Search for Eleuterio Zomora Estale Charged With Murder in Death Of Francisca Hernandez Continues

The county-wide search for Eleuterio Zomora Estale, charged with murder in connection with the death of Francisca Hernandez, 14-year-old Sanderson girl, was still underway through Friday of this week.

According to the indictment Estale is accused of shooting the Hernandez girl twice with a .38-caliber Luger, Sunday afternoon October 28, in the south part of the town, then taking to the hills in the direction of the Mexican border.

Deputy Sheriff Andy Anderson, who was called to the scene immediately following the shooting, gave chase, as it was reported exchanged shots with Estale as he disappeared into the hills.

Sheriff Jim Nance who was in a Del Rio Hospital, recovering from a gun-shot wound in the leg received accidentally, when his gun fell from his holster and discharged on hitting the floor arrived in Sanderson Monday to take active charge of the search.

Calls were made to nearby towns for assistance in apprehending Estale, and Sheriff A. E. Steinmetz, of Val Verde County arrived Sunday night with his bloodhounds to assist in the hunt, however the dogs, after picking up the trail, and following it for several hours failed to find the murderer.

In addition to several officers from out-of-town, who were here for several days assisting the local officers, three airplanes were brought in and scoured the country between Sanderson and the Rio Grande but up to Friday no trace of the fugitive has been found.

FAIR PLAY

Unequal advantages in any kind of contest spoil the sport for most Americans. A sense of fairness is deeply rooted in our people. Sometimes a champion athlete is not a popular favorite because the fans suspect some mysterious advantage that makes him invincible. Actually exposing crookedness in a professional team is all it takes to bankrupt the club, because fairness is cardinal.

Practically all forms of competition take on the features of a game in this country; business and politics are no exceptions. It has been said that "all's fair in love and war," but it might be said another way: When emotions overcome reason, people forget to be fair. The contestant who gets all worked-up regrets it because his public turns against him if he is unfair.

Popular Decision

The public has taken a hand occasionally in the bout between those heavy-weight contestants Capital and Labor. Until very recently, labor was the popular favorite, and the choice was sane. The laborer has been "the man on the bottom" in many lands for countless years and sympathy for the underdog is a human trait. But this generation of Americans has seen the tables turn.

Labor in the United States is not the underdog—far from it. Every mature person, who has given the subject any thought at all, knows that Capital is no match for Labor in this country now. Labor has a club that management can't use, the strike. What is even more, management has no weapon that will approximately match it in force and violence, and has no defense from it.

Times Are Changed

There was a time when an employer could fire a competent workman for voting wrong. A straw-boss once could dismiss a female subordinate for resenting his overtures. Intelligent persons were let out for expressing general discontent over long hours, low wages and unwholesome surroundings. It was disgraceful. It was also a long time ago. It was not fair. The public resented it and stopped it.

People still remember those days. Nobody cares much now if employers have to hire whom the union says hire, pay what the union says pay and blow the whistle by the union official's watch. But there is something that the public does care about, namely strikes. When a home owner's family shivers in a cold house for want of fuel he is anxious to buy, he finds out why.

Unfairness Shows

In finding out why, people discover Labor's unequal advantage. John Q. Public might not frown on a strike over wages or hours, but he gets plenty huffy doing without necessities while somebody retaliates a grievance—or while men sit idle, trying to force a point that might better be settled peaceably, with both shifts working and business going on as usual.

Strikes are violent and unfair, and the public dislikes them. Destructive as arson, they hurt many people instead of one. I am a life-long friend of Labor, and I predict that strikes will be outlawed by popular indignation. The lockout and the blacklist were so outlawed. Peaceful ways to settle industrial disputes exist now. Unless they are used voluntarily, we can look for the public to create some compulsory method.

THE OZONA STOCKMAN—Ted Powers of San Angelo, former Ozonan, won top roping honors at the GI Celebration and War Fund show in San Angelo Sunday afternoon performance, in which another Ozonan, Vic Montgomery was billed in a matched roping against Lanham Riley of Randolph Field.

Powers defeated Sonny Edwards of Big Spring in the afternoon's featured match, coming from behind on the last calf to win 119.5 seconds to 123.3. After seven calves in the thrilling eight-calf match, Edwards held a one second lead on Powers. On the eighth calf, Edwards broke the barrier for a 10-second penalty. He wrapped up with the penalty added, his total time was 22.9. Powers took the match by roping his final calf in 16.1 seconds.

