originated with the Azecs in the 16th century. It is said that a widespread Indian religion grew up from the herb's use. A recently published statement in Texas reported that in the spring of 1941, 23 Indian tribes met in El Reno, Oklahoma, to make plans to send representatives south of the Rio Grande to study the religion of the Mexican Indian peyote-eating tribes.

**Other Guests Listed**  
Other guests at Hotel Lempert—later, the Stewart, now the Clark apartments—included P. Coleman of Murphyville, which was then the name of Alpine; B. F. Hozler of El Paso; A. T. Winder of Uvalde and John Drohan of Eagle Pass.

As to the peyote plant, its territory is not so restricted as merely to the vicinity of Mitre Peak which is between Fort Davis and Alpine. Authorities say its locale extends from the Davis mountains down the Rio Grande to the Gulf coast, along a narrow ribbon of territory.

## Future Development Of Big Bend Park Studied at CC Clinics

Future development of the Big Bend National park occupied the thoughts of many who attended the recent chamber of commerce clinics to offer their suggestions as to what Alpine needs and the work the chamber of commerce might follow to obtain these needs.

In order to present a better picture of the plans for the Big Bend. Eugene Thompson, with the Big Bend Land department, was invited to one of the clinics attended by members of the Rotary club and all the directors of the chamber of commerce.

Mr. Thompson pointed out that an appraisal of all land had been made, that the Texas State Parks board felt the land-buying program would be under way by late winter, and that enough land would be purchased within a few months to permit the National Park service to go ahead with drawing plans for the immense project. Reference was made to the recent visit to Texas of the director of the National Park service, Newton B. Drury. Drury stated in Fort Worth that in spite of the war, plans for the new International park should go right ahead. Thompson stressed the fact that the Big Bend Land committee would be very considerate of those people who lived in the park area and those who had an equity in their holdings. —Alpine Avalanche.

Fort Stockton Pioneer—A new sub-station of the Texas Highway patrol will be established in Fort Stockton effective January 1st, and two patrolmen will be transferred here from Pecos on a permanent basis.

Monahans News — Approximately 100 local women signed up for work in various departments of local units of the Red Cross Motor Corps in an organization meeting Monday night at the high school. The motor corps is being formed to assist in any emergency which may arise.

Completion of the organization will be made after the Christmas holidays, it was announced.

Iraan Herald—A contract was awarded the Austin Bridge Company of Dallas for the construction of a bridge across the Pecos River approximately two to three hundred feet above the former slab crossing.

The contract was let at the cost of \$2,850. It calls for a creosote treated construction, at a height above this year's high water mark, and twelve feet wide.

The bridge will be completed in February.

Fort Davis Dispatch — L. E. Wood, resident engineer of the Highway Department here, announced this week that plans for the last ten mile section of the Scenic Loop road were near completion.

Although road allocations are at a standstill because of the war, this route will no doubt be completed as the money was set aside for the work some weeks ago.

Forty thousand dollars was granted the project.

Big Bend Sentinel, Marfa—Use of the Marfa airport as a take-off area is restricted to Army planes, at present except by written permission of the Commanding Officer, Fort D. A. Russell.

Civilians are not allowed to visit the airport as they have been in the past.

Big Lake Wildcat—The second Ordovician field, Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1 RB University this week became the larger when it flowed 322.53 barrels of high gravity oil during the first four hours of a scheduled six-hour official gauge through a one-inch choke. This was at a rate of 1,935.18 barrels daily.

Alpine Avalanche—Capt. Ernest Best of San Angelo, head of Company E, Texas Rangers, members of the Ranger force stationed in this area, four customs officers and two border patrolmen made a scouting trip into the Big Bend country last week in a survey to prevent European aliens from entering this country from across the Mexican border.

Ozona Stockman—Road building machinery of the Public Construction Co. of Denton, awarded contract for paving of 21 miles of Highway 163 from Ozona south, has been released by the federal government from a devalue project at Amarillo and Crockett County project, Engineer Cunningham, employed as county engineer on the paving project, was informed by officials of the contracting firm the last of the week.

ARMY FLASH When an observer spots a group of hostile planes, he picks up the telephone (1) and calls Army Flash. The Central Observer (2) at once connects him with the nearest Air Center (3) in which he reports the type of planes, number, direction, and distance of flight. When several reports appear, another operator (4) transfers the data to an Information Center (5) where arrangements are made for a large-scale aerial attack. Working the map, Air Center officers order interceptor planes into the air, direct them to intercept with the enemy, or AAF officers order the other Department and Radio or radio, blue, or red status, according to the degree of danger, to the nearest Warning District Center (6). At the same time, Civilian Defense takes over from the Air Center, enlightens the members of Civilian Defense (7) within the Warning District. And from the Commandant of the local Civilian Defense Corps orders the blackout, has the public warning sounded on the warning siren—and if the location is not protected, shows the operation of search lights.

