PROPOSED HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN OF THE SOUTHWEST

The first move is now under way in Texas to provide **badly** needed hospital facilities for children of the Southwest.

Although the need of specialized childrens hospitals is generally recognized throughout the country, there is no such institution in the entire Southwest, the nearest being located in St. Louis and Denver, according to Dr. B. W. Caldwell, of Chicago, secretary of the American Hospital Association, who has strongly endorsed the Texas project.

Headed by J. Edgar Pew, vicepresident of the Sun Oil Company, a group of leading Texans have formed a Board of Sponsors that will seek establishment of a Texas Childrens Hospital. This body is now being enlarged with representatives from leading cities and towns of the state. It will be the permanent organization of the institution.

The Hospital will be a non-profit non-sectarian institution it is stated. Its doors will be open to children of the Southwest on a basis of complete equality, regardless of financial responsibility. To this end half of its 100 beds will be designated for totally free service and maintained by a \$1,000,000 endowment fund. The hospitl building will cost \$600,000. Ground has already been given across the street/ from the Shrine Crippled Childrens Hospital in Dallas where the two institutions will work in close cooperation. The Shrine Hospital provides for children who have deformed bones. The new hospital will treat those afflicted with the multiple of physical and mental diseases, many of them exclusively the ailments of children.

Realizing that such a hospital cannot fully serve Texas unless its facilities are made wholly available, the institution will be placed at the disposal of physcians throughout the state, not only for the treatment of their own patients, but for research and study of the latest development in that highly specialized branch of medicine, Pediatrics—the' treatment of child diseases.

This entire project had its inception with three men: Mr. G. B. Dealey, publisher of the Dallas morning News; Mr. P. R. Freeman, who recently built a \$70,000 free childrens clinic upon which he settled an endowment of \$200,000, and Mr. W. M. Whitenton, former vicepresident of the M. K. & T. Railroad. These men have interested a large number of equally prominent Texans throughout the state and members are still being invited to the Board of Sponsors, the permanent organization of the hos-

The various departments of the hospital are to be reserved for dohors for their use in the establishment of personal memorials to loved ones or to perpeuate family names, Instead of numbers the various departments and rooms will be known by their memorial names, thus making this hospital a register of those whose enterprise has brought prosperity to Texas and the first place in the entire Southwest for the adequate treatment of children. State headquarters of the undertaking have been opened at 505 Republic Bank Building, Dallas, under the direction of Mr. Pew.

one of the turkey's natural food ines; they fail to remember, if they ever knew, that the turkey's food in its wild state consisted thiefly of insects, beechnuts, acorns, berries, and so forth, with but lit-tle corn. The average poultry rais-er who has not studied Mr. Turkey's former habits of life feeds too much corn and corn-meal, the fat-ter especially. Best First Feed Sour skim milk or buttermilk is the best first feed for baby chicks.

they should be given no feed until they are forty-eight to seventy-two hours old. To feed chicks too early may cause common white dfarrhea. After the first feed of sour milk or buttermilk give a chick grain consisting of equal parts of fine cracked corn and cracked wheat or rolled oats. An unt of scratch feed should be fed five times a day which can be cleaned up in 15 minutes.







FOOD FOR CHICKS GIVEN BY KAUPP

Mash and Grain Should Be Fed First Nine Weeks.

The 100 chicks with which one will start a poultry flock of 50 hens to be raised, will first need 450 pounds of feed up until the ninth week, and thereafter, for the whole year, the 50 hens selected will need 4,250 pounds of feed.

"The 450 pounds of feed needed for the 100 chicks up until the ninth week should be 250 pounds of mash feed and 200 pounds of grain," says Dr. F. B. Kaupp, head of the poul-try department at the North Carolina State college. "Then when the 50 hens are selected from the lot. these hens will need 50 pounds of grain and 35 pounds of mash per hen for a year. This makes a total of 4,250 pounds of feed that should be provided on the home farm. Of amount 2,500 pounds is grain feed and may be supplied by 23 bushels of corn, 24 bushels of oats and 13 bushels of wheat. To supply the 1,750 pounds of mash feed also in the ration, the grower should raise 10 bushels of corn and 11 bushels of oats.

Some additional feed will also be needed on the poultry farm for young and growing birds, therefore, octor Kaupp says, if the average farm keeping a flock of 50 adult hens will produce for the poultry, 25 bushels of corn, 26 bushels of oats and 15 bushels of wheat, the owner will need to buy only about 400 pounds of fish meal or meat meal, 400 pounds of middlings and 75 pounds of bone meal to have his birds well fed.

Doctor Kaupp has worked out a laying mash and a grain feed which has given excellent results on the experimental poultry farms. The successful farmer who keeps a flock of pure-bred poultry as a side-line uld not have to buy his food-They can be raised and stuffs. home with excellent remixed at sults, declares Doctor Kaupp.

Delouse Setter Before

Putting Her on Eggs Before you set any hen not known to be absolutely free of lice, give her some sort of treatment to destroy lice and then see that the nest is clean, with fresh nest material.' The nicotine sulphate treatment recently discovered is one of the easiest ways to delouse a setting hen. Paint a few dabs of it in the bottom of a box just large enough for the hen to sit in, and put her in it over night. It will not deter her from setting but it will destroy all living lice. Now use a destroy all living lice. bit of blue ointment in the region below the vent where lice breed and there will be no lice problems when chicks hatch. If a lousy hen is just about ready to hatch, paint the nicotine sulphate generously in a box that has been warmed to promote rapid evaporation of the fumes, and put the hen in for an hour, covering her eggs with warm flannel in the meantime. Use the blue ointment also to get the nits that may batch.

There are other ways of delonsing which take more time. Whatever is used, do it before the chicks batch and avoid the trouble that

Ginkgo Tree Only One That Has No Enemies

Only one species of plant life now growing in the United States is enemy trying to take without its life, Dr. William A. Taylor, chief of the bureau of plant industry, reported to the house appropriations committee during hearings in Washington.

"This unmolested tree is the Japanese ginkgo tree," Doctor Tay-lor stated. "So far as we know this tree has no insect or fungus enemy at the present time."

It smells more like salt-rising bread in the process of fermentation than any other thing. Chinese laundrymen pick up the fruits, take them home, clean them and eat the kernels."-Kansas City Star's Science Service.

Trap nesting is the only sure way to get an exact record of a bird or flock production, but it is hard work. . . .

According to experience it is not necessary to feed eracked corn when good whole corn can be raised or purchased.

In addition to the mash, the hens should be given all the grain they can eat, especially in the afternoon before roosting time.