Sgt. Riley roundly defeated Vic Montgomery in their match for eight calves. Riley's time was 150.6 to 232.5 for Montgomery.

In the jack-pot roping of the afternoon, Ted Powers topped the field by tying his calf in 14.4 seconds. Second and third places were split by Vic Montgomery and Sonny Edwards, each turning in a time of 15 seconds flat.

THE BIG BEND SENTINEL Marfa—An early Thursday announcement by the Public Relations office at Marfa Army Air Field gave the last day of November as the time when the military installation would be temporarily inactivated.

The announcement was based on the following message which was received from the Board of Public Relations, War Department, Washington: "You are authorized to announce the temporary inactivation of Marfa Army Air Field on or about the thirtieth of November."

THE ALPINE AVALANCHE—The Alpine area got its first touch of winter weather of the season when thermometers tumbled to an unofficial low of 30 here Monday morning. The official reading at the college that morning was 32.

The drop in temperature was accompanied by a heavy frost which nipped all the most tender vegetation. Maximum temperature of the week was recorded last Friday—83. A trace of precipitation was recorded Wednesday. The official minimum yesterday morning was 38.

THE FORT STOCKTON PIONEER—Humble Oil & Refining Company is in process of completing a substantial producer for the northwest side of the Fort Stockton field—its No. 1 Underwood having flowed 71 barrels of fluid in 4 hours—with 80% being oil and the remainder water. Testing continued.

Humble also staked an offset to its new producer—No. 2 Underwood, 603.1 feet from the south and 655.3 feet from the west line of the SE 1/4 of Sec. 20 Block 119, GC&SF.

In the south side of the same field, Olson Drilling Company contractor on the Texas No. 1 Bennett, which burned 63 hours last week-end when gas became

ignited, has replaced the destroyed rig with new equipment and this week was attempting to free the original drillpipe which struck in the hole during the fire-fighting operations. It will continue drilling when the pipe is freed.

Helmerich & Payne Cardinal has a new location in the White & Baker field, its No. 26-B White & Baker, 2350 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east line, Sec. 36, Block Z, TCRR. Gulf No. 1 G. R. White et al 9,000-foot wildcat three miles west of the Yates field in Sec. 16, Block Z, TCRR, was rigging up.

Skelly No. 1 Colden estate, Simpson wildcat midway between the Abell and APCO-Warner fields, was drilling below 4,554 feet.

Local Ration Board Will Remain Open For Limited Time

Reduction of the number of War Price and Rationing Boards of 87 counties and of personnel in the San Antonio district Office of Price Administration, will result in the reduction of approximately 220 employees by October 31, and annual saving of approximately \$275,000, according to C. T. Giesen, director of the San Antonio OPA district.

Giesen explained that the consolidation of boards, which is now being accomplished, will be completed in this district by December 31, with the release, at that time, of a total of 265 employees, and total savings of approximately \$415,000.

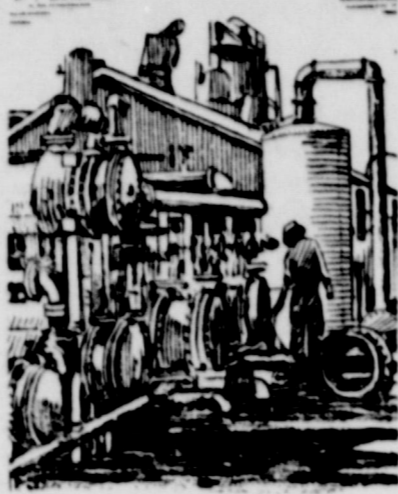
Boards are being retained in centrally located towns and

cities, the district director said so that they may serve several counties with the utmost convenience to all citizens of those areas. In each county an office will be maintained where a board employee, usually the former chief clerk of the board will accept applications. These applications will then be forwarded to the board serving that county. (Brewster County) for final processing. Board members in counties where boards are closed, will continue to represent their counties by serving on the central board.

Consolidation of War Price and Rationing Boards was announced recently by Giesen as part of the Government's post-war economy program. Personnel released as a result of the consolidation was notified of impending changes in ample time to find other employment.

The Terrell County Board will be open for some time yet, and Mrs. John Newton will be in charge.
