JACK FRANK CAVENDER

was graduated from the Sanderson high school with the class of 1928. Cavender, chief electrician's mate, had 10 years service in the United States Navy, and saw action in the battle of the Phillipines. In this battle he was cited for bravery when he and a companion faced heavy artillery fire to return a small boat from Corregidor to their ship. He was reported missing at the fall of Corregidor. later being reported a prisoner in a Jap concentration camp on the island. On September third last year. his sister, Mrs. John L. Newton, was advised through the American Red Cross that he had died August 16, 1943, in a Japanese prison camp on Famosa Island.
