Beneficial Rains Over Week-End Total 1.71 Inches

Rains falling last Saturday morning, that night and Sunday night, brought additional moisture to Sanderson and which will be of utmost benefit to the ranges of this section.

Rain Saturday morning amounted to .80 inches the records show, while additional rains that night and Sunday night brought an additional .91 inches making a total of 1.71 inches to fall over the week-end. Since Saturday, April 29th a total of 4.34 inches of rain have fallen in Sanderson. Reports reaching the Times office are that the rain was pretty general in this section, with some of the ranchers receiving more than others.

Wednesday night, shortly after midnight more showers fell. Preceding the showers, there was an electrical storm with high winds. Thursday night another shower fell accompanied by an electrical storm.

Parcel Post Now Limited To 11 Pounds

Postmaster Clyde Griffith received notice Friday from the Inspectors office at San Antonio the following announcement in regard to the shipping by parcel post:

"Reduction effective at midnight tonight, May 9 1946, of weight and size on ordinary parcel post. Postmaster General Robert E. Hanegan announced today parcel covered by the limitation will not be accepted for mailing if they weigh more than 11 pounds or if the combined length and girth exceed 60 inches."

The normal weight limitation on parcel post is 70 pounds. The size limitation is 106 inches combined length and girth. Four priority classes of goods are exempted from the limitation. These are live-day-old poultry, seeds, plants and other nursery stock, eggs, butter and other perishable food products and medicines, drugs, surgical instruments and surgical dressings.

Mr. Hanegan acted at the request of the Office of Defense Transportation and at the urging of the Association of American Railroads. Large shipments normally carried by rail, freight or express, already are being sent by parcel post to avoid the restrictions imposed upon the railroads by the Office of Defense Transportation.

Mr. Hanegan further stated that full parcel post service will be restored at the earliest possible moment.

This new ruling was ordered as a result of the coal strike and curtailment of rail service the postmaster revealed.

Besides having made guest appearances in Detroit, Radio City, and the American Academy of Dramatic Art in New York, Miss Dawn, has entertained the armed forces throughout the war and has for some time been interested in Little Theater work.

"Pep Parade" has the unqualified recommendation of many other towns where it has played. Those sponsoring the production feel that it will be a big success here.


With Miss Lattimore taking the room count the tenth grade had the most parents present.
