It was recently announced by the Interstate Commerce Commission that livestock and livestock products were to receive only a 3 percent increase in freight charges as compared to 6 and 10 percent granted on other rates. This will result in the saving of thousands of dollars to Texas livestock producers. Early in January railroad in-

terests filed with the ICC for a general ten percent increase in all rail rates. This was granted for passenger and pullman fares while most freight commodities received a six percent increase. All new rates were authorized for the duration of the war and six months thereafter.

The railroad interests also filed to permit charging for equipment furnished by them rather than charging for the equipment ordered by shippers.