## State Health Officer Asks for Cooperation Against Diseases

Doctor Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, stated today that he believed it would be a worthwhile idea for every Texan to take a health inventory at the beginning of the New Year. "In the true spirit of New Year, we should give some thought to the mistakes we made during the past year, and a great deal of thought to planning some way of improving our health conditions during the coming

year," Doctor Cox said. "The American people are very fortunate. We have scientific knowledge of communicable diseases; we have already made important conquests in the warfare against infectious diseases; as a people we still cherish the methods of reasoning as the best means of adjusting human differences. We have material wealth to make knowledge work; we have capable leaders in the sciences of life processes that see great opportunities for public good in health measures that unite effectively the resources of medicine, education, finance and government. We are probably the most realistic and practical of all people.

## State Organization For President's Ball Ready to Begin Work

Dallas—Marshaling of resources and human forces in the fight against infantile paralysis will climax in celebration of President Roosevelt's 60th birthday, Friday, January 30, throughout Texas. State headquarters for the celebration have been opened in the Santa Fe building, Dallas, with W. L. Clayton, Houston, the President's deputy Federal Loan Administrator, as state chairman. The drive in Texas starts off with more than 100 local chapters of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and with a working nucleus in a majority of the state's 254 counties.

Announcement of opening of campaign headquarters in Dallas was made by George Waverly Briggs, vice chairman in charge of organization. Serving with Mr. Briggs will be Mrs. George Pittman, Dallas, and Clara Driscoll, Corpus Christi, as vice chairmen; W. Marion Newman, Dallas secretary; John E. Owens, treasurer; Frank N. Watson, director of publicity; E. V. Freeman, director of organization and Arthur P. Dyer, assistant to the vice chairman, all of Dallas.

The 1941 celebration is hailed as the "President's Diamond Jubilee Birthday" and will be observed throughout the mainlands and possessions of the nation. With the advent of the United States in the war demands for the protection and care of children suffering from infantile paralysis is of vital importance to the defense of the country.

Celebrations this year will take on almost every known form of entertainment. The annual balls will be held in cities and many of the rural communities. Athletic games will be sponsored in the schools and musicals and festivals of variety will be sponsored by church and social groups.

Texas state committee headquarters have been set up at 511 Santa Fe building, Dallas, from which information can be obtained relative to organizing celebration parties throughout the state. Vice Chairman Briggs has extended an invitation to all interested in giving aid to infantile paralysis victims to get in touch with state headquarters.

## Civil Service Seeks More Stenographers For Defense Work

The government needs stenographers for National Defense. One is prone to think of National defense in terms of soldiers, sailors and marines. But there are many types of defense work behind the lines. A large army of civilian personnel is now on duty as stenographers in the Government service to take the dictation of the thousands of executives and administrative officers, and to transcribe it into typewritten documents. Some of this material is of lasting importance. Some of it will set into motion Government events of historical consequence.

It is estimated that the Government has approximately 85,000 stenographers, typists and secretaries on the payroll. Many young men and women are responding to the call. Thousands more are needed.

