Persons interested, who are in class 111-A, should inquire at the local draft board as to what is necessary to make application.

## VICTORY CONCERTS TO AID SALE OF WAR BONDS AND STAMPS

On November 19, at 8:00 p. m. the first of a series of eight Victory Concerts will be presented by the Sanderson High School Band. Admission to the concerts will be free provided that each person who attends buys either a War Stamp or War Bond, of any denomination, at the door. It is emphasized that these stamps and bonds must be bought at the door of the concert. All bonds and stamps so purchased will be retained by the purchasers, the purpose of this plan being to stimulate the purchase of the stamps and bonds.

## Social Security Tax Not to Be Increased For Year 1943

Employers were put on notice this week in a statement issued by Frank Scofield, collector of internal revenue, Southern District of Texas, that there will be no change in the tax rate on Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance on January 1, 1943, as had been anticipated.

Under the provisions of the Revenue Act of 1942 passed by Congress and signed by the President on October 21, the tax rate remains at 1 percent on payrolls of employers and 1 percent on wages paid to employees which must be deducted by the employer and reported to the collector of internal revenue according to Scofield.

"Offices of the Social Security Board located in different cities in my district have received numerous inquiries regarding the proposed increase which was originally scheduled to double the tax in 1943," said Scofield. "Official notice will be mailed out to all employers in due time announcing the freezing of the old-age and survivors insurance tax for the year of 1943. In the meantime, employers have no cause to worry about an increase. Reports will continue to be made as usual and in the same manner, making certain that each employer reports the amount of each employee and the amount of wages paid each employee."

It was emphasized by the collector of internal revenue that collection of taxes under the Social Security Act is the responsibility of the Bureau of Internal Revenue and not the Social Security Board. All reports should be mailed to the office of the collector in Austin.

It was also announced that the actual date of rationing had been postponed and that a new date would be announced later. November 22 had been previously announced as the effective date of rationing.

All automobile owners are advised that they should not fail to appear at the high school building at Sanderson or the Dryden school building on one of these days with their application blank properly filled out. Registrars will be at the schools from 4:00 until 6:00 o'clock on the afternoons of November 19 and 20, and will be there all day Saturday, 21.

Application blanks may be obtained at filling stations or at the ration board office.

## NURSING CLASSES TO CONTINUE IF INTEREST GAINS

As a small share of its contribution to Home Defense, the Red Cross Chapter is doing its utmost to provide an opportunity for everyone to take a course in Home Nursing so that individuals may be better equipped to protect the health of the family and to give good nursing care if the need for such care arises.

According to Mrs. John L. Newton, chairman of the Nursing Activities Committee, Miss Irene Thompson, a Red Cross nurse, has been serving this community since October. Two school and two adult classes are now under way. Since the nurse will be here until January, there is still time for additional classes if there are those who wish to take advantage of this opportunity. Classes may be given in the afternoons or in the evenings according to the convenience of those participating.

Anyone interested in taking this course should see Mrs. Newton as soon as possible. The course requires twenty-four hours and may be completed in six weeks. The material covered includes theory and practice intended especially for health protection and disease prevention. At the conclusion of the course a Red Cross Certificate of award is given.

Miss Thompson is a graduate of the Ravenswood Hospital in Chicago and received her bachelor of science degree from the University of Minnesota, majoring in public health nursing. She has also worked with the Chicago Visiting Nurse Association, with the Wisconsin State Health Department, Indian Service, has been director of the Visiting Nurse Association at Santa Barbara, Calif., and supervisor of a similar association at Kingston, Penn. Just recently she has been employed with the Kellogg Foundation where she was family health counselor for the past four years.

It is felt by those sponsoring the movement that all persons who possibly can should avail themselves of this opportunity to benefit from the experience and teachings of Miss Thompson.

### POWELL, LAMAR TEAMED FOR FIRST TIME IN 'CROSSROADS'

Suspense takes a front seat in the new thrilling drama coming to the Princess Sunday and Monday, "Crossroads". The film is thoroughly believable and entirely engrossing, and unfolds a story of romance and intrigue in Paris just prior to the present war. It stars William Powell and Hedy Lamarr, with Claire Trevor, Basil Rathbone and Margaret Wicherly heading a sterling supporting cast.

Powell plays a French diplomat married to the glamorous Miss Lamarr. Their happiness is threatened when Rathbone and Miss Trevor engineer a blackmail plot against Powell. They charge him with masquerading under a false identity and claim he is really a murderer and thief. The chain of evidence proving Powell to be the ex-criminal is built up in masterly fashion under the skillful direction of Jack Conway.

The situation is loaded with suspense as Powell endeavors to prove his true identity and expose the blackmail plot. With the ghost of his forgotten past looming ominously, Powell probes for the solution.

The picture is a tightly-written, plausible drama. Its characters, in addition to those portrayed by the stars and Miss Trevor, Rathbone and Miss Wicherly, are finely drawn and expertly played.

Powell is superb in his first serious role in some time. Miss Lamarr gives a sympathetic, highly effective portrayal. Basil Rathbone was never more suave and cunning as the blackmailer, while Miss Trevor turns in a surprise performance as the sultry cafe singer and blackmail accomplice.

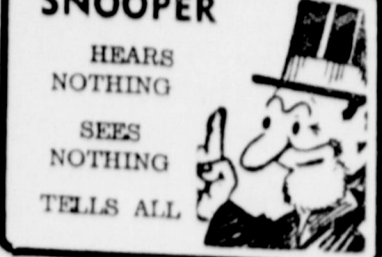

Datus E. Proper of San Antonio, Director of Rotary International and one of fourteen for the entire world, will conduct the forum. Mr. Proper is Executive vice president of the Texas Good Roads Association, publisher of the monthly magazine, and is serving his third term as chairman of the Bexar County Chapter of the American Red Cross. Mr. Proper is a forceful speaker, and, assisted by Roscoe C. Pryor, Governor of the 129th Rotary District, will bring before the forum interesting and timely subjects for discussion.

In spite of the worldwide war, Rotary Clubs continue to function effectively in more than fifty countries of the world, with 205,000 Rotarians in some 5,000 Rotary Clubs.

story of West Texas at war will be sent direct to President Roosevelt, so that he may know that his inspired leadership is appreciated and is being fully supported in this pure American section of the nation.

Also, Bandeen added, the West Texas contribution will be made known to all national agencies directing the war effort. "We have today," he said, "been asked by the Salvage section of the War Production Board to submit the tabulations from our contest questionnaire. Other federal agencies have expressed interest in the results. For this reason we are asking all of our affiliated chambers of commerce and our WTCC directors in non-chamber towns, to expedite their reports, so that this information may be speeded to the federal agencies and to President Roosevelt."
