Failure To Report Wages May Cost Social Security Ins.

Employee Should **Be Sure That Proper Returns Are Made**

"Social security insurance benefits may be lost unless all wages are reported by employers and are posted to each individual's social security account," said Elliott W. Adams, manager of the San Angelo office of the Social Security Board. The number on the account number card that has been issued to each employee is the number of its social security account. That card should be shown to each employer for whom the employee works, and the employee should assure himself that each employer had made an accurate record of the number and name to use in his quarterly payroll reports, he said. Even a very small amount of unreported wages may be very important. Mr. Adams cited one case







It makes no difference how small the amount of wages or how short the period of employment, the law requires the employer to report it, and it must be reported along with the account number and name of the Choir practice, Wednesday at person to whom paid. Every employee, whether a part-time employee, a school child, or a housewife, should show the social security account number card to every employer for whom work is done." The em-

ployer then can report the number with the name and wages, the wages can be posted to the worker's social security account. If all wages are accurately and

completely reported, no widows and orphans of insured men will ever be denied the survivors' insurance that their husband and fathers have work and paid for. If employees will always show their account number card to all their employers, and if all employers will report all wage paid, the payment of retirement insurance to all elderly persons who have earned and paid for it will be assured.






