At the reorganization meeting held in Del Rio last Thursday for the purpose of advertising U. S. Highway 90, H. F. Moody of Del Rio, was elected president. There were representatives from seven cities along the route.

At the meeting, which was held in the Roswell Hotel, a copy of the original charter of the Mexican Border Trails Association was presented and read to those attending. A decision to maintain the name of the association according to the original plan was made. The organization for the promotion of tourist traffic in this section of Texas has been called the Highway 90 Association at times.

T. A. Beard of Alpine was elected vice-president and Jas. C. Nettis of Del Rio was named secretary-treasurer.

Among the directors named Thursday was Ray Turner of this city. Others named, were E. F. King of Marfa, Ralph King of Presidio, F. L. McCollum of Alpine, George Humphreys of Comstock, Sam H. Walk of Del Rio and Bernard Fitzsimon of Brackettville.

As the charter provides for 15 directors the remaining needed will be named by the El Paso Chamber of Commerce, Van Horn Rotary Club, the Marathon Service Club, the Brackettville Rotary Club, the Uvalde Sabin, Hondo, and San Antonio Chambers of Commerce.

The members decided at Thursday's meeting that when there was a full membership of the board of directors plans for the publicizing of Highway 90 will be discussed.

### Sanderson Now Receiving Service From New Highline

Sanderson began receiving highline service on last Thursday when at 6 o'clock that afternoon the new 64 1/2 mile, 69kv transmission line extending from here to Ft. Stockton was energized for the first time.

The line, built by the Community Public Service Co., and one of the company's largest projects in recent years, traverses some of the toughest terrain in West Texas. Built of No. 1-0 aluminum wire, it is of three-phase triangular construction with post-type insulators. A 600 kva. substation here steps down the current from transmission to distribution voltage.

The Deisel power plant here that has been serving, will be dismantled, cleaned and repaired and put back for use in case of any emergency. The plant is now closed.

Plants at Pecos, Girvin and Red Bluff supply the power for the highline.

Roger Thurmond, District Attorney represents the state and is assisted by Jack Hayre, County Attorney of Terrell County.

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THE BEGINNING OF CIVILIZATION

The State Department has drawn up an American proposal for international atomic control to be submitted to the United States Nations, which is encouraging. The proposal is based upon a report written for the State Department by a committee of leading scientists and business men who literally worked night and day for two months as practical men trying to find a solution to a practical problem.

Life Magazine sums up their efforts in the following words: "Their answer—sensibly recognizes that not even the atom can frighten nations into mutual trust. So—the report would set up an Atomic Development Authority which would work toward full international control by stages, none of them irreversible. In effect the U. S. would share its atomic secrets with the ADA only as Russia and other countries give ADA personnel, the right to free entry and inspection of all atomic facilities. The ADA would gradually take title to all uranium deposits and processing plants and would also build them in other countries. But it would do this on such a schedule that at every step 'any nation such as the U. S. will still be in a relatively secure position, compared to any other nation.'"

"An important fact turned up by the committee is that fissionable material can be 'denatured,' i. e., rendered useless for explosives while useful for peaceful applications. The ADA would distribute only denatured plutonium among member countries. To turn this into the dangerous variety can only be done by a difficult and hard-to-conceal process."

If mankind can adjust itself constructively to the atomic age it will for the first time be justified in applying for the term "civilization" to its collective endeavors.

INFLATION NOT NUMBER ONE PROBLEM

Controlling inflation is not the nation's number one problem. The number one problem is how to preserve representative government in the face of inflation. It may be impossible to control inflation due to natural forces over which the people have no control. It is possible to preserve representative government because that is a political question and political questions are clearly within the power of the people to decide.

The argument is often heard that unless inflation is controlled, the resulting chaos will automatically destroy freedom and history is called upon to support an argument. But in answer to this it can be said that there has never been another nation in history like the United States. Her people are highly literate, closely integrated by modern communication and transportation, and well informed on the problems of the day. They have been taught almost from the cradle that their heritage of independence is their most valued possession. Nothing can take this heritage away from them. If it is lost, they alone must lose it. If they permit it to be lost in the turmoil of transitory economic upsets they deserve to lose. But they should realize now that the suffering of inflation will be as nothing compared to the suffering of political tyranny once it has secure hold upon their lives. No, inflation is not the nation's number one problem.

THE CATCH IS HUMAN NATURE

Usually when people are forced into doing what they do not want to do, or think they cannot do, or when natural laws are contravened by man-made laws the reaction is ineluctable. Compulsory health insurance is one of these instances. If it is adopted, the financial cost may boomerang in unexpected ways against the millions it was designed to protect. For example, it proposed that half the cost of government-controlled medical care payroll deduction of the employer. This sounds good to the worker but many economists believe that such a levy against employers would so upset the economic system that, in the end, the worker would have to pay both his own and his employer's share.

According to an authority who has spent fifteen years studying the actual working of compulsory health insurance in various countries, "this might happen in any one of a number of ways. The price of goods might go up, and his (the worker's) wages buy less. The employer might substitute for some workers, and cut production to lay off others. Unemployment would result, and a wage cut would follow. Certain economists contend that the resulting wage plus the employer's tax would just equal the former wage. If such a contention is true, the worker will have to decide whether health insurance is worth 6 per cent of his income to him. That is almost half again as much as he now pays—on the average—for medical attention."

