Santa Anna News—The modus operandi of the police department is not open to public view, which explains why two thefts of mohair from the Santa Anna Wool Warehouse and a number of other storage places in West Texas got no publicity until the miscreants were caught.

On April 7th, 180 pounds of wool were taken from the local warehouse and on the 23rd of the month 300 pounds were taken. Sheriff Robey of this county and a number of other West Texas sheriffs were co-ordinating efforts to locate the men who were securing the mohair (the loot was variously referred to as wool and mohair; it could have been either or both, but will be referred to here as mohair). This week three men from near Breckenridge were arrested and charged with burglary and theft of mohair on both dates in Coleman County. All three made statements and are now in jail at Coleman. Arrested were L. D. Williams, Vernon A. C. Williams and J. W. Benson. The mohair looted at the local warehouse was sold in each case in San Saba.

New Federal RESTRICTIONS

PROHIBIT SPECIAL DELIVERIES, CALL BACKS

Order ODT No. 6, issued by the Office of Defense Transportation, which becomes effective June 1, places restriction on delivery service by rubber-tired vehicles.

NO SPECIAL DELIVERIES
may be made except to hospitals, military forces, or for delivery of medicine and other supplies necessary for protection of public health in emergencies.

NO CALL BACKS
may be made regardless of the purpose of the call on any given day. A call back is defined as any call made subsequent to the first call on any one person or firm in any one day.

ONE DELIVERY ONLY
may be made to any one customer except in accordance with the above outlined special deliveries.

MAKE MANDATORY PAYMENT OF BILLS

NEW FEDERAL RULING ON CHARGE ACCOUNTS

Attention is directed to the Reserve Board ruling regarding your account. This law prohibits merchants from charging merchandise to customers, when this customer's account has not been paid in full by the 10th of the month following the purchase. If a customer makes purchases during the month and has a balance previous to May 31, he must pay this bill in full before the 10th of July, the merchant is prohibited from the extension of further credit. These items are paid for, at which time he is allowed to re-open the charge account for further use. The Kerr Mercantile Company is co-operating with the Federal Reserve Board, and asks its customers to serve their accounts as promptly as possible, receipt of statements, and thereby any possibility of having their charge privileges curtailed.

CONSERVE FOR VICTORY

Timely Tips on the Use and Care of Your Electric Refrigerator

Uncle Sam wants you to take good care of your electric equipment—to make it last. Here are some suggestions that will help you get longer life and better service from your always economical electric refrigerator:

- Defrost whenever frost is about 1/4 inch thick. Frost acts as an insulator—retards cold making.
- Be sure door gasket seals tightly. Wipe off any grease that falls on gasket as grease destroys rubber.
- Wash inside of refrigerator, including freezer, with weak baking soda solution each time you defrost.
- Wash exterior with cloth dampened in lukewarm water and mild soap. If non-porcelain, wax occasionally to preserve finish.
- If an open unit model, keep oiled per manufacturer's instructions. Closed unit models need no oiling.
- Remove dust from fins of condenser coils occasionally. Keep unit compartment clean.
- Don't overcrowd shelves. Air circulation is needed for efficient cooling.



- Don't set cold control for lower temperature than necessary. Forty-five degrees is safe.
- Cover all liquids. Moisture drawn to freezer speeds formation of frost.
- Don't put hot foods in refrigerator. Wait until they cool.
- Don't clutter refrigerator with ketchup, canned goods and other items that do not need refrigeration.
- Avoid quick freezing as much as possible. It increases running time of motor.
