Livestock Situation At the Los Angeles Union Stock Yards

LOS ANGELES UNION STOCK YARDS, November 23.—The cattle market, the past week, was in more or less of a turmoil, with excessive supplies of low grade cows meeting a very poor outlet with resultant daily holdovers complicating the situation. However, the extreme close of the period found the outlook a bit more encouraging with state holdings pretty well absorbed.

Compared with closing rounds of the previous week medium and good steers finished on a steady to strong footing but common to medium kinds weak to 25c lower. Extreme top 18.60 the local ceiling, on a few head of choice 1248 lb. steers. A load of 1107 lb Imperial Valley steers brought \$17.35 while bulk of medium to good steers moved at \$15 to \$16.60. Some common to medium grassers, mostly Mexican and Brahman, went at \$12 to \$14.25, with some on the cutter order down to \$11.00 and below.

Medium and good cows were largely 25c to 50c lower, while canners and cutters were in many instances fully 50c to 75c and in instances \$1 under the previous week, low spots in more than a year being uncovered on these. A few shelly canners dropped to \$3 or lower, though not a great many sold under \$5. Most cutters \$7 to \$8, with medium to good cows ranging \$9 to \$11, largely, a few best young cows \$11.50 to \$12.50.

Heifers registered little change medium to good shortfeds selling at \$13 to \$15, with commoner grassy kinds down to \$11 and below. Bulls closed weak to slightly lower, with a few sales above \$11.50. Odd head, however, ranged \$12 to \$13. Demand continued broad for stocker and feeder cattle, though there was some minor downturn on stock cows. Well fleshed feeder steers earned \$14.25 to \$15.10, with numerous sales of yearlings and calves at \$11.50 to \$14.

Nearly half of the week's receipts in the hog division consisted of feeder pigs. Commercial hogs remained unchanged at ceiling levels with \$15.80 taking most good a and choice butchers. Sows held at \$15.05. Prices eased on feeder pigs, bulk dropping to a \$19 to \$21 basis. A few sold down to \$17 under with a few best lights above the \$21 line.

Sheep and lambs were fully steady under very restricted receipts. A few good lambs at \$14.50 with choice descriptions possible eligible to \$14.75 or better.

More than 2,900 men thus far have agreed to serve as local chairman in their communities for the Victory Clothing Collection for overseas relief scheduled for January 7-31, Henry J. Kaiser, national chairman for the drive, announced tonight.

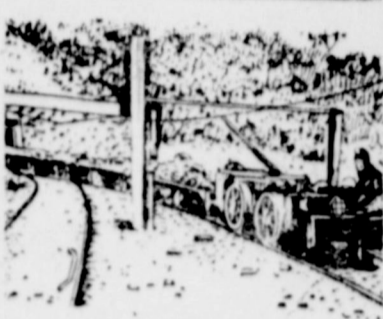

Announce December 5 as Election Day For Terrell County AAA Committeemen

Special Agent M. W. Acers Is Visitor In Sanderson This Week

M. W. Acers, special agent in charge of the San Antonio field division of the FBI, who was in Sanderson earlier in the week visiting with the Sheriff's Department said that figures recently compiled by the FBI reflect an increase of 10.3 per cent in crime during the first nine months of 1945 compared to the same in 1944.

Crime reports, which were compiled by FBI headquarters in Washington, D.C., on the basis of nation-wide reports to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, revealed increases in eight classifications of major offenses, Acers said.

Gains in the number of crimes included 7.8 per cent for murder and non-negligent manslaughter 6.6 per cent for manslaughter by negligence, 7.8 per cent for rape, 7.8 per cent for rape, 15.4 per cent for burglary, 3.4 per cent for larceny and 14.2 per cent for automobile theft.

The figures were based upon reports from more than 380 cities with a population in excess of 50,000.

The continued upsurge in crime is indicated by an overall increase of 15.8 per cent in September of this year compared with the same month of 1944. Automobile thefts were up 39.4 per cent, robbery 31.8 per cent and burglary 23.7 per cent, Acers pointed out.

Many Men Entitled To Survivors And Insurance Benefits

Many men who were near 65 years of age or who passed that age when they entered employment after the war began, will be entitled to monthly old-age and survivors insurance when they retire. The amount of the monthly payments will be based on the wages and the length of time the individual has worked in covered employment, according to Elliott W. Adams, manager of the San Angelo Social Security Board Office.

When the wife of such individual reaches 65, she too will be entitled to monthly benefits based on her husband's earnings record. Her monthly benefit will equal one half the amount to her husband.

Any office of the Social Security Board will be glad to explain in detail the procedure and tell you how and when claims should be filed, said Mr. Adams.

Three-Fourths of War Fund Quota Raised In Terrell County

A little over three-fourths of Terrell County's quota in the War Fund drive has been subscribed to date. A total of 81.2 per cent has been raised since the start of the drive.

An extension of 30 days was made in an effort to complete the quota for the state in a proclamation issued by Governor Coke Stevenson the first of November. This extension expires on the 30th of this month. Everyone is urged to give to this worthy cause, to help the hungry millions all over the world, and to furnish entertainment to our men who are still in service of their country. We have one week to make this deadline, let's put Terrell County over the top.

Rev. Clifford Spencer, pastor of the Sanderson Baptist Church was the main speaker for the service, talking on the subject: "Faith of Our Fathers." Commencing with the "Pilgrim Fathers," who came over on the Mayflower in 1620, he spoke of many of our great men—Washington, Jackson, Lincoln, Wilson and others, showing by their faith in God, they helped to build and guide our great nation.

