FUNDS NEEDED BY LOCAL CEMETERY ASSOCIATION

PUMP AND WATER STORAGE TO BE CONSIDERED

Annual dues from those who own lots in the Cedar Grove Cemetery are being collected beginning this week, according to announcement by John L. Newton, president of the Cemetery Association. He also stated that contributions were being asked of all business firms of the town, and of individuals. Those desiring to make contributions toward the improvement and upkeep of the cemetery please contact Mr. Newton or J. T. Dillard, secretary of the organization.

Plans at present call for the installation of a pump jack and engine, and for the construction of water storage facilities at the site of the well which has been drilled for several years. After completion of the well, pipe and rods were bought and installed, but limited funds have made it impossible to install any means of pumping the water or preparing storage space.

The appearance of the cemetery has suffered greatly during the current drought and several trees have died. If the storage facilities can be arranged and the pumping equipment secured, the well will supply ample water for keeping the trees and shrubbery alive during such dry times as the present. Several persons who have lots in the cemetery have contributed materially toward a fund to be used for this purpose, but it will cost much more than is in the treasury at present, Mr. Newton said.

He also stated that the cemetery had been cleaned up this week, and that other improvements were to be made as soon as possible.

ALPINE PILOT TELLS OF EXPERIENCE IN FIGHT WITH JAPS

WAS FORMERLY A RESIDENT OF TERRELL COUNTY

Lt. Tom Stovell, B24 bomber pilot stationed in the Pacific, writes home that he was in a running fight with 12 Nip pursuit planes recently which lasted an hour and a half, which, he said, "was the longest hour and a half I've ever spent in my life."

"They finally got one of our boys, though," Tom said. "I stayed right with him until he hit the water. We made the Nips pay dearly for it though. At least four joined their ancestors and the rest had plenty of holes in 'em. I only got two holes in my ship but, brother, I was sweatin'."

"If you read the papers, you'll see things aren't going too badly over here counting how few are actually here. If we just had a few more B-24 groups here we could really make 'em say uncle."

Tom wrote that while he was stationed in New Guinea he ate in the mess hall with Morgan Terry, also an AAF pilot, but never chanced to see him.—Alpine Avalanche.

Lt. Stovell was formerly a resident of Sanderson and attended the Sanderson Schools for a number of years.

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MISSING IN ACTION—

Word has been received here by A. A. Shelton that Lt. Horace Shelton has been missing in action over Germany since May 24. Lt. Shelton, a co-pilot of a Flying Fortress, had completed most of his twenty-five operational missions over Germany and last word received from him was that he would soon be coming home for a visit. He was awarded the Air Medal and an Oak Leaf Cluster to the medal in April, for exceptional meritorious achievement while participating in ten separate combat missions over Continental Europe. No report as to whether he is a prisoner of war has been received.

At 3:45 in the afternoon on D-Day, June 6, church bells began ringing, the fire siren was sounded, whistles at the roundhouse and on locomotives were blown, calling the population of Sanderson to prayer service, held at the Presbyterian Church at 4:00 o'clock.

After the singing of "Sweet Hour of Prayer", the congregation was led in a prayer for the boys in France by the Rev. John Klassen. Mrs. Russell Walker then sang the "Lord's Prayer," and the congregation joined in singing "God Bless America."

The Rev. James O. Todd then invited those present to call for special prayers for sons, brothers, and husbands in the service. It was surprising to most to learn how many of those present had relatives in England, who might well be in France now.

"God Bless Our Service Boys," was sung by the congregation as a prayer after which the service was dismissed by the Rev. Todd.

McCorkle is a Vice-President, are claiming an interest in said land by virtue of a certain oil and gas lease dated November 3, 1941, covering the entire survey, which lease was executed by the defendant, Katherine M.