It is the old story. You can't get something for nothing.

COSTLY LOAFING

The magazine Newsweek of April 8 published the following brief item: "In February, the Labor Department reported strikes lost the nation 21,500,000 mandays of work. At \$1 an hour, the level of average hourly wages the department found in its last survey, February strikes cost the workers \$172,000,000. In February, 1929, strikes took only 156,000 man-days. At 65 cents an hour, the 1929 yearly average they cost \$706,368. In February 1939, strikes took 553,000 man-days. At the 1939 yearly average of 63.3 cents an hour, they cost \$2,800,392."

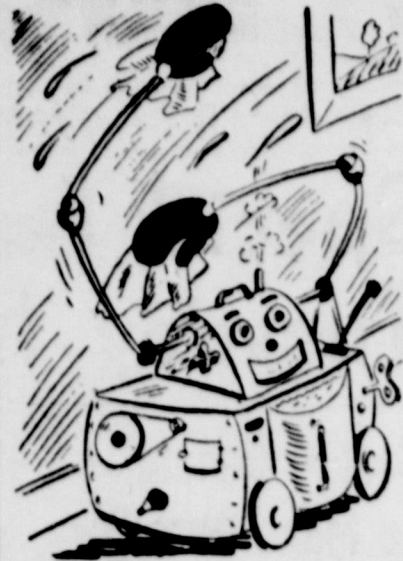

Questions—Answers

Q How does the Veterans Administration determine the amount of pension to be paid a disabled veteran?

A. The Veterans Administration has rating boards that review the veteran's medical records. These boards decide how much he is disabled and award him a pension based on the percentage of his disability. The awards range from \$11.50 to \$115.00 per month.

Q When a veteran applies for a loan to buy a home does he have to pay the appraisal fee on the property?

A. Yes. However, the veteran may arrange with the lender for payment of this fee out of the loan.

Q Can a veteran go to a college or school as long as he wants to?

A. Veterans are entitled to one year of schooling, plus one month of schooling for each month of active duty in the armed services up to a maximum of 4 years.

Q If a veteran becomes disabled while taking on-the-job training, is this considered the same as a service-connected disability?

A. Yes.

Q Are all veterans entitled to free private dental care?

A. No. Only veterans with service-connected conditions are entitled to this service.

Q Can a veteran convert his National Service Life Insurance policy into a 20-year or 30-year endowment policy?

A. No. He can convert his term insurance only to ordinary life, 20-payment life or 30-payment life policies.

Q Is the widower of a woman veteran entitled to pension at her death, and are the children entitled to any pension?

A. A widower is not entitled to pension under the present law, but surviving children may be.

IF REFRIGERATOR UNIT DOES NOT RUN:

- 1 Check to see if plug is making contact in wall outlet.
2 If plug is making contact in outlet, check outlet with light cord and bulb to see if current is on.
3 If current is not on at outlet, check for blown fuse in housefuse panel.

IF MECHANISM RUNS TOO MUCH:

- 1 Make sure door seal is tight.
2 Clean the condenser.
3 Temperature control may be set for too cold a temperature.
4 Refrigerator may need defrosting.

IF MECHANISM RUNS . . . but there is little or no refrigeration:

- 1 Stop mechanism by turning off switch or removing wall plug.
2 Allow all frost to be melted.
3 Start once more and see if cooling unit gets cold.

IF IT TAKES TOO LONG TO MAKE ICE:

- 1 Check temperature control. It may be set on warm position.
2 Too much frost on freezer unit may be retarding cold-making.

If your check-up fails to relieve the trouble, then call a serviceman without delay. Servicemen are busy now and will be extra busy during the midseason rush. You'll save possible inconvenience and food spoilage later by having needed repairs made now.

### Offers Suggestions On Methods Of Combatting Measles

AUSTIN, TEXAS, May 1. With the incidence of measles more than sixty per cent higher than the seven year median, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has issued a statement concerning the use of gamma globulin for protecting young or frail children from an attack of this perennial childhood disease and its often serious complications.

"If you have a child less than five years old who has been exposed to measles, your family doctor may recommend giving him gamma globulin," Dr. Cox advised. "Through city, county or state health departments doctors can obtain gamma globulin free to be used as they think advisable. Infants and children, whose health makes it inadvisable for them to suffer an attack of measles, may postpone the disease if gamma globulin is administered within eight days from the time of exposure."

The State Health Officer emphasized the fact that gamma globulin cannot give a child permanent protection against measles and added that the protection is ordinarily of about three weeks duration. However, there is no limit to the number of times it can be used and a baby who is protected by it now can be protected by it again in June or July. Gamma globulin can go on shielding him against measles until he is old enough and strong enough to stand an attack without serious consequences.

During an outbreak of measles, Dr. Cox said that is well to keep children under five years of age, and more especially frail children, from all other youngsters who might serve as sources of infection. Statistics show that nine-tenths of all measles deaths occur in children under five years of age.