Shortage of Hotel Accommodations At Separation Centers

New Orleans, Nov. 23.—A warning that an acute shortage of hotel accommodations and housing facilities exists at all Navy Separation Centers was issued to relatives of servicemen who are contemplating joining their Navy husbands, sweethearts, and sons and daughters at these discharge points.

Already overcrowded conditions in the localities of the Separation Centers has made it necessary for Navy Officials to issue an appeal to the relatives of servicemen and women to avoid further confusion by delaying their planned reunions with their loved ones until the veterans are discharged and return to their homes.

The influx of the World War II veterans to the Separation Centers, already swarming with Navy personnel stationed at these facilities, has created a critical shortage of rooms.

Housing authorities explained that the appeal to the relatives and friends of the service is made in hope of avoiding further hardships. Hundreds of families and friends of the veterans are arriving daily at the Separation Centers only to find it impossible to find housing accommodations.

Compliance with this request it was pointed out, also will help relieve the rail and bus transportation problem and thus make it possible for more servicemen to be transferred to the Separation Centers for discharges.

Sugar Coupons For Canning Are Good Until December 1

Coupons for five pounds of sugar to be used for home canning will be good only through November 30, E. C. Keefe, food rationing officer of the San Antonio district Office of Price Administration, said today.

Keefe pointed out, however that Sugar Stamp No. 38, in War Ration Book Four, will continue good for five pounds of sugar through December 31.

December 5 has been set as the date for the election of AAA county committeemen for the coming year. The polling place will be at the Terrell County Court House.

At this time three county committeemen and two alternates will be chosen for this county according to the announcement.

The AAA chairman of Terrell County urges all ranchmen of this county to remember the date of this election, and to cast their ballot on that date.

Sample ballots have been mailed to the ranchmen of this county with the names of the men to be voted on for the different offices. Also a letter has been sent, each of them telling of the plans for the year 1946. The following letter has been sent out to all ranchmen of this county:

"An invitation to attend the election of officers, or should I say, the County Committee for the Terrell County Agricultural Conservation Association Committee for the year 1946. As per every year comes the time for the election of new officers or the re-election of the present ones to the offices for another year. It is a portion of your duty as a rancher who participates in the Agricultural Conservation Program from year to year, to drop by the polling place on this date in order to cast your ballot for one of the two men nominated for each of the five offices on the committee.

"With the coming of the 1946 program, we find many changes in procedure, and this is one of them. You will vote by secret ballot as you would in any other County, State, or National Election, and these ballots have been prepared by the local office for your convenience. You will also find the polling place open all day for your convenience, and you are urged to give this matter your very careful consideration in order that the affairs of this office may continue to be administered with all fairness and justice as has been done in the past.

"In 1946 it is going to be more important than ever to see that you have a good strong committee, for under the 1946 program we will not have a general allotment set-up as in the past for each ranch, but rather for the ranches who will participate in the program. There will be a limited amount of money to be spent in the county for all practices instead of a limited allowance, and then an unlimited one as we have had in the past. This is going to increase the responsibilities of each member of the committee, for it is their duty to see that proper practices are carried out and funds made available with which to make payment.

"On the basis of the above information you can understand just how important it is for you to be in town on this date and cast a ballot for the men of your choice. Please, we urge you, let us see you here on this date in the interest of ranching and the ranchers of Terrell County, Texas."

Gov. Coke Stevenson Sets Date For Sale Of Christmas Seals

AUSTIN.—Calling attention to the fact that tuberculosis is communicable, Governor Coke Stevenson has issued a proclamation officially designating the period November 19 to Christmas for the sale of Christmas Seals.

Governor Stevenson pointed out that the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated county associations which conduct the seal sale, use seal funds for a health program which should be supported by all residents of Texas.

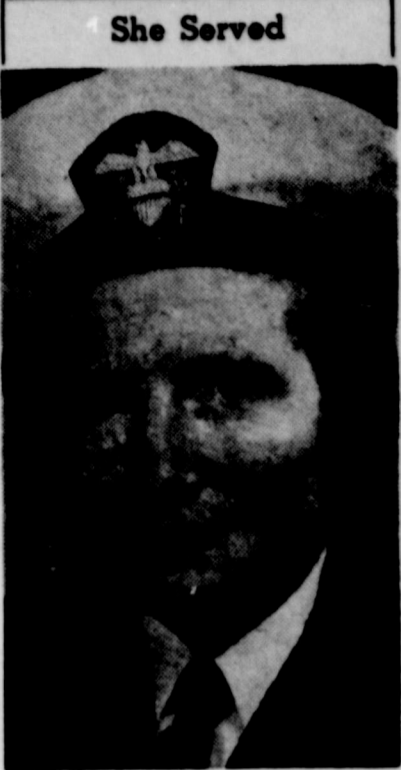
The governor's proclamation follows:

WHEREAS, tuberculosis is a communicable disease which last year took 3,006 lives in this State; and

WHEREAS, a rise in the incidence of the disease in several states last year may portend a general post-war increase in tuberculosis, as has already occurred in Europe; and

WHEREAS, the sale of Christmas Seals by the Texas Tuberculosis Assn. and its affiliated county associations supports a health program designed to protect the citizens of our state from the spread of this insidious disease;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Coke Stevenson, governor of Texas, do hereby officially designate Nov 19-Dec. 25, 1945, as THE PERIOD FOR THE SALE OF CHRISTMAS