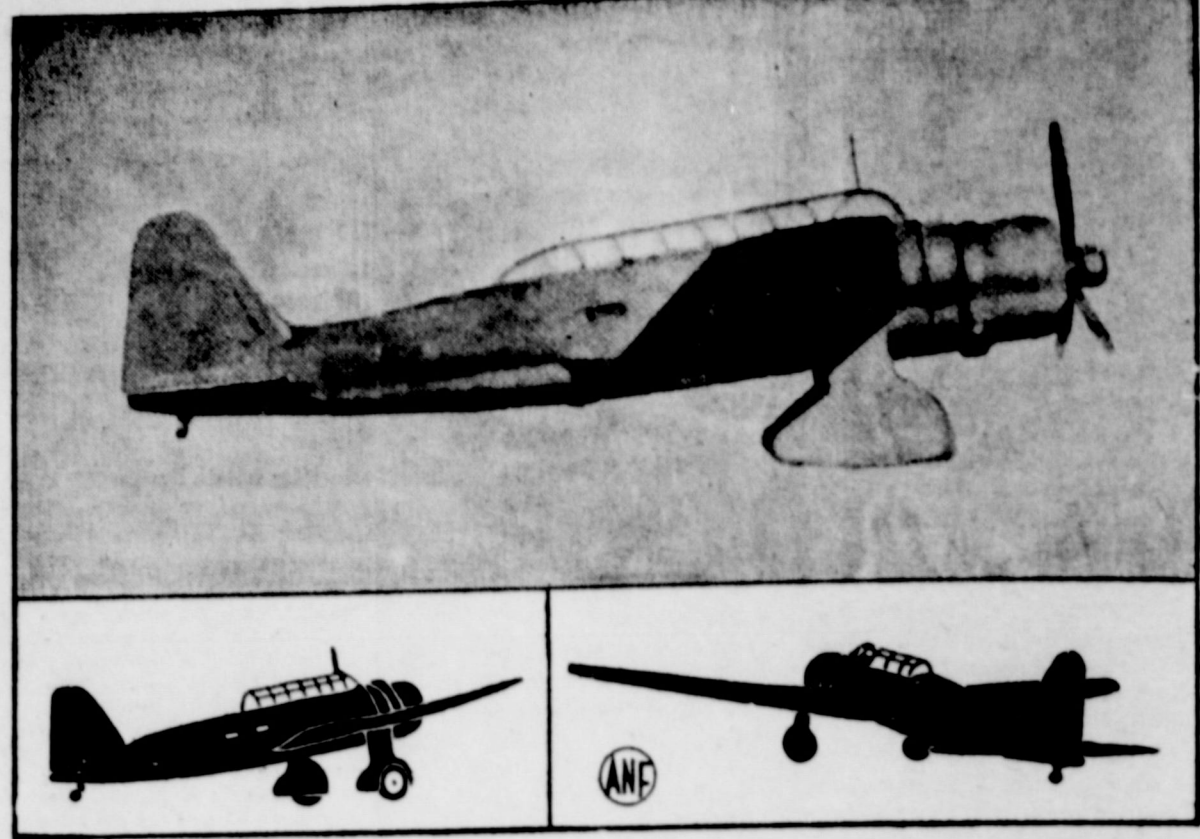
Aside from the present emergency, the opportunities for stenographers in the Government service are favorable. Good stenographers are always in demand. The positions pay \$1,440 a year to start, with a good chance for advancement to positions of greater responsibility, such as secretarial positions, in the case of those who have the ability.

The examination announced by the Civil Service Commission for stenographers is open until further notice. The examination consists solely of a dictation test at 96 words a minute and transcription of notes. All persons who can qualify are urged to apply now.

## Know the Enemy's Warplanes

JAPANESE 98 LIGHT BOMBER



Aviation News Features presents the first of a series of photographs and silhouettes of the military aircraft of the enemy—Japan, Germany and Italy. The plane above—designated the "98"—is a single-engine monoplane used by the Japanese army as a light bomber. From a distance this ship might conceivably be confused with one of the dive bomber types in service with the U. S. Navy—the Vought-Sikorsky Vindicator. Both ships are monoplanes (the Jap is mid wing; the Vindicator low wing). Each is powered by a single radial engine. The cockpit enclosures are somewhat similar in shape. However, there is one outstanding difference which should be easily recognizable. The U. S. bomber has a retractable landing gear which folds smoothly into the wing in flight. The Japanese ship has a fixed landing gear with streamlined "pants" on the wheels—an arrangement considered obsolete in virtually all modern aircraft.

To aid the victims of warfare being waged upon America and her island possessions, the American Red Cross has issued an appeal for a \$50,000,000 war fund. Chairman Norman H. Davis announced from the national headquarters in Washington.

Mr. Davis urged men, women and children to give to this mercy fund through their local Red Cross Chapters. These funds will support the Chapter's war work with the families of men in the military services, as well as the broad relief program of the national Red Cross.

President Roosevelt, who is president of the American Red Cross, issued a proclamation urging all citizens to give to the Red Cross war fund.

In launching the appeal, Chairman Davis said:

"There are millions of our citizens who desire today to demonstrate their will to victory over the enemy. Not all can be in the armed forces, and not all can volunteer their services for humanitarian work, but all can volunteer their dollars to arm the Red Cross to be their representative at the scene of battle and distress.

"Today is the day to demonstrate our high morale, our unity, our determination not alone to support our President and our fighting men at the front, but also to insure to our wounded, homeless and suffering fellow citizens in our Pacific Islands that we stand one hundred per cent ready to aid them through the Red Cross."
