**SCHOOL AID**  
School teachers are influential people. They choose their calling because they love children and love influencing children. Youngsters, in turn, come to their homes and parents more than they realize; in ways they don't know about. Thus a teacher is a power in the community. ## Good Attendance At Program For SP Service Day

### Principal Address Is Brought By Supt. Tom Holley

A good crowd was present Wednesday morning for the special program in observance of the Southern Pacific Service Day, which was held in the park between the hotel and the depot at 10:00 o'clock.

Colors were advanced at the opening of the program by members of the American Legion after which the entire gathering sang "The Star Spangled Banner", led by D. L. Duke. Mr. Duke who acted as master of ceremonies, sang "The Yanks Are There", latest song written by J. A. Oberling which was sung for the public for the first time.

In the main address, brought by Tom Holley, superintendent of schools, it was pointed out that more than 15,000 men had gone into the services from the Southern Pacific system, with approximately 500 of them going from the San Antonio division. Mr. Holley also commended the splendid service that had been maintained by the system, even with the constant loss of men, and with the necessity of putting back into service equipment that had at one time been discarded as obsolete or worn out. This applies to both passenger equipment and freight cars.

Also said tell his wife and little daughter, Jean, that he is well and doing fine. His daughter's name is Jeanene.

Jack Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Smith of Dryden, was a radioman and has been listed as missing for several months.

Pfc. Dick L. Sullivan, stationed somewhere in the South Pacific with the Marines, writes Larry Horgan an interesting letter. He says in part: "I saw my first action in the Marshalls, and got in a few hot spots, but it wasn't too d--n bad. Can tell you about it all some of these days. A guy sees a lot of things, and I'm glad to have seen some of it. It was worth it to see how everything is done. I have a few Japs to my credit so feel I did some good."

Dick says, "I saw Kenneth Litton Sunday for about thirty minutes. Sure enjoyed seeing him. He is doing fine and looks good." His letter was dated May 31, so he must have seen Kenneth on Sunday, May 28. He also stated that about all he had been doing was training—just the same old routine. Says he likes his outfit fine. That most of the islands over there are similar . . . coconut trees, natives, jungles, etc.
