## LOCAL POST-OFFICE TO ADVANCE TO SECOND CLASS EFFECTIVE JULY FIRST

### POSTMASTER ASKS PUBLIC TO OBSERVE NEW REGULATIONS

The Sanderson post-office is to advance to a second class office effective July 1st, according to announcement by Postmaster Clyde Griffith this week. In making the announcement Mr. Griffith pointed out the new regulations which will be enforced and expressed hope that the public would cooperate in putting them into effect.

It was pointed out that the office would be opened each

morning at 8:00 o'clock and close at 6:00 in the afternoon each week-day with the exception of Saturday. Opening time will be the same but the office will be closed at 1:00 o'clock each Saturday afternoon.

Attention was also called to the fact that all employees were now placed under civil service with specific hours for work. No window service will be had on Saturday after 1:00 p. m., or on Sundays or holidays. The new regulations also prohibit service before or after hours, according to Mr. Griffith, and he asks that the public please refrain from requesting such service.

Distribution of mails on Sundays and holidays will be restricted to first class mail in compliance with these regulations. During the week days when mail arrives during business hours, there will be no general delivery service until the distribution of the mails has been completed. This regulation does not affect the sale of postage stamps, securing money orders, or other business, but even though you will be able to secure a three cent stamp the employees are not permitted at the same time to hand out general delivery mail.

The change in the post-office was brought about by the increased revenue in the local office, and will mean the addition of an additional clerk. Those who will serve the public at the windows, beside the postmaster, will be Mrs. D. M. Wells, Miss Althea Fowler and Prince Dishman.

Mr. Griffith stated that the regulations which must be followed are made by the post-office department, and not by the local office, and that he hoped that the people who are served at Sanderson would realize that he must abide by the rules and regulations and would cooperate to the fullest.

## Gelatin Improves Appearance of Rayon Dresses

### Clothing Specialist Gives Formula for Proper Application

A box of gelatin may have a place with your home laundry aids, as well as in your kitchen cupboard.

Gelatin is a good remedy for rayon dresses that become limp and wrinkle easily after washing. Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, clothing specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says the process is simple: Just dip the dress in a gelatin solution.

Starching is not successful with most rayon fabrics, Mrs. Barnes explains, but plain, granulated gelatin, softened and when dissolved in water likely will give the needed "body" or filling. The amount of gelatin used will depend on the stiffness desired, but usually two table-spoons should be enough. You might use less for sheer rayon. Mrs. Barnes says:

Here are her directions: First, soak the gelatin a few minutes in a little cold water, then dissolve with boiling water. Pour the solution in a bowl large enough to hold the dress and add enough cold water to be comfortable to your hands. After the dress is washed and rinsed, dip it in the gelatin solution and squeeze it gently. Then roll the dress in a thick bath towel until it is dry enough to iron. Finally, remember that ironing rayon requires low heat."

Mrs. Barnes says she also has tried gum arabic with similar success and that borax is good for stiffening lace collars. Instructions for their use, however, differ from the instructions for using gelatin.

## PRIORITY REFERRALS OF MALE WORKERS IN EFFECT IN AREA SERVED BY MARFA

### TERRELL COUNTY WORKERS NOT IN PRESENT ORDER

Priority of all male workers will be placed in effect in counties served by the Marfa office of the U.S. Employment Service, War Manpower Commission on July 1, according to G. W. Fuller, manager of the Marfa USES office.

This priority referral plan will be established on a nation wide basis on the above date, Mr. Fuller said, and is not a new radical departure from established procedures. Heretofore this plan has been established and is in operation in acute labor shortages areas. It has proven most

effective in dealing with these shortages. It is now to become nation wide and provides that all employers except those in agriculture, shall hire all new male workers only from those referred by the WMC-U.S. Employment Service or under arrangements made with the USES.

The counties of Presidio, Jeff Davis, and Brewster are included under this priority referral plan; and arrangements are being made with employers in Terrell County to exclude them so long as general provisions of the Stabilization Plan are complied with. This has been done due to the excessive distance employers or workers living in Sanderson, would be forced to travel to reach the Marfa office. Arrangements have also been made with the various mining companies established in the Terlingua quicksilver area for this same reason. All other new male workers hired by employers in the counties of Presidio, Jeff Davis, or Brewster, however, should be hired only upon referral by the Marfa USES office.

This program has been given some publicity on a national and regional level and is only being put into effect after consultation with and advice from representatives of labor and management. Area Labor-Management Committees and local Appeal Panel Committees have also been consulted; and both worker and employer are fully protected by an effective system of appeals which is in operation in all phases of the War Manpower Commission program.

Mr. Fuller stated that he anticipated the same help and cooperation from workers, employers, and the general public that has enabled the War Manpower Commission thus far to meet demands of war production for manpower on a voluntary basis. "We have come to the point where we cannot fight a global war on an individual city, county, or state basis any longer," said Mr. Fuller. "This program of priority referral means that WMC will channel needed workers, wherever they may be found, to the high priority were necessary jobs, within and without this region on a national basis."

F. has been in foreign service for the past year, serving the past nine months on a Liberator bomber as radioman and gunner. Meats, Fats—Red stamps A8 through W8, good indefinitely; X8, Y8, Z8, become good July 2.

Processed Foods—Blue stamps A8 through V8, good indefinitely; W8, X8, Y8, Z8, and A5, become good July 1.

Sugar—Sugar stamps 30, 31 and 32 each good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canning sugar through February, next year.

Gasoline — In states outside the East Coast area, A-12 coupons, good through September 21. Shoes—Airplane stamp 1 and 2, good indefinitely.
