Unemployment Claims Masons Have Charge **Of Funeral Services Held Friday Morning**

Funeral services for W. J. Ferguson, long-time resident of Sanderson, were held Friday Morning at 10 o'clock at the Masonic Hall, with the Masons in full charge of the services. Interment was in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Mr. Ferguson died from a heart attack about 2:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon while at work at the Standard Oil Whole sale plant of which he was agent.

Mr. Ferguson came to Sanderson about 1904, working for some time as a section foreman on the railroad, and for a time worked as a ranch hand in this section. Later he worked for the Kerr Mercantile Company, after which he went into the automobile business which he operated at the time of his death

Prevent Pneumonia

AUSTIN, Jan. 18-According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, pneumonia caused over 1,934 deaths during the first ten months of the past year in Texas, a reduction over the previous year but still too high. It is more prevalent during the winter and spring months.

Pneumonia is usually caused by a germ called the pneumocochomes as low as is consistent when we go out.

Another method of prevention in pneumonia is not to neglect a cold, for the common cold often results in pneumonia when neglected. A person with a severe temperature persists or the cold lingers on. He should follow his physician's advice until the cold has disappeared.

Legion Wins Fight To Ease Entry Of 66,000 G. I. Brides

WASHINGTON, D. C .- The American Legion has won its fight for the legal admission to the United States of an estimated 66,000 G. I. brides of World War II. However, these brides will face a two-year wait before they can become American citizens.

The 27th nationl convention in Chicago last November adopted a resolution to support legislation designed to facilitate entry into this country of foreign nationals married to members of the American armed forces abroad. In compliance with this mandate the Legion threw its support behind H. R. 4857, which is now Public Law 271.

The Department of Justice expects the first big rush of applications for visas under the new Sunday law to start in February. They will come from many European countries and from Australia and New Zealand.

1. Register with the American consul in her country.

2. Obtain a visa.


3. On arrival in America present the visa to port of entry officials who will forward it to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization in Phildaephia.

4. Before completing two years of residence in the United States, file a preliminary petition for citizenship.

5. At the end of two years of residence, file a formal petition for citizenship.

6. Attend a court hearing to determine if she is eligible to be naturalized.



THE EDITOR'S COLUMN

Several times in this space, I have invited producers of agricultural products to come and see us. As a result of this, we have had quite a number of visitors. Conversations with these visitors have been very interesting and helpful to me and have brought out many of the ideas which producers have regarding the livestock and meat industry.

Some recent conversations indicated that quite a number of producers think that there are less than a hundred meat packers in the United States, in fact some thought there were as few as ten. This idea seems to come from the fact that many of them ship their livestock to only one market and are familiar only with the number of meat packing plants at that market. I am sure that it will interest all of you to know that there are more than 3,500 meat packers in the United States. In addition, there are upwards of 22,500 other commercial slaughterers.

The only way those 26,000 companies and people can make money in their business is to sell meat. And to sell meat they must buy livestock. So all over the country-from Portland, Oregon, to Portland, Maine, from the Rio Grande to the Canadian border-these competing livestock buyers are bidding against each other for the essential material of their businesses-the cattle, calves, hogs, and sheep produced by American farmers and ranchers. The buyers who get that livestock are the ones who F.M. Simpson. Agricultural Research Department bid the highest prices in their particular areas.
